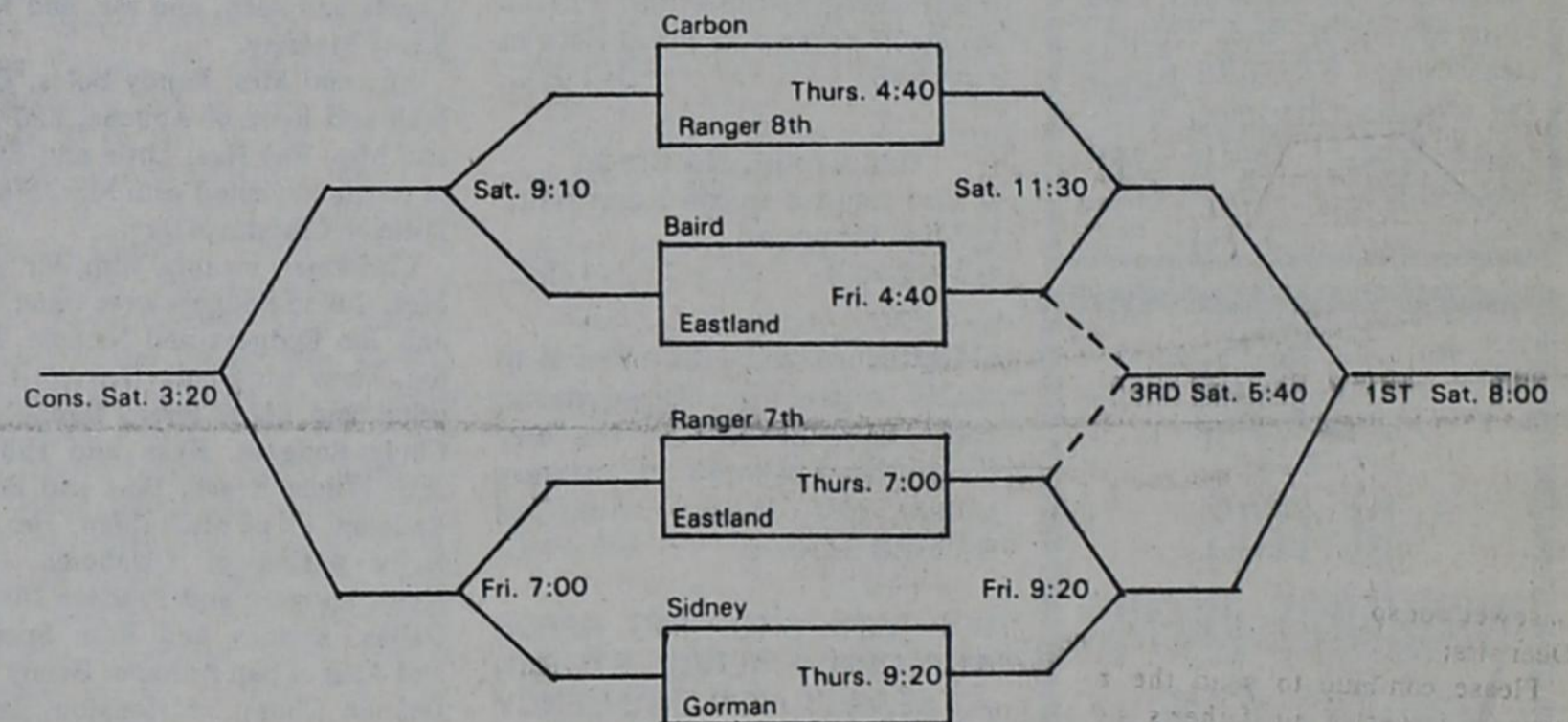

"Nuttty" Idea Pays Off

Ramona and Larry Stewart's gift shop is the nuttiest place in Gorman, Tex. The Peanut Hut, as it is called, is the ultimate in peanut shops, selling 10 different flavors of roasted peanuts.

For those with a gourmet taste, there are sour-cream-flavored peanuts. If you have a sweet tooth, you can choose a honey-and-cinnamon peanut mix. For the adventurous, zesty jalapeño-flavored peanuts are a waiting. And the traditionalists will find the old standard—freshly roasted salted peanuts.

If a visitor just can't make up his mind what flavor he wants, he can sample them all from little bins on display in the shop. "Samples are our best form of advertising," Ramona says.

The Stewarts also sell freshly ground, all-natural peanut butter as well as ceramic peanut specialty gift items.

"I make most of the ceramic items in my spare time," Ramona says. "A few items, such as the ceramic peanut shell, are made for me by local residents."

The Stewarts come by their interest in peanuts naturally. Ramona's grandfather homesteaded land near Gorman and started raising peanuts in the late 1800's. The family has been nuts about peanuts ever since. Lance Sharp, Ramona's grandson, is a fifth-generation peanut farmer.

Ramona kept peanuts in the family when she married Larry. He was a USDA peanut inspector and then managed a local peanut processing plant until he and Ramona opened the Peanut Hut four years ago.

Actually, it would be strange if the Stewarts weren't interested in peanuts—considering where they live. Few places on the face of the earth are so steeped in peanut-tery as is Gorman, Tex. The community proudly claims the title of Peanut Capital of the Southwest.

"Thousands of tons of peanuts are processed here annually," Ramona points out. "Yet there was no business that sold anything other than shelled peanuts to the public."

Four years ago the Stewarts decided to remedy that situation, and their business has flourished. It draws tourists who pass through Gorman on Texas Highway 6 between Abilene and Waco. "We've had customers from 40 states and 17 countries," Larry says. Drop-in tourists often make followup purchases through the Stewarts' mail-order business. And customers come from a 75-mile radius to buy gift items that promote their home area's peanut industry.

"Around Christmas, things really get nutty around here," says Ramona.

COMANCHE — The 1986 peanut crop has been described as the biggest money crop ever in the county.

Data from the peanut marketing cards returned Nov. 14 on 106 farmers showed 5,224.5 acres of peanuts threshed, yielding 8,468,834 pounds. That yield averages to 1,621 pounds or 54 bushels per acre.

Peanuts harvested early were below average, but later harvests were graded average or above.

Contracted peanuts are bringing \$607 per ton, according to reports, while non-contracted peanuts have brought up to \$950 per ton.

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service records say Comanche County's greatest peanut production was in 1979, when the average was 57.6 bushels per acre.
