Up to half of the Social Security benefits people received in 1986 may be subject to Federal income tax, but mainly only for those who had substantial income in addition to their benefits, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

In fact, Hammons said, more than 90 percent of the people getting benefits will not have to pay any tax on any part of their benefits. Every person who received or repaid any Social Security benefits in 1986 will receive Form SSA-1099, Social Security Benefit Statement, before the end of January. The form will show the new amount of Social

1987 Exemption Forms Available

Eastland county property owners wishing to sign up for the 1987 property tax exemptions and/or special land valuations may obtain the necessary application forms at the office of the Eastland County Appraisal District in the Eastland County Courthouse.

The completed applications must be on file with the Apraisal District by May 1, 1987, if they are to be allowed for the 1987 tax year.

A list of several of the exemptions available appears at the end of this article. If a property owner has any question as to his or her eligibility, they should contact the Appraisal District for assistance.

It is emphasized that a Residential Homestead exemption does not have to be applied for every year. If the residential homestead owner still resides in the same house for 1987 that he or she lived in for 1986, they do not have to file again if they received the exemption on that property in 1986. An exception to this would be the residential homeowner who turned 65 years of age before January 1, 1987; they need to sign up for the over-65 exemption that is available for over-65 homeowners. If you have any doubt as to whether you are receiving a Homestead exemption or as to your elegibility, please contact the Appraisal District. The Appraisal District office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse and the telephone number is 629-8597.






