PRIMARY ELECTION DRAWS LARGE VOTER TURNOUT

The Democratic and Republican parties Primary Elections drew a large number of voters to the polls in the elections held Tuesday in Gorman.

385 votes were cast in the Democratic Primary and 78 votes were counted in the Republican Primary.

Dee Hogan won the Eastland County Sheriff's race with a total of 2066 votes. Don Underwood received 2039. Gorman voters gave Don Underwood 212 votes to Hogan's 171.

L. T. Owen won the Precinct 3

Commissioners race. He received 197 votes in Gorman to 171 for Dicky Burgess.

Al Gore received 143 votes for the Presidential nominee. Runner-up was Michael Dukakis with 103.

263 votes were cast for "Texans Shall Maintain Their Right to Select Judges" referendum.

Republicans cast 45 votes for the Presidential nominee Pat Robertson. George Bush, runner-up, polled 29.

68 votes were cast for "English Language as Official Language of the State and the USA.

James C. Perez Completes Navy Recruit Training

Navy Seaman Recruit James C. Perez, son of Estella O. and James F. Perez Jr. of 501 S. Cato, De Leon, Tx., has completed recruit training at Naval Training Command in Great Lakes, Ill.

During Perez's eight-week training cycle, he studied general military subjects designed to prepare him for further academic and on-the-job training in one of the Navy's 85 basic fields.

Perez's studies included seamanship, close order drill, Naval history and first aid. Personnel who complete this course of instruction are eligible for three hours of college credit in physical education and hygiene.

A 1985 graduate of De Leon High School, he joined the Navy in August 1987.

CITY CHIT CHAT

The Gorman City Commission met in regular session on Thursday, March 3 with Mayor Garrett, Commissioner Carter and Commissioner Clark present. Others present were Chief Funderburgh, Judge Parker, Estelle Craddock and Herman Bennett.

Minutes of previous meeting were approved. Bills for February were approved. Reports were given to the Commission by Chief Funderburgh and Judge Parker for their activities for February.

The Commission was informed that flow at the North sewer plant had been refigured and we were getting a little less than 9,000 gallons of flow per day. This information will be sent to the Texas Water Commission in an effort to get the size of the lagoons lowered. It was reported that information had been gathered about the possibility of a lift station. It would be great if this water could be used to irrigate non-food crops.

The landfill was discussed and due to the fact that we are about to run out of space at the fill, the Commission voted to stop taking garbage from those who are not on the City Utility list. This includes those who are currently paying water or trash hauling. Those on the list may continue for the time being to haul to the fill by paying the current fee of \$3 for a pick-up or small trailer and \$6 for larger loads. Those not on the list WILL NOT BE ALLOWED to unload at the landfill. We are sorry that we had to stop those not on city utilities, but at the present time, we have no choice. We hope that you will understand.

As I write this we have James Michaels and Hershell Cordell signed up for Place No. 4 on the ballot. No one has signed for Place No. 2 or for the Mayor's place. Deadline for filing will be 5 p. m. March 23. Those wishing to file may do so at the City Hall during office hours.

City Clean Up Week has been set for April 4-8 by the Commission. It is hoped that all citizens will join in this clean-up campaign to make our city look better.

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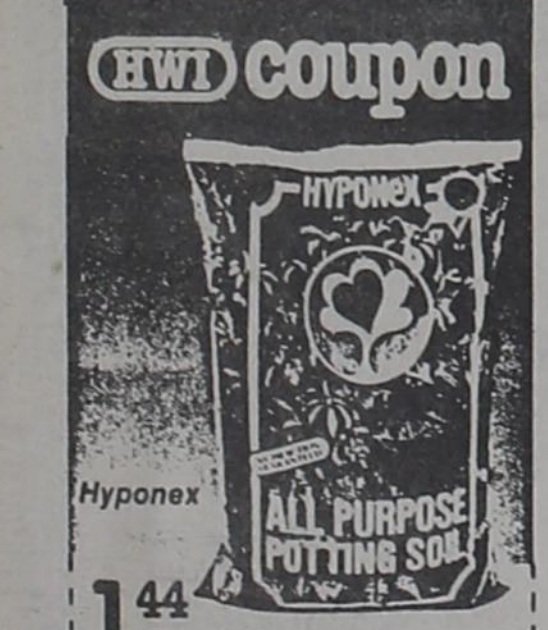

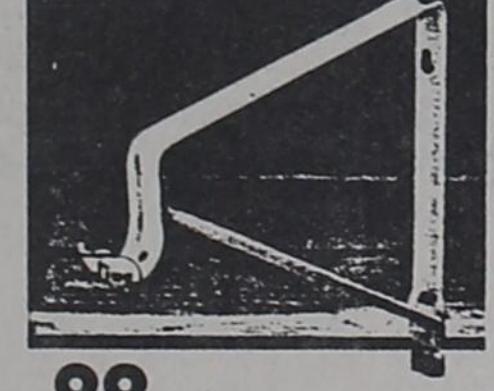

THE GORDON SPOT

Do you want to prevent those summer annual weeds and grasses from coming up in your lawn? If your answer is yes, now is the time to apply a preemerge herbicide to your lawn. This should be applied before the seed germinates. Recommended preemerge herbicides are Balan. Betasan, Dacthal, Enide and Simazine.

Those green weeds and grasses in your lawn now are winter weeds and will not be controlled by the preemerge herbicides now. These herbicides must be applied about October 1 to prevent the winter weeds. They can also be controlled by applying glyphosphate (Round-Up, Kleen-Up, or Doomsday) in late January and early February. It is probably too late now to apply glyphosphate because it could kill your lawn grass. However, if you have some very heavy spots of greenweeds you might spot spray with glyphosphate.

You may apply the preemerge herbicides alone or mixed with fertilizer. Either one must be put out before March 15. Some people prefer to apply the herbicide now and apply fertilizer about April 15. Fertilizer applied now fertilizes those winter weeds and grasses, but will not help your lawn grass until it begins to grow next month.

The fruit trees are beginning to bloom and that means it will soon be time to apply insecticides and fungicides. Peach, plum and apricot trees should be sprayed when 75 percent of the petals have fallen.

The spray should contain an insecticide to control insects and a fungicide to control diseases such as Brown Rot and Scab. The recommended fungicides include Benomyl Chlorothalonil, (Bravo), Captan, Sulphur or Thiophanatemethyl.

The number one insect of fruit is the plum curculio. This is the little white worms we find in the fruit. Other insects that cause damage are catfacing insects such as thrip, stink bugs, lygus bugs. Recommended insecticides are Malathion, Sevin or Zolone. Some fruit tree sprays have a mixture of insecticide and fungicide.

Repeat this spray at 10 to 14 days after petal fall and again 10 to 14 days after the second spray. It will be necessary to apply as many as 5 or 6 applications at 10 to 14 day intervals except on early maturing varieties. Do not apply insecticides within three days of harvesting plums or within seven days of harvesting peaches. Be sure to read and follow directions on the labels.

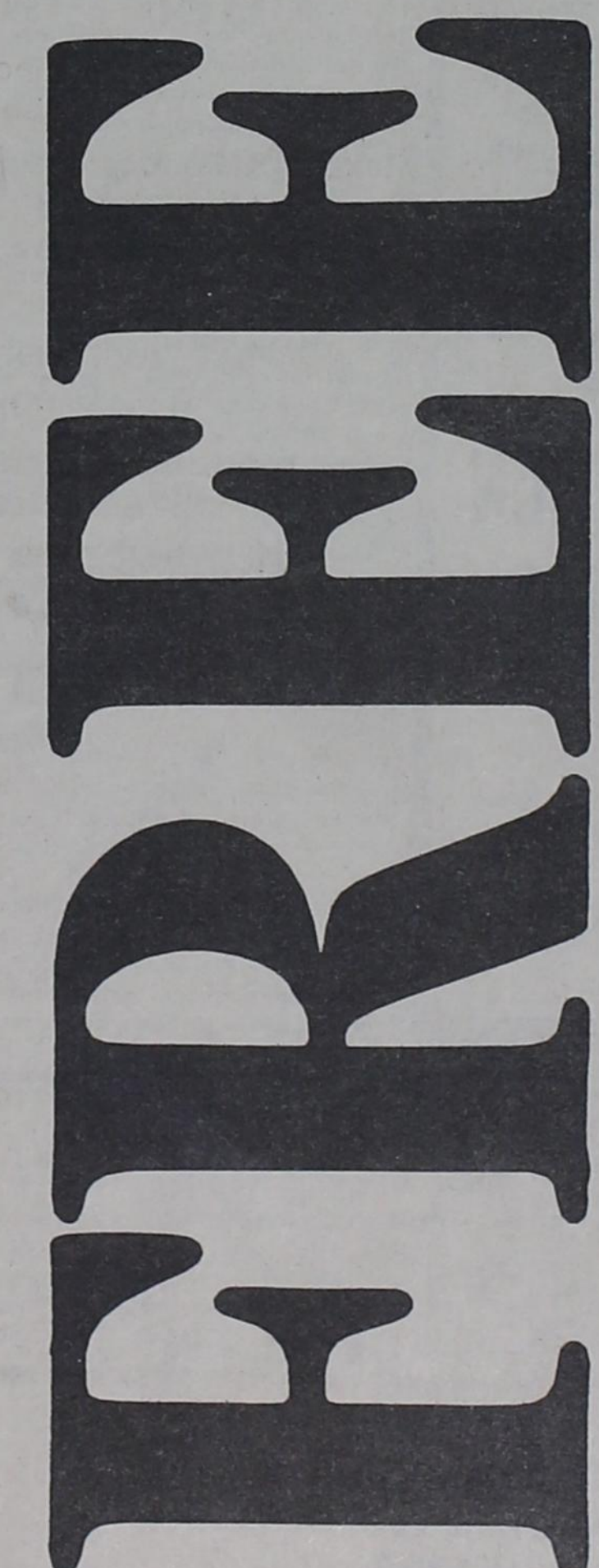
We have new, recently revised, homeowners fruit and nut spray schedules as well as spray guides for commercial growers in the Extension office to give you more complete information on fruit tree spraying.

Some people have asked when various vegetables should be planted. Soil temperature is probably the best guide.

The realistic or best soil temperature at which carrots, parsley, lettuce, radishes and spinach should be planted is 45 degrees. Other vegetables and their realistic soil temperature are: beans (72), beets (45), cabbage (54), chard (54), eggplant (75), pepper (64), tomatoes (55), turnips (50), corn (70), and water-milions (72).

The soil temperature should be taken about 8 a. m. and at the depth seed are to be planted.

Texas A&M survey finds women's awareness of breast cancer increased

COLLEGE STATION — Eleven percent more women now recall hearing more about breast cancer than they did a year ago, according to a survey carried out by Texas A&M University political scientists for the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society.

As a result of hearing about breast cancer in the media, 9 percent of women over 40 who had heard about breast cancer in the last year said they talked to a doctor, and another 9 percent either made an appointment or called the American Cancer Society.

The American Cancer Society should be proud of the apparent impact of its mammography program, says Texas A&M researcher Dr. James Dyer, senior study director with the University's Public Policy Resources Laboratory.

The poll showed a 20 percent drop in the total number of people saying either they did not know mammography was available without a doctor's recommendation, that mammograms cause radiation damage, that self examination is sufficient or that they are afraid of hearing bad news.

Texas A&M educator finds common background among women leaders

COLLEGE STATION — Women are elbowing into male-dominated leadership roles, and a Texas A&M University educator is trying to find a common thread in the backgrounds of women leaders that causes them to flourish where previously they floundered.

As part of her research as a fellow for the national fellowship program of the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, Dr. Julia Clark interviews women employed in nontraditional professional leadership positions in the United States and other countries to determine the factors that contributed to their success.

"Women are beginning to respond to the educational challenge of pursuing careers and employment in fields that are traditionally male dominated," Clark said. "The more we see women in leadership areas, the more we can inspire younger women to enter these fields. They are paving the way on a very bumpy road for a future generation of women."
