The Panthers continued their winning ways on Friday night when they traveled to Hico to take on the Tigers in a District 16A game. The Panthers started the action by running a punt back for a touchdown, and then went on from there to down the Tigers 46 to 7.

Shane Morrow got the scoring underway for the Panthers in a hurry as he caught a Tiger punt on his own 48 and returned it all the way for the touchdown with 9:48 left in the period. The try for two points failed and the Panthers led 6-0.

This lead dwindled real fast, however, as the Tigers came back with 3:59 remaining in the period and moved 30 yards in 5 plays for the score after recovering a Panther fumble on the Gorman 30. The score came on a pass to James Christian from Scott Schecht for 2 yards and the TD. Travis Phillips kicked the point after and the Tigers led 7-6.

The Panthers came back with 7:17 left in the half and went 50 yards in 10 plays with Brandon Gilmore getting the honors on a run from 2 yards out. The drive featured a 19 yard pass to Gilmore and a 21 yard pass to Shane Morrow. The try for points failed and Gorman went up 12-7.

Then the wheels started coming off for the Tigers as the Panthers scooped up a Tiger fumble at the Hico 24 and scored in just 3 plays. On the first snap the Panthers were penalized for holding. From there Gilmore rambled for 25 yards to set the Panthers up first and down at the Hico 8. Then following a 7 yard run, Kevin Hirst kept the snap on a keeper for the final yard with 4:27 left in the half. Again the try for two points failed and Gorman led 18-7.

Then on the next possession the Tigers again turned the ball over on a fumble and the Panthers took over at the Tiger 36. On the first play Gilmore raced for 26 yards to set the Panthers up first and ten from the 9. Following two plays for 2 and 6 yards, Hirst again kept the ball for the final yard for the TD with 1:13 left in the half. This time Hirst ran for the two pointer on a keeper to up the score to 26-7.

However, things were not over for the Panthers as they grabbed another Tiger fumble on the Hico 33 and from there it took only one play to score as Hirst threw a perfect strike to Gilmore who got open on the left sideline and raced in for the score with 36 seconds left. Gilmore then added the two pointer on a run and Gorman led the Tigers 34 to 7 at halftime.

The Panthers scored again with 11:30 in the final period as Shane Morrow caught a beautiful pass from Hirst for 24 yards and a TD. The pass

try for two points failed and the score rose to 40-7.

The final blow came when John Carter stepped in front of a Tiger receiver and intercepted the pass and returned it for 25 yards for the score with 5:02 left in the game. The run for points failed and the final score was 46-7.

Gilmore led the Panthers on the ground with 86 yards on 15 carries. Kevin Hirst had 46 yards on 9 keepers. Matt Jones got 32 on 6 tries. Shane Morrow had 24 on 1 run. Johnny Osborne got 15 on 4 tries. Jay McCormick had 14 on 4 trips and Cory Pack ran 3 times for 6. Jason Ditmore carried 4 times for 5 yards.

The Big Red defense did a great job all night as they hit hard and did some good blocking for the Panther runners and passer. The Big Red defense will be tested real heavy here on Friday night as they host the always tough Evant Elks in the Homecoming Game at 7:30 p. m.

The Elks and the Panthers always have a "barn-burner" each year and this one is expected to be no different. The Big Red will really have to continue the outstanding play they have exhibited the past two games to get a victory over the Elks. And that's exactly what we think they will do.

"Providing veterans with a direct access to the highest levels of government by giving them a seat at the President's table is a proposition that makes sense," Gramm said.

"America's veterans are people who served and sacrificed for their country, and their voices should be heard clearly in the highest councils of government."

The new Department of Veterans' Affairs was created originally in 1930 as the VA with a mandate to administer the growing number of programs created for the country's veterans, their dependents and survivors.

"Just two years ago, the VA had grown so much that it became the government's largest independent agency with a budget of \$28 billion and over 240,000 employees," the senator said.

Gramm, a co-sponsor and strong supporter of the legislation, also pointed out that the new department will have an impact on more than 79 million Americans, including 28 million veterans, 49 million family members and two million survivors.

"Having a secretary of Veteran's Affairs as part of the Cabinet simply insures that the interests of one of our three Americans can now be heard and considered at the highest level of government.

"The responsibilities of the new department will be tremendously widespread, ranging from disability

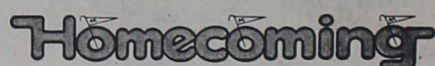


