

Following two plays for 2 and 6 yards, Hirst again kept the ball for the final yard for the TD with 1:13 left in the half. This time Hirst ran for the two pointer on a keeper to up the score to 26-7.

However, things were not over for the Panthers as they grabbed another Tiger fumble on the Hico 33 and from there it took only one play to score as Hirst threw a perfect strike to Gilmore who got open on the left sideline and raced in for the score with 36 seconds left. Gilmore then added the two pointer on a run and Gorman led the Tigers 34 to 7 at halftime.


The general election will be held Tuesday, November 8th in the Old Fire Hall.
