tion can help up to three different people. Platelets and plasma are separated from the red cells to meet the differing needs of the public. To be eligible to donate blood, a person must be between the ages of 17 to 71. They must weigh at least 110 pounds. Most maintenance medications (such as blood pressure, hormones, cholesterol, etc.) can be accepted. Persons who are not eligible to donate include those who have had a tattoo or body piercing within the last year and persons who are on

antibiotics. If you have been on antibiotics you must be off of them for 7 days before donating. Giving blood is easy. Following registration you will answer simple medical history questions and receive a miniphysical. You will feel only a brief pinch, and the 5-8 minute donation will be over before you know it. Afterward, you can relax for a few minutes with refreshments. Each donor will receive a t-shirt, compliments of Meek Blood Center, to show our appreciation for their donation.

The staff at Meek Blood Center is glad to have the opportunity to see old friends and to meet new ones. Most of all, they are glad to know someone will have a chance for tomorrow because you gave blood today.




### **Services Held for Rance Porter**



### Pause to Think

There are many who feel that the deasth of Christ did away with the 'Ten Commandments'. What do the scriptures have to say about that?

Here is what Jesus had to say in Matthew 5:17-19, "Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil. For verily I say unto you, Till heaven and earth pass, one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass from the law, till all be fulfilled. Whosoever therefore shall break one of these least commandments, and shall teach men so, he shall be called the least in the kingdom of heaven: but whosoever shall do and teach them, the same shall be called great in the kingdom of heaven.

Jesus did not come to do away with the law, but to bring fulfillment. He declares that the law in its entirety will exist until heaven and earth pass away. This then leads us to a new question. How exactly is the law fulfilled?

The Apostle Paul recorded his insight with regard to the previous question, in Romans 8:1-4. There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death. For what the law could not do, in that it was weak through the flesh, God sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and for sin, condemned sin in the flesh: That the righteousness of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit.

The passages of scripture in Romans 8 are incredible. When I begin to read or quote them, I have difficulty finding a closing point. The way in which the law is fulfilled is clearly defined here. The first thing said in Romans 8 is that if we are in Christ and we walk or seek after the Spirit and not the flesh, then we have no condemnation. Please note that there are two qualifying factors that must co-exist prior to an individual becoming free of condemnation. The individual must be in Christ. The individual must seek after the things of the Spirit and not after the things of the flesh.

Romans 8 clearly states that we have been set free. There are those who feel that we have freedom from the law.

This is not the case. So, what have we been freed from? We have been set free from the law of sin and the law of death. However, this freedom is contingent upon what a person seeks. If an indivdual seeks after the flesh, they will reap of the flesh corruption. But, if they seek after the Spirit, they will reap of the Spirit life everlasting, Galatians 6.8, this is so because of the law of sowing and

Now, if we seek after the things of the Spirit, and not the things of the flesh, the Apostle Paul declares that the righteousness of the law will be fulfilled in us. That is why Christ came in the flesh. He demonstrated for us that it was possible to be mortal and still submit to the desires of the Spirit of God, by bringing our thoughts and desires in control by the power of the Spirit of Christ.

According to scripture, an individual cannot hope to be able to bring his or her thoughts and desires in control without being born again of water and of the Spirit. This is found in John 3:5-6. Jesus answered, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God. That which is born of the flesh is flesh; and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit.

Is it possible to seek after and fulfill the desire(-s) of the flesh and still go to Heaven, or enter into life everlasting?
