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Hunting Season Opening

Major upland and migratory bird hunting seasons are either open at the present time or will be open in the near future. The outlook for the upcoming season is bright in most areas. Waterfowl species should be present in numbers comparable to previous years if mother nature cooperates and provides us with some water to hold the waterfowl in the area. At the present time, many lakes in this area are either dry or nearly so, the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge has water in only two of its six units. This lack of water may force many of our ducks and geese to move on south to the coast or shift their wintering area to where more water is available.

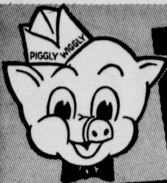
Reports from the nesting areas indicate a normal fall duck migration. Early reports were for an increase in the number of ducks coming south, but late deterioration of nesting areas due to drought on the northern prairies are now expected to offset this early increase. Geese and cranes flights should be about the same as in past years, but once again lack of water may affect hunting in this area. Cranes are not as dependent upon water as ducks and geese, but are slow in building up on the refuge this fall, with the count made on the 20th of October showing only 23,000 cranes present. This number is expected to double by the opening of the season.

Dove season is over for all purposes, even though the season doesn't close until October

30, 1967, as most doves have vacated this area for warmer climates. The quail season should be the best in several years as an excellent hatch was experienced in all areas of West Texas.

Hunters are reminded that to hunt migratory waterfowl, a federal "duck stamp" is needed by every hunter 16 years of age or older. This stamp must be signed across the face with ink. These stamps can be purchased at any major post office and many of the smaller ones throughout the area. A stamp is not needed to hunt cranes.

The fall bird hunting seasons are as follows:

GOOSE SEASON - October 24, 1967 through January 6, 1968. Daily bag and possession limit is five birds, only two

of which may be of the dark species.

CRANE SEASON - November 4, 1967 through January 2, 1968. Daily bag limit is two, possession limit is four.

DUCK SEASON - November 18, 1967 through January 6, 1968. Daily bag limit is four, possession limit is eight. The daily bag may not contain more than one wood duck, one canvasback, or two mallards. The possession limit may not include more than two wood ducks, one canvasback, or four mallards.

SP/4 Jones has one brother, Kenneth, who lives with his family here.

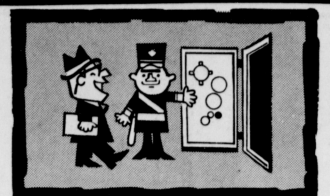
Randy Fisher Completes Basic

While attending the school, he studied such subjects as mess management, retail sales operation, supply and disbursing with emphasis on supply management afloat.

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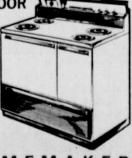

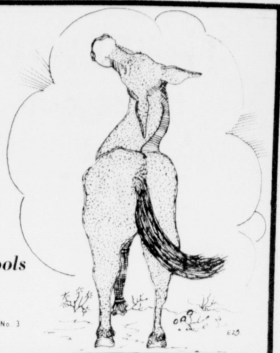

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN, Tex.—A proposed cutback in federal highway spending would seriously damage Texas economy, hamper safety efforts and break continuity in the state's road building program, Gov. John Connally has told U. S. officials. This proposal was President Johnson's first response to demands for economy.

In responding to an invitation from U. S. Secretary of Transportation Alan S. Boyd to com-

crease in the traffic toll on outmoded highways, Governor pointed out.

"It is somewhat difficult for us to understand how a reduction in expenditures for highways financed from the trust fund for which taxes on the motorists have already been levied would be of any advantage to the balancing of the federal budget," Connally wrote. "It is assumed that there would be no corresponding reduction in highway user taxes to balance the reduction in federal aid highway expenditures. If such tax reduction is contemplated, it would be possible for the states to add such levies to their

tax programs to keep the state economy in balance."

COLLEGE ENROLLMENTS, COST UP--Enrollments at universities, colleges and junior colleges in Texas are at a record 544,471 students, 9.7 percent over last fall.

Costs, too, inevitable are rising. Coordinating Board, College and University System noted. Agency estimated that the state bill for higher education will go up to \$31,400,000, or 15.5 percent, the next biennium if the Legislature approves its fund allocation formulas.

In other action, Board adopted a policy permitting professors in state schools to voice their opinion freely as private

citizens without fear of punitive action affecting their jobs. Agency delayed until January the decision on a statewide educational television network proposal.

Enrollment breakdown followed: state senior colleges, 199,241; junior colleges, 76,007; private senior colleges, 58,929; and private or church-related junior colleges, 10,294.

MUTSCHER CLAIMS VIC-TORY--Rep. Gus Mutschers of Brenham officially announced his candidacy for next speaker of the House of Representatives to succeed Ben Barnes.

The Speaker is elected by a majority vote on the opening day of the regular session. Mutschers claims pledges from 135 of the 150 House members.

COURTS SPEAK--Third Court of Civil Appeals, reversing former State Savings and Loan Commissioner James O. Gerst, approved the opening of a downtown Houston unit of Spring Branch Savings and Loan Association. Same court upheld State Banking Board award of Charter for American Bank of Commerce, Grapevine.

State Supreme Court backed the Texas Court of Civil Appeals ruling that Mt. Pleasant cannot require Jere Dairy to deliver milk three times a week in the city.

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the murder conviction and ordered a new trial for a Smith County man accused of killing his wife's former husband because the wife (a divorce suit was on appeal) was allowed to testify at a trial.

Same court reversed the murder conviction in a Harrison County case because the indictment was corrected after being read to the jury, changing the spelling of the victim's name.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES--Fishermen can't catch fish with their bare hands in waters of the 32 Possum Kingdom District counties, Atty. General Crawford Martin has ruled that.

Judge Ewing Weirlein of Houston cannot draw pay as court of civil appeals justice for month of September when he was sitting as a district court judge.

Broad and unlimited corporate purpose clause providing for preparation of income tax returns and assistance with such returns necessarily would include practice of law.

Employees of community centers for mental health and mental retardation are employees of political subdivisions entitled to social security coverage.

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
