

—J— There seems to be a lot of questions being asked as to when the proposals for the prison unit projects are to be sent in and what the chances are for Eastland County to secure one or more of the units.

The final entries of the needed information and facts needed by the Texas Department of Corrections, and the binding of the proposals when they are finalized is now being done. So the proposals are expected to be ready for presentation right

away. The Eastland County Economic Development Council have worked long and hard to get these proposals together to try and secure one or more prison units for our county, and the majority of folks in the county are congratulating them on a job well done.

Most of the folks in Eastland County feel that our county will be very, very fortunate if we are to be selected as a site for this project, and

realize what kind of an impact it could have on our economy. There is really no way to explain all the benefits that this project would bring to our hard-hit economy.

Of course there are always some opposition to anything that is proposed and these folks have their rights to speak their mind on the project.

There seems to be some folks expressing fear of escapees coming into their communities. If these folks could just see the Michael Unit that we had the privilege of touring a few months back, their minds would really be put at ease, because this new type unit is virtually impossible to escape from. I realize that the older prisons have had some problems back through the years with escapees, but this new unit is something to behold. It is so closely guarded and monitored and with the double fencing of the very high wire around the unit and the guard towers and electronic monitoring devices, one would have to be carried out feet first, or released in the usual manner to get out of this type unit.

The prison folks will be receiving probably more than 200 proposals between now and July 31st. And when the proposals have all been scrutinized, the number will be decreased down to 28, then 14, and then down to seven, from which two locations will be named.

It is hoped that the sites will be announced sometime in September. So most Eastland County folks will

be waiting and listening to hear of the site selections for the new units. All we can do is hope and pray that we will be one of the locations picked.

Bill is a quadraplegic due to a spinal cord injury received in a football game in 1969 when he was 16. He petitioned Gorman Lodge No. 716 in the Spring of 1974, and was granted a special dispensation by then Grand Master Dan B. Jordan. Bill was raised a Master Mason December 14, 1974. He is a member of the Fort Worth Scottish Rite, and the Fort Worth Moslah Shrine Temple.

His father, Audie O. 'Speedie'' Clark, was a mason and a member of Gorman Masonic Lodge No. 716 for 37 years until his death in 1984. Bill's great-grandfather, William Neil Huddleston, was a mason in Coal Hill, Arkansas, and later became a member of Sipe Springs Masonic Lodge







The May or June beetles have emerged from the soil and have been swarming during the late evenings since May. The females have recently been laying eggs which hatch into the white grub. These grubs will soon be feeding on the roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustine grass in home lawns. Once the grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

Homeowners in Eastland County should treat between now and August 10th, if you have a white grub problem. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining all of the roots and soil to a depth of 4 inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if these are more than four grubs per square foot

Diazinon, Dursban, Cylox or Prolox all give adequate control and should be used at the recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular forms is easier to apply and easier to wash into the soil than the liquid or spray formulations. After applying granules with a fertilizer spreader, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock the granules down to the soil. Then apply enough water to saok the granules into soil.

If you use the spray, wetting the lawn before spray application also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting te insecticides through the grass to the root zone where the grubs are feeding.

FIRE ANT BATTLE RAGES ON...

One of the most persistent insect pests today is the red imported fire ant, and despite a battle to halt its advance, the pest slowly marches onward.

Fire ants infest about 125 Texas counties. Earlier visions of eradicating this pest have faded and now the focus in on containment.

Fire ants are well-known for their painful stings, which cause a burning sensation and produce a small pustule. The sting usually is not serious unless it causes an allergic

Imported fire ants prefer building their mounds in open, sunny areas; frequently around stumps; in rotten logs, bales of hay and electrical boxes; and under other objects that offer some protection.

To control the fire ants, a whole arsenal of materials is available, including individual mound treatments, baits, and of course, home

More than 65 different products are now available for controlling fire ants. Products work differently and vary greatly in cost. There seems to be a product for about every type of

We have a publication "Fire Ants and Their Control" in the Extension Service office. It gives the names of many insecticides for fire ants and the methods of application.

Conservation Reserve Signup Now Thru August 4th

The U.S. Department of 'Agriculture has opened a ninth sign-up period, now through August 4 for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

"To enroll in the program, farmers must submit bids indicating ht eper acre rental payment they would accept to keep their land out of crop production and into conserving uses for 10 years," David Martin, County Executive Director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said. Applicants also must provide a cropping history for 1981 through 1986, he

In addition to highly erodible cropland, farmers may bid to enter filter strips, cropped wetlands, certain water bank program acres and cropland subject to scour erosion in to the CRP, according to Mr. Martin. "Bringing these acres into the program will produce more environmental benefits."

The CRP allows each farmer to receive up to \$50,000 per year, based on the bid per acre and the number of acres under the 10-year contract. Rental payments are made annually to producers with approved contracts and cost-share payments are made after the conservation practice is completed.

To date, approximately 3787.4 acres of Eastland County farmland have been accepted in the CRP. Eastland County farmers will receive about \$132,500 during 1989 in annual rental payments for CRP land under 10-year contracts.

Nationally, more than 30 million acres have been enrolled in the CRP under contracts entered into during the first eight signups. The goal is to bring 40-45 million acres into the program by the end of 1990. The CRP is designed to help farmers prevent or control critical soil erosion and help adjust the production of surplus agricultural commodities.


