They normally choose an area of at least 600 acres to well over 1,000 acres. We have found one thousand acres of land with a single owner willing to give an option on this property free of charge for a period of 9 months. The ultimate price for this property is \$650 per acre for a total cost of \$650,000.

While this may seem to be a lot of money it is a lot of land and the cost is only about one third of the monthly payroll and 1 percent of the total cost of the facility, a real bargain! With careful planning it can be budgeted and purchased withno added taxes for our citizens if we choose to go that route. It can also be purchased by Certificates of Obligation issued by the county payable in from 1 to 30 or so years. With the increased business activity and rejuvenation of our economy there could be a broadening of our county tax base such that no additional taxes will be collected from each individual.

Several facts are clear —

If we do not offer to buy land for a prison site we will NOT get a prison. If we do offer to buy land and it is not accepted as a site, it costs us NOTHING, zero.

If we offer a site and it is accepted our cost is minuscule when compared with the benefits - the biggest bargain in Eastland County!



Peanut Contracts Due On July 31

David Martin, County Executive Director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, reminds peanut producers and handlers that contracts drawn up to sell 1989-crop additional peanuts for export or crushing must be filed by July 31. Additional peanuts are those grown in excess of the farm's poundage, quota or on a farm that does not have a poundage quota.

Mr. Martin said peanut producers and handlers are responsible for contract agreements, and they should check to see that the peanut contract is in their best interest.

Peanut contracts submitted to ASCS for approval must contain the name and address of the producer and handler, the handler's registration number, the code of the State and County in which the additional peanuts are to be produced, the pounds of segregation 1,2 or 3 peanuts contracted, the contract price shown as a percentage of the quota support rate, and the signa-



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
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
