## DE LEON PEACH AND MELON FESTIVAL SLATED FOR AUGUST 7-12

The De Leon Peach and Melon Festival has been scheduled for August 7 thru 12 with a full week of celebration and family fun! A special event this year will be a drawing for either a new Ford or Chevrolet Pickup. They will be parked on the festival grounds and the winner will make a selection as to which he wants.

The events will begin on Monday with the selection of the P&M Queen. She will be honored at an afternoon tea. Later that night all the participants in the queen contest will be presented in a musical revue before appearing in formal dresses. The winner is announced after the judges turn in their scores and determine the winner. The Little Miss will be judged by the same group.

On Tuesday events will include a performance by John Thomas Conley at the festival grounds, followed by a dance at which The Faded Blue Band from Abilene will provide the music. Also on Tuesday the booths in the exhibit building will be judged.

At 9 Wednesday night the coronation will be held. The ESA Sorority is in charge.

Thursday night is the first night of the Tractor Pull. Also on Thursday a program of gospel singers "The First Farewell" will be held. This will be about two hours long.

On Friday the annual ex-students reunion will be held at 10 a. m. at City Hall. At 3 p. m. the Seed Spitting Contest will be held on main street. Then at 5 p. m. will be the favorite Watermelon Slicing event on main street curbs. Bring your own spoon and salt if you want them.

## Applications For Pre-Kindergarten Now Wanted

The State Board of Education has adopted rules specifying how state funds will be distributed to school districts to pay for prekindergarten programs. The Gorman Independent School District is now accepting applications for four-year-old children who might qualify for a half-day prekindergarten program. This program is for children whose family income is at or below subsistence level and for children who are limited English proficient. Those children who have older brothers or sisters in the free lunch program would qualify.

The purpose of the program will be to assist students in learning English and to prepare them for kindergarten. A prekindergarten class will not be taught unless there are at least 15 four year olds who qualify under state guidelines.

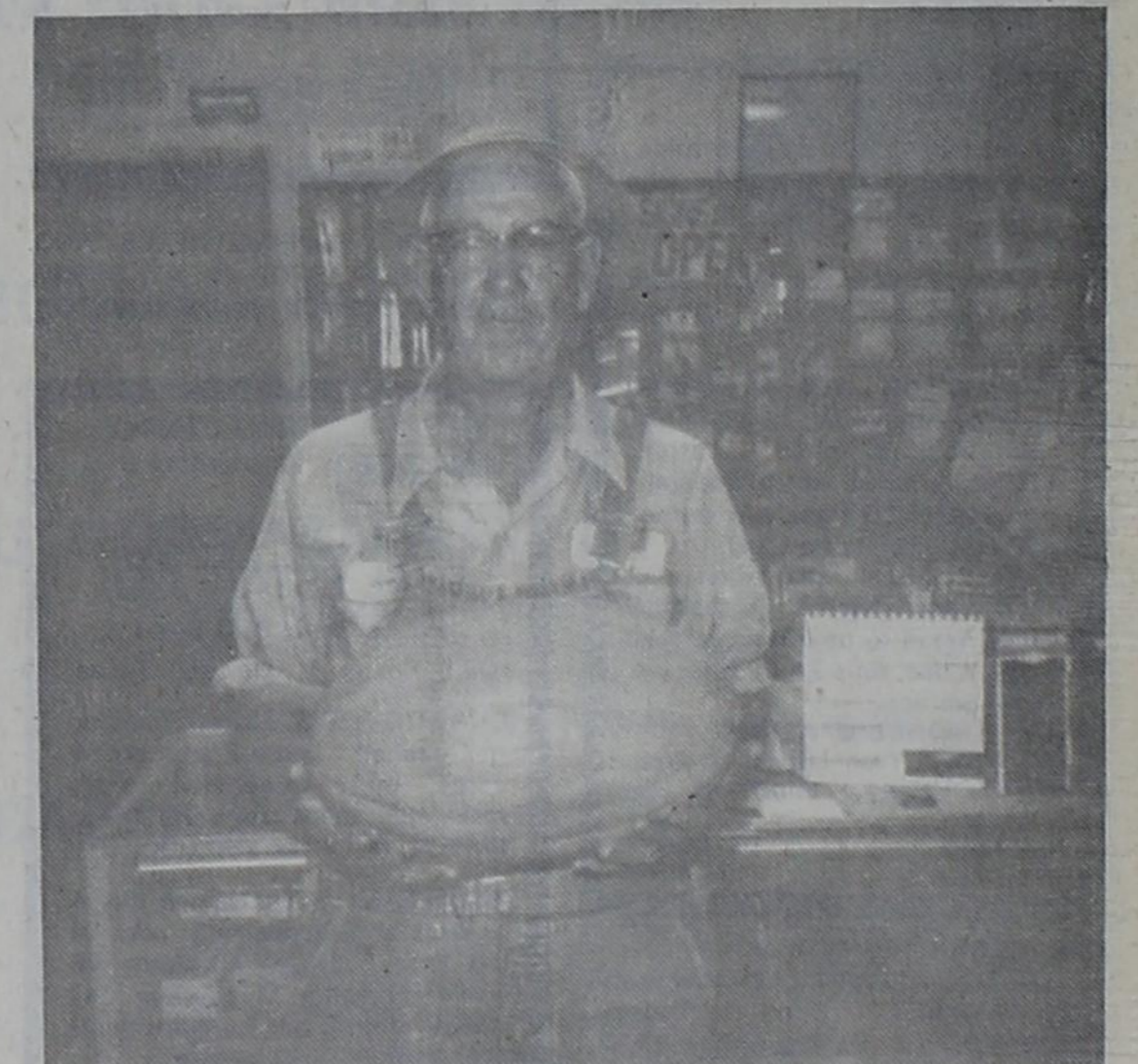

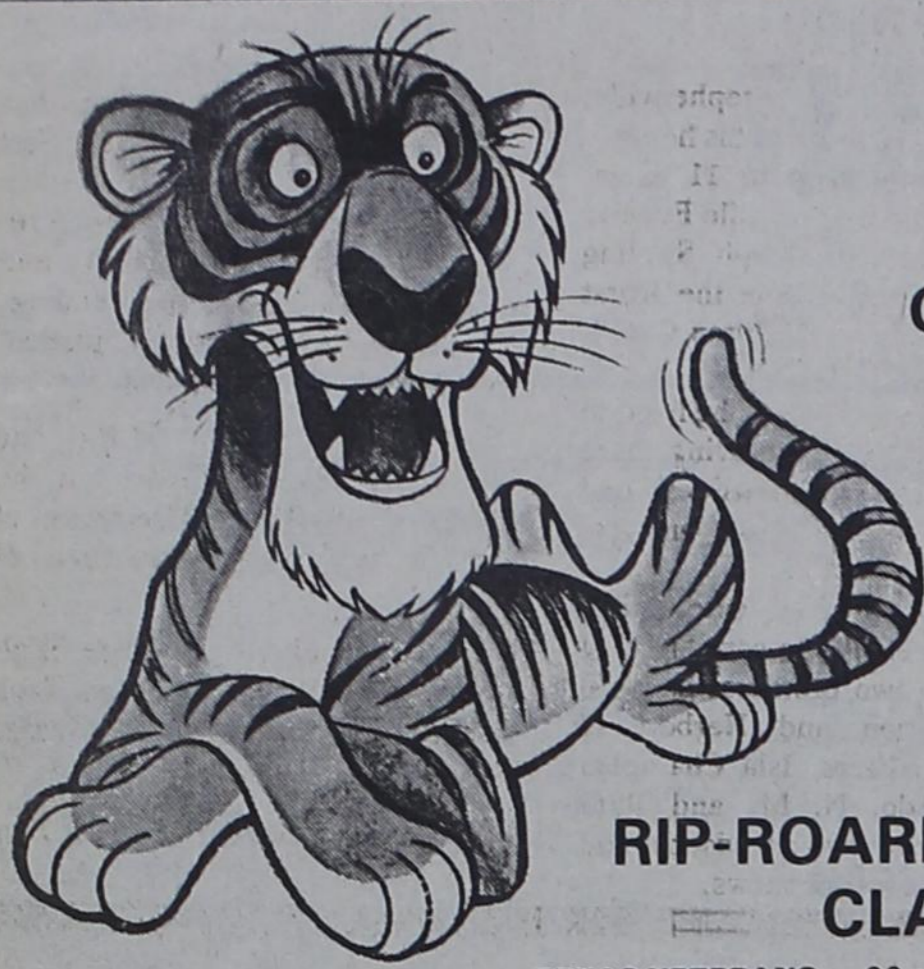
LARGE CANTALOUPE — John Rice is shown with his 17½ pound Israelite cantaloupe picked from his garden last Saturday morning.
