



### PUBLIC HEARING HELD ON TRASH PROBLEMS IN GORMAN

The Gorman City Commission conducted a public meeting on Monday night at the high school, an informed those present of several peoblems facing the City concerning the collection and disposal of trash. ome of the problems presented

1. The present landfill has enough space to last only about two more

months;

2. No land has been found for another landfill;

3. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will require that new landfills have wells drilled around the landfill to minister water quality, with monthly tests being required;

4. A bond will be required to assure compliance with EPA regula-5. The City's trash truck needs to

the landfill business; 6. The State Dept. of Health

minimum of six to nine months to permit a new landfill, but more likely to take twelve to fifteen months;

7. The EPA will require that the City maintain and monitor water quality at the landfill for a period of thirty years after the landfill is

All of these things being considered, the City has looked into the feasibility of closing the landfill and contracting with a private company to pickup our trash and dispose of it in a privately-owned landfill. Mr. Len Lyons, a representative from Browning-Ferris Industries, was present at the meeting and answered several questions concerning his proposal to contract with the City foe waste disposal services.

Mr. Lyons explained that his company could provide trash pickup be replaced very soon if we stay in abd disposal at a cost to the City of about \$8.50 per residence, although the actual amount charged each informed the City that it will take a residence would have to be set higher than that amount in order to offset the city's other expenses related to trash disposal.

He ststed that his company, better known as BFI, is the second largest company of it's type in the world, and that they have contracts with cities throughout the nation. BFI's home office is in Houston.

Mr. Lyons stated that the service could also be extended to persons living outside the city, but the fee would be slightly higher. Also, a Citizens Convenience Station could be set up at the present landfill site to accomodate those who are not on the pickup route and have to haul their own trash.

The City Commission will be considering this proposal and other alternatives during the next two months, and the public will be informed as quickly as possible of any changes in plans.



Food Stamp/AFDC Households: If you currently receive food stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the applicatiob form. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

All Other Households: If your household income is at or below the level shown on the enclosed scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application. (1) list names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None", (3) list total monthly income amd amount of income (BEFORE deductions for taxes, social security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement or welfare. If you jave a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

Verification: the information on the application may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year.

Reporting Changes: If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

Foster Child: Your foster child may be eligible for meal benefits. If you wish to apply for meal benefits for a foster child, contact the school for help with the application.

Nondiscrimination: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Fair Hearing: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: G. W. Maxfield, P. O. Box 8, Gorman 76454, 734-3173.

Confidentiality: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determination and verification of data.

Reapplication: You may apply for benefits any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but need to apply later in the year, please fill out an application at that
