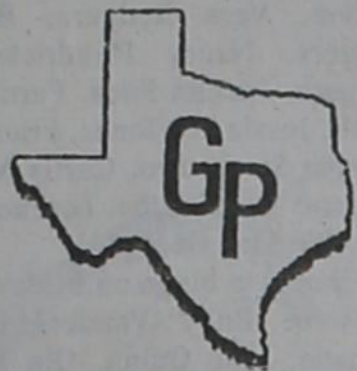

PANTHERS SKINNED BY DRAGONS 42-14; TO HOST SANTO WILDCATS FRIDAY NIGHT

The Panthers went to Bangs seeking their second win of the season but ran into a much larger and faster team in Class 2A who outclassed the Panthers throughout the game, and wound up with a 42 to 14 victory for the Dragons. The Dragons scored 14 points each in the first three quarters and then coasted the rest of the way for the win.

Bangs took the first possession and moved 68 yards in just 5 plays with the aid of a 15 yard penalty with Jason Espinoza getting the final yard with 10:11 left. Brian Northcutt kicked the PAT.

The Panthers were held on their first possession and punted to the Dragons on the Bangs 33. The Dragons had another drive, going 67 yards in just two plays. After 13 yards and a first down, Anthony Deal broke loose and rambled 54 yards for the score with 7:56 left in the period. Northcutt kicked the PAT and the score was 14-0.

Then in the second quarter the Dragons got the ball on an interception at the Gorman 35, and scored in 3 plays with Anthony Deal running for the final 20 yards with 3:26 left in the half. Northcutt kicked the point and the score was 21-0.

Then on the next Panther possession the Dragons recovered a Panther fumble on the Gorman 46 and scored again in 4 plays with Deal again breaking loose for the score from 27 yards out. Northcutt booted the point after and the halftime score was 28-8.

Then in the third quarter Bangs took the kickoff on their own 43 and moved in for another touchdown in just two plays with Corey Craddock racing for the final 55 yards for the TD with 11:03 left. Northcutt again added the point after and the score was 35-0.

Bangs scored on their next possession after intercepting a Panther pass on the Bangs 23. The drive covered 77 yards in 8 plays with Darral Scott going the final 27 for the TD with 2:49 left in the third. Northcutt again kicked the PAT and the score was 42-0.

Then in the fourth quarter the Panthers finally got to rolling and moved 65 yards in 7 plays with Brandon Gilmore getting the final 2 yards with 7:37 left. The drive featured 25 and 21 yard runs by Gilmore. Kevin Hirst kicked the point after and the score was 42-7.

Then on their next possession the Panthers took the ball on their own 14 and scored in 8 plays with Gilmore again getting the honors from 15 yards out with 2:50 left. The drive featured a 24 yard ramble by Kevin Hirst, a pass to Chad Campbell for 32, and an 11 yard run by Gary Browning.

The Panthers were truly outclassed and outgunned in this game but really hung in there all the way and never said die. At the final buzzer the Big Red were still getting after the Dragons.

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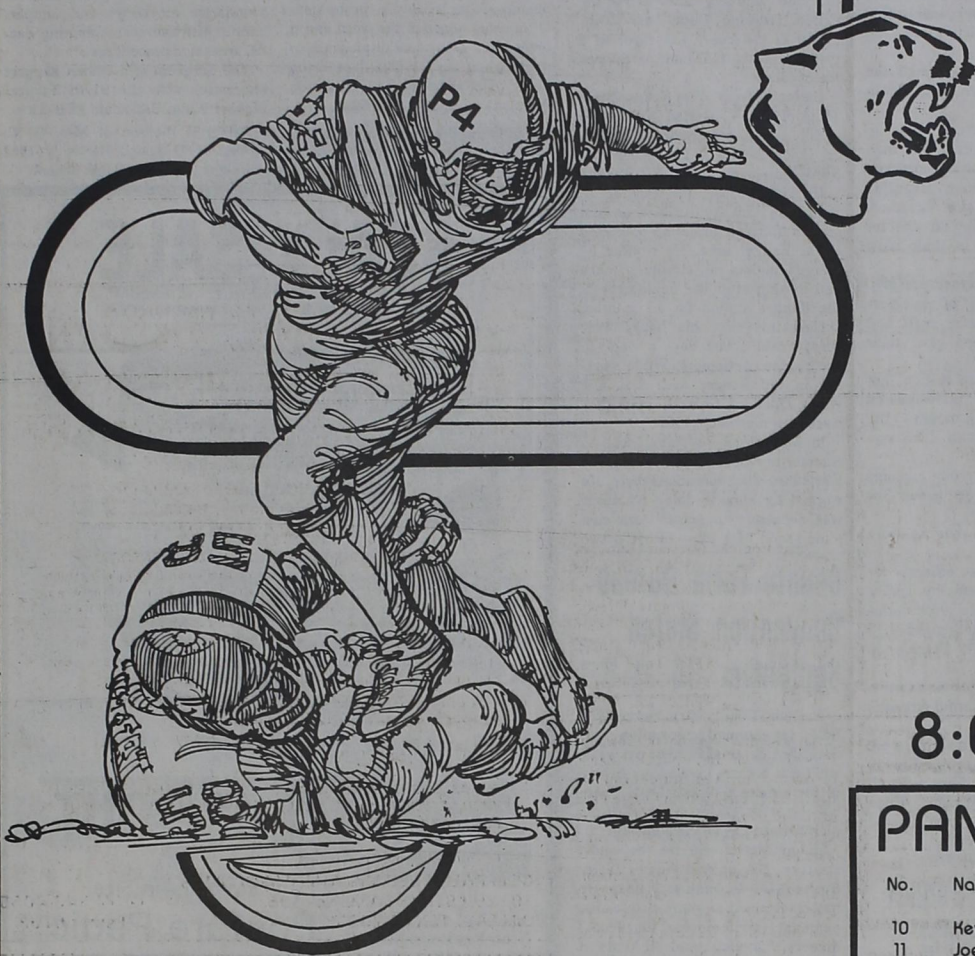

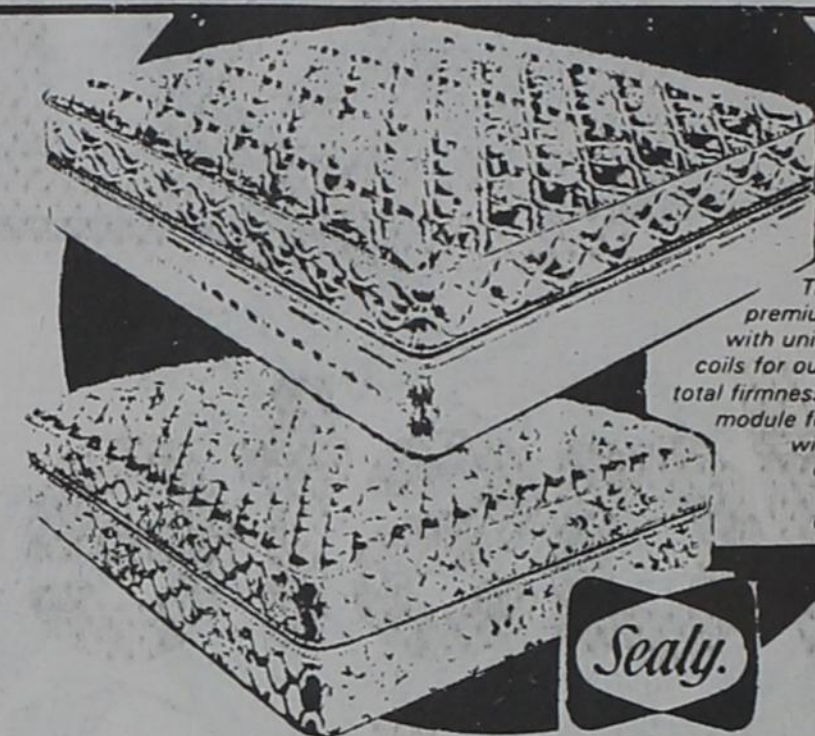

The following rules and regulations are provided for the benefit of the residents of the City of Gorman, as well as the commercial accounts which have chosen to avail themselves of the commercial "hand load" service provided by BFI.

SCHEDULE OF SERVICES

Once Weekly

RATES:

Rates for a residence within the city limits of Gorman and for a business which utilizes the "commercial hand load" option is \$10.00 per month. Special rates have been established for those accounts requiring bins or "dumpster"-type containers.

APPROVED CONTAINERS:

Plastic bags or a receptacle with a capacity of greater than 20 gallons but less than 32 gallons constructed of plastic, metal, or fiberglass, having handles of adequate strength for lifting, and having a tight-fitting lid. The weight of the container and its contents shall not exceed 60 lbs.

PLACEMENT OF CONTAINERS FOR PICKUP:

All containers must be placed next to the curb by 7:00 A.M. on Saturday for pickup by BFI personnel. Alley pickup will no longer be available to residential accounts.

BRUSH:

Tree, shrub, and brush trimmings which are cut in lengths not to exceed four (4) feet and tied securely in bundles of less than 35 pounds in weight will be picked up on the residents regular collection day.

BULKY WASTE:

Bulky waste is defined as waste generated by a single family residence which is too large, heavy or bulky to pickup on regular collection day. (Examples of bulky waste are: trees or tree limbs not cut and bundled, stoves, refrigerators, other large appliances, and materials resulting from remodeling done by the householder. Bulky waste will be limited to one (1) item per month per household placed on the curb. Pickup service for extra items will be provided by BFI, subject to an additional charge.

CONSTRUCTION DEBRIS:

Construction debris is waste building material or waste resulting from construction, remodeling, repair, or demolition operators. Collection service for construction debris will be handled on an individual basis.

Survivors include a daughter, Oleta "Petie" Rieid of Lubbock; three grandchildren; six great-grandchildren; and two great-great-grandchildren.

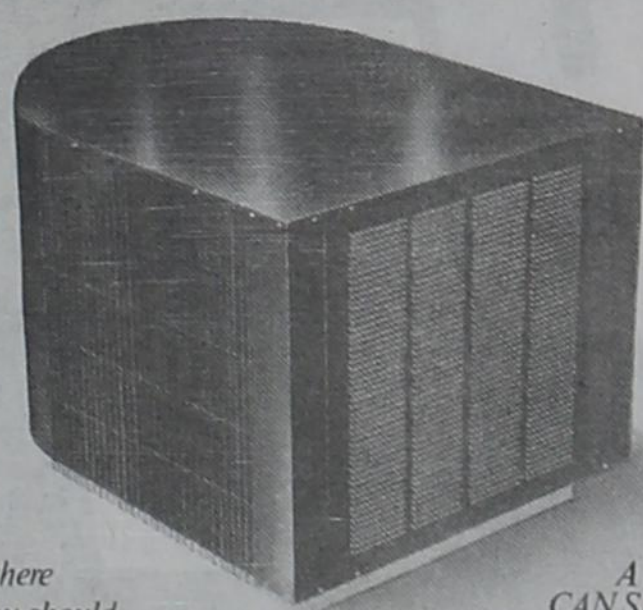

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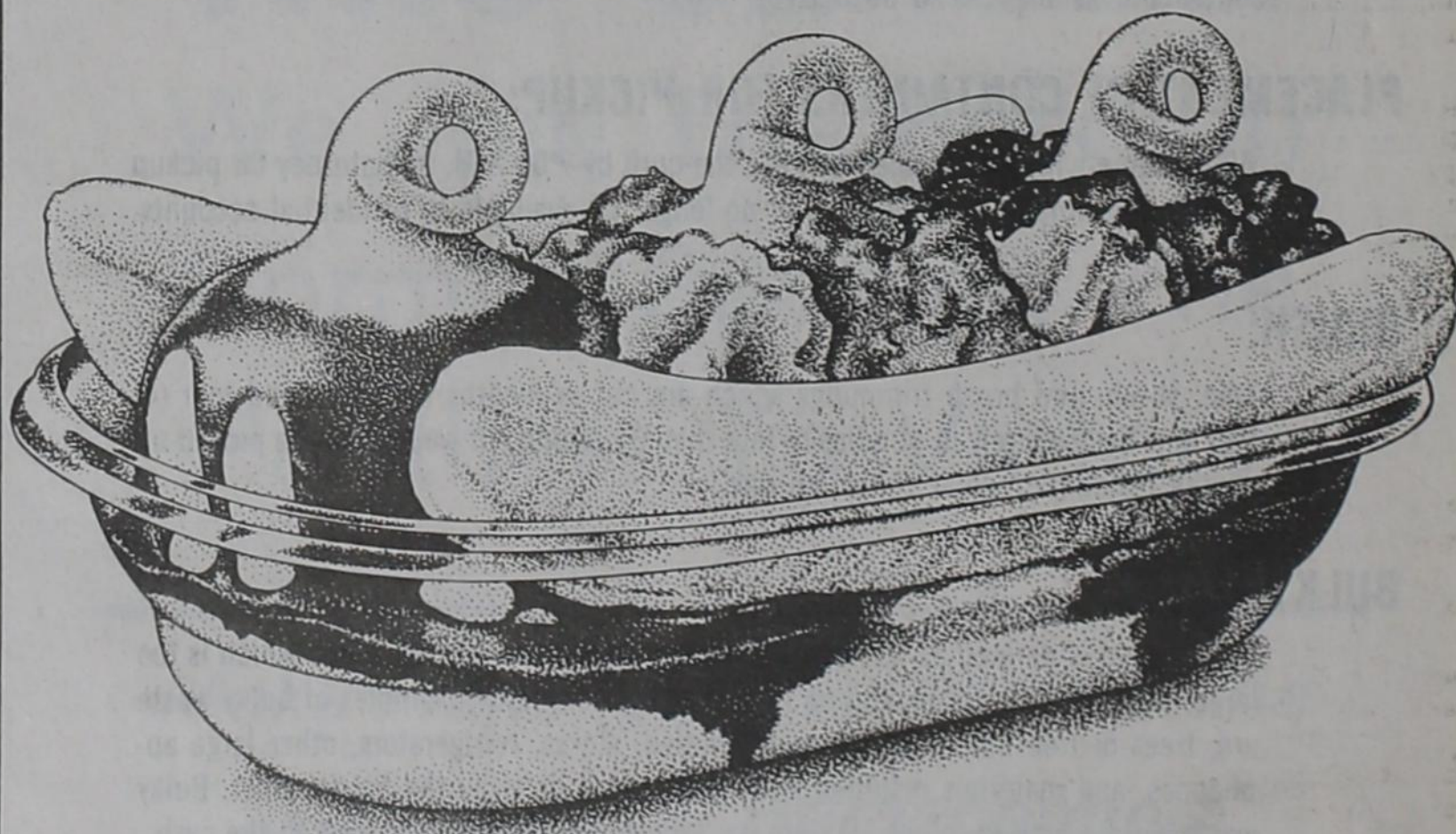
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
