## New EPA Regulations To Force City To Close Land Fill

| dium sized towns across the country. <br> The new regulations will make it very expensive to maintain and rate landfills for the disposal of solid wastes. For a town the of Gorman, which would require a landfill of approximately 20 es minimum, the costs would be beyond the financial resources the city. First, the EPA requires that a bond or escrow fund be ablished to assure compliance with EPA regulations concerning ration and closure of existing landfills. <br> The bond that would be required of the City of Gorman would be he neighborhood of $\$ 250,000.00$. The EPA will also require t the City install monitoring wells surrounding the landfill site, to have tests performed on the wells at regular intervals to ke sure that no pollutants enter our underground water supply. tests are not the usual tests that are performed on water wells. se tests would include extensive (and expensive) tests for vy metals such as arsenic, and tests for herbicides, pesticides, other poisons. <br> addition to these requirements, the EPA will require that we intain the present landfill for thirty years after closing it. This uld consist of monitoring the water supply, landscaping, and ering the site with a sealant, such as clay, to prevent the ination of water from the topside. This alone is very expensive ject. If the City of Gorman attempts to stay in the solid waste posal business, it will require the purchase of a new trash truck, the collected waste will have to be transported to a regional dfill, possibly as far as 75 miles away. In order to transport the ste, we would have to have a truck that will not leak liquids durtransport. <br> All of these things being considered, the City Commission ted looking for less expensive alternatives, and found that the expensive route would be to contract with a private company pickup and disposal of solid waste. One such company, BrownFerris Industries (BFI), proposed to pickup the trash in Gorman to dispose of it in a regional landfill. The cost of this service is ch less than the cost of obtaining, permitting, and operating our landfill, and it is also less expensive than operating our own <br> k for pickup and delivery to a regional landfill. <br> Mr. Len Lyons, a marketing representative from BFI, has met the City Commission and explained that we could close the sent landfill and set up a Citizen Convenience Center to accept d waste from households outside the city limits and those who d to dispose of trash before the scheduled weekly pickup. e will be a charge for disposing of trash at the Convenience tion to offset the costs of maintaining the Station. <br> s it stands right now, it appears that BFI will start picking up <br> sh in Gorman on or about October 1, with the weekly pickup be- <br> on Saturdays. The cost of trash disposal will increase from <br> 25 per residence per month to $\$ 10.00$ per residence per <br> th. This charge will be mandatory for all occupied residences in the City, and it will be billed on the monthly water bill.
