Then with 4:15 lwft in the third period the Panthers got on the scoreboard again with Kevin Hirst rolling out with on a keeper play and racing 59 yards for the score. Chad Campbell booted the extra point and the final score was 33-0, as the fourth quarter was scoreless.

The Big Red defense again had a good night holding the Elks to 116 yards rushing and 87 passing. A lot of the players saw action in this game and all did very well.

Fonville led the Panthers on the ground with 83 yards on 12 carries. Hirst hit for 79 yards on 8 tries. Gary

The Panthers remained undefeated in District 16A with this win and stand at 8-2 on the season and 5 and 0 in district.

This win puts the Panthers in the Bi-District Playoff against the Bronte Longhorns in Coleman at 7:30 p. m. Friday night. Bronte is the runner-up in their district, losing out to Santa Anna, who took first place.

The Bronte team is a very good football team and are consistent winners in their area. The Panthers will have to really be ready for this game as it will determine if they advance into the Regional Round of the playoffs the following week. If the Panthers continue to play at their present pace we look for them to go far in the playoff schedule.

**HOW DO I VOTE SATURDAY?** 

Development Council) An election will be held Saturday,

the 18th of November, whose results will be meaningless. This election was forced on the Commissioners Court of Eastland County by a group of dissident people who did not favor the proposal by the court to issue bonds to purchase land for a State Prison in Eastland County. The election will cost taxpayers several thousand dollars to pay the fee for election judges and clerks.

Strangely enough, the election was forced even though they knew that a prison board decision was to be made on whether or not the state wanted to build a prison in Eastland County before the date of the election. Recent newspaper ads by the no-prison dissidents want the taxpayers to think that a positive vote will give a license to the Commissioners to spend the land cost money elsewhere and without regard to the purpose stated in their resolution. Poppycock. . . These are honorable men who follow through on their purpose and decision.

Yes, the results will be meaningless because current law demands that once absentee voting has begun, the entire procedure must be completed. As has been previously announced, Eastland County was eliminated from consideration as a prison site on November 8th. There is now, no need for money.

The wording of the ballot for the defunct election is as follows: FOR or AGAINST the issuance of \$700,000. certificates of obligation. . . That's

The ballot does not have sufficient information to permit the voter to determine what is the nature of the election, who is conducting the election, what will be done with the money raised if the election is favorable. It seems obvious that the dissidents did not do their homework in designing an appropriate ballot.

For this reason the Eastland County Economic Development Council recommends that citizens vote against the issuance of Certificates of Obligation (bonds) since monies are no longer needed and the results of the election are meaningless. Another view is "why go to the polls at all?".

If one is truly interested as to how all citizens feel about the original proposition of a prison for Eastland County, a clue can be seen in the results of Proposition 8 of the November 7 General Election. This proposition was to determine the will of voters concerning funding additional prisons for the State of Texas. County wide results were 1410 favoring additional prison construction, and 856 against added construction.

In addition to the Proposition 8 vote, a telephone poll was taken throughout Eastland County on November 1st and 2nd by the Texas Field Service to determine how voters feel about a state prison here. Of those who planned to vote, 47.6 percent said they would vote "FOR" the Issuance of Certificates of Obligation to buy land for a state prison in Eastland County. 19.8 percent said they would vote "'AGAINST" such a proposition. The confidence
