Peanut games of all kinds will be held beginning at 2 p. m.

School children peanut poster coloring contest winners will be announced during the afternoon. First, second and third places will be awarded from each class room.

The Charlie Garrett Memorial Library will be dedicated with open house from noon until 3 p. m.

The Peanut Cook-Off judging for the youth division will be at 1 p. m. and the adults judging will be at 2 p. m. in the Senior Citizens Center.

Mozelle Rhymes and Jim Ray Cox were voted as Senior Citizen Queen and King and will ride in the parade.

The Senior Citizens will serve stew, cornbread and cobbler and tea in the Senior Citizens Center beginning at 11 a. m. and continuing to 2 p. m. Price is \$3.

The Lions Club will be serving their famous Lion Burgers and sausage-on-a-stick and cold drinks for \$2. Drinks will be sold separately for 50 cents each.

The PTO will serve ice cream and a group will be selling Mexican food. There will be other food booths available with goodies.

The Bandera Band will provide the music for the free street dance downtown beginning at 9 p. m.

The day will be filled every minute with entertainment. So come to spend the day and evening so you won't miss any of the events including a performance by the Gorman Red Hots gymnnastic group and the Western Shoot-Out, which are so popular each year.

In the Peanut Jumping Contest you must jump in a burlap sack for No. 1. No. 2 you place a peanut between your front teeth where ir can be seen. No. 3 jump from start to finish without cracking or crushing the peanut.

In the Peanut Walk you: No. 1. place a peanut on top of each shoe. No. 2. must have the peanuts on top of each shoe at the finish line. No. 3. if peanut falls off of shoes you must go back to start and start again.

In the Peanut Eating contest there will be a bowl of peanuts placed in front of each contestant to eat. You must not spill or drop any peanuts. The first contestant to eat all the peanuts is the winner. These games are for ages 10 and up.

In other games there will be a Peanut Catch with your mouth. No. 1. throw a peanut up in the air and catch it in your mouth. No. 2. Only one peanut at a time. No. 3. first contestant to catch the peanut is the

In the Peanut Walk: No. 1. At the starting line place a peanut on top of your head. No. 2. Walk to finish line without the peanut falling off of your head. No. 3. The first contestant to get to the finish line without dropping the peanut is the winner.

These will be for ages 6 and under. In the Peanut Spitting Contest: No. 1. Place a peanut in your mouth and spit it as far as you can. Walk to the peanut and stand next to it. Do not move your peanut. The one to spit the peanut the fartherest is the winner.

In the Peanut Hand-off: Place a peanut in a spoon and the peanut must not fall off of spoon. Hold spoon ip your mouth and walk to the next contestant and tilt head and roll the peanut into the other contestants spoon. For ages 7 to 9.

In the Peanut Running Contest: At the starting line hold a peanut in your hand. Run with peanut in your hand and put it in a bucket and run back to the start.

In the Peanut Pop-Up Contest: Place a peanut in your hand and pop it up in the air. The peanut must not drop. The contestant who pops up the peanut the longest is the winner.

# PANTHERS OUTRUN PERRIN 35-12;

The Gorman Panthers opened their 1989 season on a bright note last Friday evening when they traveled to Perrin to take on the Pirates. The opening began with a bang as the Pirates took the kickoff and returned it 85 yards for a touchdown before the fans had gotten settled good. But the Panthers came back and got their game plan going and literally outran the Pirates for a 35 to 12 score.

As stated above the Pirates got on the scoreboard real quick as Kenneth Hughitt took the kickoff on his own 15 and rambled all the way for the score. The kick for point was no good and the score waas 6-0.

The Panthers really woke up with this kickoff return and took the ball on their own 47 and went the distance in 9 plays with Kevin Hirst getting the final 14 yards on a beautiful run with 6:40 left in the period. The drive featured an 11 yard first down run by Gary Browning, a 12 yard first down play by Joe Rodgers and another first down play with a 6 yard gain by Jason Ditmore. Kevin kicked the point after and the Panthers were out front to stay at 7

The Big Red defense got a turnover on the Gorman 14 when they recovered a Perrin fumble when the Pirates were on a good drive. Following a first down play of 4 yards Brandon Gilmore, the leading rusher for the evening got his total going great as he raced 33 yards for a first down. Then following a Panther penalty for holding, Gilmore again broke loose off the right side and raced for 50 more yards to set up the Panthers with a first down at the 10 yard line. Then following runs of 3 and 5 yards, Kevin Hirst again hit paydirt with a 2 yard quarterback sneak for the score with 11:22 left in the second period. Hirst booted the point after and Gorman jumped out to a 14 to 6 lead.

The teams played on fairly even terms the rest of the first half with the score remaining at 14 to 6.

After stopping the Pirates on the first series of downs in the second half with an interception by Jeremy Ditmore, Gilmore got loose again on a marvelous 45 yard scamper and scored with 10:17 left in the third. Hirst added the point after and Gorman led 21 to 6.

After a couple of exchanges, the Panthers got the ball on their own 38 and went the distance in just three plays. After runs of 2 and 9 for a first down at the 50, Kevin Hirst rolled out to his right, broke free and raced for 50 yards for the scoree with 10:20 left in the third. Hirst added the PAT and the Panthers were up 28 to 6.

Following the Gorman score, the Pirates started a drive of their own at the 50. Following a Gorman penalty of 15 yards, the Pirates scored in 9 plays with Jesse Lester getting the final 3 yards with 6:58 left in the fourth period. A pass try for two failed and the score stood at 28 to 12.

But the Panthers were not through yet as they took the ball on their own 47 and scored in 7 plays with Gary Browning getting the final 9 yards on a run with 2:41 left. The drive featured runs of 5, 8, 5, 1, 3, and 9, plus a Pirate penalty of 15. Hirst booted the point after and the final score read 35 to 12.

The Big Red defense had a lot of trouble with the Pirate running game, but tightened up at the right

times to hold the Pirates. Several of the Panthers got some real good tackles and did good jobs most of the

Leading the Panthers on the ground was Brandon Gilmore with 177 yards on 11 carries. Kevin Hirst rambled for 103 yards on 7 keepers. Joe Rodgers rammed for 45 on 9 totes. Gary Browning had 36 on 4 trips. Chuck Fonville had 29 on 3 tries. Jade Warren hit for 25 on just

carries, and Cory Pack ran 1 time for 3 yards.

The Panther offense looked real good on the run, but had a bad night with the passing game with no completions on 4 tries.

This week the Panthers travel to Cisco to take on the Lobos who play in Class 2A. The Lobos are pretty tough this season and the Big Red will have to really be ready if they expect to come out on top in this gridiron battle.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 102 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase the salary of members of the legislature to onefourth of the Governor's salary and increase the salary of the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives to one-half of the Governor's salary. The annual salary of members of the legislature, the Lieutenant Governor, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives is currently \$7,200. Under this provision, the annual salary of the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker would be \$46,716, and the annual salary of members of the legislature would be \$23,358, based on the Governor's current annual salary of \$93,432. The increase for the Speaker and the members of the legislature would take effect when the legislature convenes for its regular session in January 1991. The increase for the Lieutenant Governor would take effect when the term of that office begins in 1991. The salary increase for the Lieutenant Governor would not make members of the legislature ineligible to run for the office of Lieutenant Governor.

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$500 million of Texas water development bonds. The additional bonds are to be used as follows: \$250 million of the bonds are to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition; \$200 million of the bonds are to be used for water quality enhancement projects; and \$50 million of the bonds are to be used for flood control. The legislature may provide that \$100 million be used for subsidized loans and grants to economically distressed areas of the state for water and

### Eastland County prison foes present petition carrying 450 names to panel

By MAYBELLE TROUT Correspondent

EASTLAND - Stormy dialogue matched the thunder and lightning outside the commissioners courtroom Monday as a group of citizens lambasted county commissioners.

Carol Bullock and Jimmy Hughes spoke for a large gathering of county residents that opposes the commissioners' plans to bring a state prison to the county.

The group spilled out of the courtroom, into the hallway and into Court Judge Scott Bailey's office.

Bullock presented resolutions by the city of Carbon and the Carbon school board stating the groups

opposed the prison plan. She also presented a petition with about 450 names to the court.

"A prison would strain resources of schools, law enforcement and hospitals," the petition stated.

Also, community debts incurred would be a burden for the large number of retirees living in the county that wouldn't realize any benefits from it, the petition said.

Bullock asked commissioners to look around and they would find substantial opposition to the prison. She also said residents should have had a vote in the matter, and she accused commissioners of "going around voters to

Commissioners had earlier set an

election for August to give voters a chance to indicate their opinion on a prison.

"An undertaking such as this is for the ballot box," she said.

But commissioners changed their minds when members of the Eastland County Economic Development Group led by Dr. Charles Barnes convinced them that they represented the people and could make decisions for them.

At that time, commissioners signed a resolution supporting the proposal.

The resolution promised "to issue necessary certificate of obligation or other instruments of financing to fund the purchase of land."

Several people reminded commissioners that the industrial group had promised the land would be paid for by donations and pledges.

John Berry, district manager for Texas Utility Electric Co., spoke in defense of a prison. He told commissioners if Eastland county is selected for a prison site "we'll have 45 days from selection until we have to turn the deed of the land over to them."

"We are only asking for the county's credit. It may take years for pledges to come in," Berry said.

No pledges will be sought until word is received that Eastland County has a prison, Berry said.
