## PRISON IS NOT A TAX ISSUE

Contrary to what non-supporters of the proposed state prison are saying
about costs and taxes the purchase of land for a prison site should not increase about costs and taxes the puprchase of land for a prison site should not increase
taxes, said a local auditor who keeps records of county expenditures. The land, taxes, said a local auditor who keeps records of county expenditures. The land,
located in the Flatwood Community is scheduled to cost approximately $\$ 650,000.00$ including costs of right-of-way for one mile of an enlarged Farm-to-Market road. If paid for over a ten year period of time, the payback to bond holders would be about $\$ 104,000.00$ per year from revenues currently yom-
ing into the county treasury. Nine years ago the county borrowed, using bond ing into the county treasury. Nine years ago the county borrowed, using a bond
issue, $\$ 680,000.00$ to buy a new county jail and the annual payments on this issue, $\$ 880,000.00$ to buy a new county jail and the annual payments on this
debt have averaged $\$ 130,000.00$ per year. The final payment on the county deil will be made next spring before any payments would be due for bonds used to purchase land for a state prison. Thus, it is seen that the actual outlay of
money by the county would be $\$ 26,000.00$ per year less next year than for money by the county would be $\$ 26,000.00$ per year less next year than for
the past nine years, making it possible to actually decrease taxes if desired by the past nine years, making it possibe to actually docrease taxas in desired by
county authorities. Certainly there is no reason to increase taxes due to the land purchase.
Some people also claim that the Eastland Countr Water District will expend
millions of dollars to provide water service to the prison milions of doliars to provide water service to the prison and that local tax-
payers will pay the bill. This is also false information. The District will indeed borrow through revenue bond issue, $\$ 1.8$ million dollars which will be paid back to the District over a twenty five year period of time by the prison system
through a contract for purchase of water. Actual costs to other non prison through a contract for purchase of water. Actual costs to other non prison
users on the system is zero and certainly no increased taxes will be involved in paying for the prison water system. The proposed prison should be looked upon as if it were any other customer albeit there is an extra long, extra long line to this customer who will use water at a cost exceeding that of local
patrons. There will be considerable advantage to the people living in the vicinipatrons. There will be considerable advantage to the people living in the vicini-
ty of the prison: adequate water and meters could be made available due to the reworking and retrofitting of water processing equipment and increased
city of water lines in the area.
The same basic principles apply to the expenditure of $\$ 2.7$ million dollars to
supply a sewage system for prison use - Te prison is a supply a sewage system for prison use - The prison is a customer and will pay
its own way by paying the City of Eastland its montly charge for sewer service. its own way by paying the City of Eastland its montly charge for sewer service.
In the twenty five years of payback for a bond issued loan the local citizens will pay nothing for service to to te prison. After twenty five year payback, local
citizens in Eastland will inherit a multimillion dollar sewer system which has citizens in Eastland will inherit a multimillion dollar sewer syste
cost them nothing. The same can be said of the water system

These two examples of water and sewer are no different than the situation being experienced by local private utility companies. Together they will issue
$\$ 812,000.00$ dollars of bonds which will enable them to construct electricity, gas, telephone and television lines for service to the prison at no charge to their gas, telephone and television lines for service to the prison at no charge to their
other customers. In 10-25 years all utility lines will have been paid for from revenues collected from use of these utilities by the prison.
To say there is not cost to local people is not quite correct. The prison of which we as citizens are all part owners will pay using taxes from all people in
the state. This is necessary because criminals are in our midst and we must protect ourselves by putting them in jail. The advantage of a local prison in our
county is that 800 or so jobs will be created here county is that 800 or so jobs will be created here rather than in counties 200 miles away. These jobs are $p$
of our abilities to pay taxes.
