The Panthers wasted little time showing their strength on both offense and defense when they traveled to Cross Plains on Friday night for another 16A District tilt as they moved out to a 29 point advantage at the half. But in the last half the Buffaloes started to get things going and scored in the third and fourth periods to pull within 11 points of the Panthers.

Gorman began their first drive on the Cross Plains 49 and scored in just five plays with Kevin Hirst rambling for 20 yards and the score with 10:12 left in the period. The drive featured 8 and 6 yard runs respectively by Brandon Gilmore. Then after another 7 yarder by Gilmore and a 7 yard run by Chuck Fonville to set the Panthers up on the Buffs 20, Hirst got the TD. Chad Campbell booted the point after and the score was 7-0.

The Panthers came right back just over three minutes later with another score when Chuck Fonville scored on a 5 yard run with 7:55 left. This drive was set up after a fumble on the Buff 38. The drive featured a 15 yard run by Gilmore and a 10 yard scamper by Hirst. Jeremy Ditmore ran for the two pointer and the score rose to 15 to 0.

Then with just 1:06 left in the quarter, the Panthers scored again with Hirst rambling for 55 yards on a beautiful run for the score. The drive started on the Gorman 28 and the drive took just 5 plays. Campbell booted the point after and Gorman was out front 22-0.

The Big Red defense then made a fantastic goal line stand at their one yard line after the Buffs had a 57 yard drive going. After taking over at the one the Panthers had a long drive of their own going the distance in 8 plays with Brandon Gilmore ripping

off the final 36 yards for the score with 2:55 left in the half. The drive featured runs of 34 yards by Hirst and an 18 yard scamper by Gary Browning. Campbell added the point after and the Panthers were controlling the game with a 29-0 score.

Then following the halftime intermission the Buffs came out ready to play and took the ball on their own 42 yard line and drove 58 yards in 11 plays for the score with 6:32 left in the third period. Jody Brown got the final yard on a run and Deron Duffy ran for the two pointer to put Cross Plains on the board for a 29-8 score.

The Panthers then came right back with a drive of their own, starting on their 41 yard line and scoring in one big blast as Brandon Gilmore took the handoff and thrilled the Panther fans on a fantastic 59 yard run just 17 seconds after the Buff score. The kick for point after was no good and the score went to 35 to 8.

Cross plains scored again with 4:45 left in the game when Jody Brown ran for the final 4 yards. The drive covered 68 yards in 10 plays. Duffy again added the two pointer and the score rose to 35 to 16.

Then with just 34 seconds left in the game Duffy ran in from 3 yards out to cap a 32 yard drive following a Panther fumble for a score. Jody Brown ran for the two pointer and the Buffs pulled to within 11 points with 34 seconds left.

The Buffs tried an on-side kick but the Panthers got the ball and killed the clock to insure the win.

Brandon Gilmore was the leading rusher for Gorman with 139 yards on 11 carries. Kevin Hirst was a close second with 122 yards on 9 tries. Gary Browning had 22 yards on 2 runs. Chuck Fonville got 16 on 5 totes. Jason Ditmore had 11 on 4 tries. Jade Warren ran twice for 9 yards. Chris Scitern ran once for 5 yards, and Cory Pack lost 4 yards on one keeper.

The Panther defense did a great job of holding the big running back, Jody Brown in the first half, but faltered a little in the last half and Brown wound up with 224 yards on 44 carries. This Brown is a fine running back.

Gorman will host the Lometa Hornets in the homecoming game Friday night in another important District 16A battle. The Hornets and Panthers always have a tough battle and this one will be no different. The Big Red have a few injuries that have hurt their performance, but the whole team has pulled together and did great. And to add to their woes, Gilmore received a shoulder injury in practice and will be out indefinitely. The full extent of the injury will not be known until late Wednesday when he sees the physician again. This will be another adjustment the Big Red will have to make.

We feel that the homecoming crowd will give the Panthers a big boost and they will come through with a win.

PTO COUNTRY FAIR SLATED NOVEMBER 11

If you missed the State Fair, now is your chance to bake your best pie, stir up some peanut brittle, or enter those preserves, peas, or pears, and still win a blue ribbon. If you can stitch up a cute quilt, or crochet an attractive afghan, bring it in. If your cooking is creative or your art work is unique, there's an "original creations" category for you.

It's not a county fair but a harvest time PTO Country Fair with pets and projects, and baked goods and bingo on Nov. 11 beginning at 12 p.m. at Gorman Elementary.

Fair categories include youth and adult divisions for baked and canned goods, art work, sewing and hand-crafts, decorated T-shirts, wood crafts, pets and farm animals, and original creations (almost anything goes). Student project divisions include science, literary, computer, or other projects by Gorman School students.

The "Best Beard" and the "Best Homemade Bonnet" of the day will take a home baked cake.

Throughout the afternoon fair entries and winners will be on display while elementary school classes will operate carnival games, cake walk and bingo.

At 5 p.m. an auction will be held to include any outside donated items as well as donations from any of the art, crafts, bake show or project entrants who wish to donate their entry.

Beard growing contestants must check in and sign an entry form with Ina Scitern at Movies Galore be-

tween 12:30 and 7 p.m. Deadline for entry is Saturday, October 28th. Entry fee is \$1.

Bonnets may be old or new, but should be homemade. Entry fee is \$1 and deadline to enter is Nov. 9.

Entry fees are \$1 for youth divisions and \$2 for adult divisions. Deadline for project and fair entries is Nov. 9. Entry forms may be secured from any PTO member or school child or by calling 734-2610.

Booth space for commercial arts, crafts, or other exhibitors is available for \$10 by contacting Gorman PTO, Box 502, Gorman 76454 or calling 734-2610.

Food concessions will be limited to and sponsored by Gorman PTO.

PTO (Parent-Teacher Organization) was reinstated in Gorman in 1980. PTO is different from PTA in that it is a local organization with no national dues or affiliation. Through fun raising projects such as athletic tournaments, cookbook sales, the Campbell Soup Label program, fall festivals and others, the PTO has secured some of the extra library materials, teaching aids, and additions to school facilities that enhance the educational environment in Gorman Schools. New playground equipment is the goal for 1989-90 fund raising.

Although primarily an organization of parents and educators, PTO can benefit from the involvement of parents, grandparents, neighbors, or friends. Gorman PTO invited you to submit your fair or project entries; grow a beard; make a bonnet; or just come by and join the fun.

PRISON BOND VOTE SET FOR NOVEMBER 18

Eastland County voters will decide if \$700,000 worth of certificates of obligation bonds should be issued to buy land if the county is selected as a site for a state prison.

County Commissioners on Monday set the election date for Saturday November 18th.

Nancy Trout, Tax Assessor-Collector, reported 1034 signatures were collected and 288 were incorrect, with 746 being accepted. She certified that the 550 signatures on a petition were sufficient to establish a bond election.

October 30th and end November 14th.

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PRISON IS NOT A TAX ISSUE

Contrary to what non-supporters of the proposed state prison are saying about costs and taxes the purchase of land for a prison site should not increase taxes, said a local auditor who keeps records of county expenditures. The land, located in the Flatwood Community is scheduled to cost approximately \$650,000.00 including costs of right-of-way for one mile of an enlarged Farm-to-Market road. If paid for over a ten year period of time, the payback to bond holders would be about \$104,000.00 per year from revenues currently coming into the county treasury. Nine years ago the county borrowed, using a bond issue, \$680,000.00 to buy a new county jail and the annual payments on this debt have averaged \$130,000.00 per year. The final payment on the county jail will be made next spring before any payments would be due for bonds used to purchase land for a state prison. Thus, it is seen that the actual outlay of money by the county would be \$26,000.00 per year less next year than for the past nine years, making it possible to actually decrease taxes if desired by county authorities. Certainly there is no reason to increase taxes due to the land purchase.

Some people also claim that the Eastland County Water District will expend millions of dollars to provide water service to the prison and that local taxpayers will pay the bill. This is also false information. The District will indeed borrow through revenue bond issue, \$1.8 million dollars which will be paid back to the District over a twenty five year period of time by the prison system through a contract for purchase of water. Actual costs to other non prison users on the system is zero and certainly no increased taxes will be involved in paying for the prison water system. The proposed prison should be looked upon as if it were any other customer albeit there is an extra long, extra long line to this customer who will use water at a cost exceeding that of local patrons. There will be considerable advantage to the people living in the vicinity of the prison: adequate water and meters could be made available due to the reworking and retrofitting of water processing equipment and increased capacity of water lines in the area.

The same basic principles apply to the expenditure of \$2.7 million dollars to supply a sewage system for prison use - The prison is a customer and will pay its own way by paying the City of Eastland its monthly charge for sewer service. In the twenty five years of payback for a bond issued loan the local citizens will pay nothing for service to the prison. After twenty five year payback, local citizens in Eastland will inherit a multimillion dollar sewer system which has cost them nothing. The same can be said of the water system.

These two examples of water and sewer are no different than the situation being experienced by local private utility companies. Together they will issue \$812,000.00 dollars of bonds which will enable them to construct electricity, gas, telephone and television lines for service to the prison at no charge to their other customers. In 10 - 25 years all utility lines will have been paid for from revenues collected from use of these utilities by the prison.

To say there is not cost to local people is not quite correct. The prison of which we as citizens are all part owners will pay using taxes from all people in the state. This is necessary because criminals are in our midst and we must protect ourselves by putting them in jail. The advantage of a local prison in our county is that 800 or so jobs will be created here rather than in counties 200 miles away. These jobs are permanent creations which can materially affect all of our abilities to pay taxes.

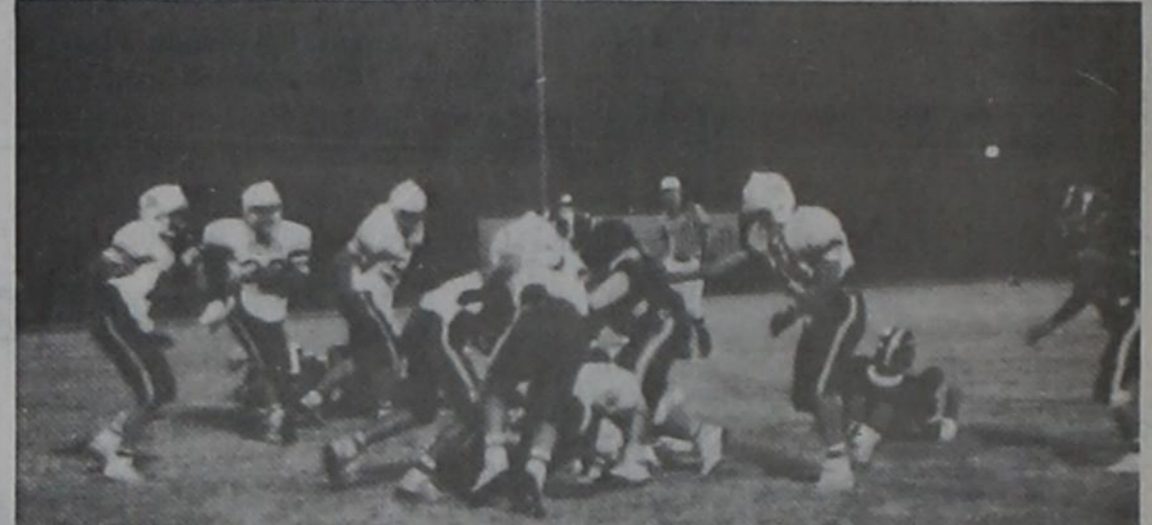

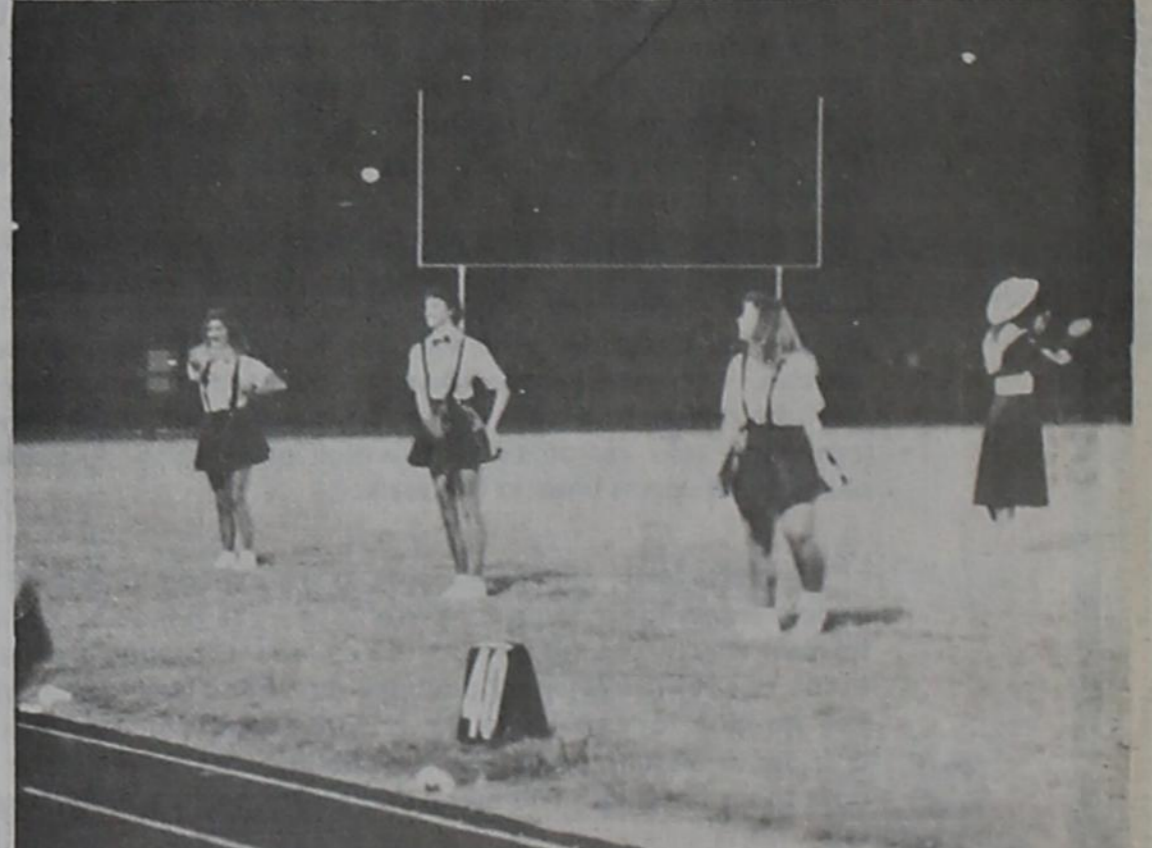
