Those of us who helped put it together hope so, and if hard work and many meetings and planning sessions could produce such success, it was.

It's always a joy of the Exes in Gorman to plan and prepare for the homecoming for classmates.

The day began as registration got underway at 9:30 a. m., and before the morning ended approximately 129 exes had arrived for coffee and chit-chat with classmates.

At noon everyone was invited to the gym for a sandwich luncheon hosted by the Gorman Exes.

Homecoming Committee president, Lana Sharp, presided at the business session at 1:30 p. m. in the high school auditorium. (Really, she was working all over the place all day, everywhere at once). Rev. Ron Carroll, pastor of First Baptist Church gave the invocation, followed by Coach Larry Nabors, who gave the welcome address.

It was clever, humorous and philosophical being a football coach as he had to mention football and he had some clever comments about some of the former Gorman football players. (He had heard comments from some of the exes prior to the meeting).

The football team of 1928 was honored. They sat in a special place and were recognized. Of the twenty members, present were Wayne Clements of Dalhart, wearing his captain's sweater of grey and gold; L. G. (Junious) Leazar of Arlington; Jimmy Morris of Gorman; and Elmer Creager of Corpus Christi.

Beryl Rodgers, a former cheerleader, was asked to come to the front of the audience and give one of her famous yells she used when she was a cheerleader.

Jackie Frasier read the minutes of last year's meeting.

Roll call of classes was taken and the Class of 1964, with ten present, had the largest number present.

Roy Sullivan of Sulphur, Okla., Class of 1921 was recognized as the oldest ex, and Billie Jo Hagood Marble of Jason, Calif., Class of 1940, traveled the farthest to attend homecoming. They were presented gift boxes of peanuts, compliments of Birdsong Peanuts.

Candidates for Coming Home Queen were nominated as follows: Gaynell Thomas Hicks of Covina, Calif.; Mary Charles Hagood Featherhoof of West Columbia; Mary Laminack Eison of Bridgeport; Bob Love of Dallas; and Minnie Legg (impersonated by Karen Guthery) who entertained the Exes with her humorous antics.

The election ended in a tie between Gaynell and Mary. Gaynell won in the runoff election, and Bob protested the election, insisting the election was rigged.

Winner of the door prizes were Lottie Morris, Billie Jo Marble, Georgia Clements and Wayne Clements.

The "Hat" was passed to collect funds to finance the homecoming.

Woodrow Browning conducted a memorial service for twenty-one exes who had died this past year.

The Panthers thrilled the Homecoming crowd with an overwhelming victory over the Lometa Hornets Friday night by a 44 to 6 margin. And most of the scoring was done on big plays, eating up yardage in big chunks. The District 16A win kept the Panthers on top of the standings in district.

The crowd were brought to their feet on the initial kickoff as Matt Jones took a handoff on the kickoff play and raced for 80 yards almost untouched and lit up the scoreboard with just 15 seconds off the clock. The kick for point failed and the score was 6-0.

Gorman held the Hornets on their first possession and got the ball of their own 47 and proceeded to drive the distance in just five plays with Kevin Hirst rambling in from 11 yards out with 8:03 left in the period. The drive featured runs of 8 and 10 yards by Jason Ditmore. Then Gary Browning tacked on another 10 yarder and Robby Hand ran for 9 more yards before setting up the run for the score from the Hornet 11. Again the kick for point failed and Gorman led 12 to 0.

Then on the next Hornet possession, the Big Red defense came into focus as Jason Ditmore stepped in front of a Hornet receiver, intercepted a pass and returned it 60 yards for a score with 7:43 left in the first period. A pass to Jason Ditmore added the two pointer and Gorman led 20 to 0.

But the Panthers were not through scoring in the first period as the Big Red Defense held the Hornets and took the ball on their own 13 after the punt and went the distance in just two plays with Robby Hand dazzling the crowd with a fantastic run of 70 yards for the TD with 4:03 left. On the first play the Panthers were penalized back to their 13. From there Kevin Hirst broke free and raced for 17 yards and a first down at the Gorman 30. Then came the TD run by Robby Hand. Chad Campbell kicked the point after and the Panthers were out front to stay at 27-0.

The game was fairly even the rest of the half until just 3 seconds remained when the Panthers tried a 20 yard field goal, which Chad Campbell booted through the uprights for 3 points and a 30 to 0 lead at halftime intermission.

During the halftime activities at intermission Tiffany Stephens was crowned Homecoming Queen. Julie Casey was presented a bouquet as Football Sweetheart by Chuck Fonville. Erja Taskinen was given a bouquet of roses by Band Beau Gary Browning as the Band Sweetheart. Erja is an exchange student from Finland who is living with the Corky Browns.

After the activities at halftime the Panthers came out and again showed their ability to hold the Hornets. On the second Hornet possession, Todd Brown stepped in and took a Hornet fumble in the air and raced for 50 yards for the score to make the score 36 to 0. After the extra point by Campbell, the margin was 37-0.

Following the score the Hornets took their second possession with a turnover by the Panthers on the Gorman 4 yard line and scored in two plays with Michael Jasso going the final 3 yards with 58 seconds left in the third. The run for two points failed and the score was 37-6.

Then with just 31 seconds left in the game Gorman added another score with Robby Hand getting loose for a nice 31 yard scamper for the TD with 1:53 left. This followed a Hornet fumble on the Lometa 31, and Robby took it in on the first play. Campbell added the point after and the final score was 44 to 6.

The rushing honors this week goes to Robby Hand who had 118 yards on just 6 carries. Jason Ditmore had 46 on 5 tries. Gary Browning got 26 on 3 trips. Cory Pack managed 19 on 7 keepers. Chuck Fonville had 16 on 3 totes. Chris Scitern had 11 on 2 tries. Rajee Patel got 11 on 3 tries. Jade Warren had 10 on 3 tries. Kevin Hirst wound up with 28 yards on just

2 carries in doing limited duty in the one-sided ballgame.

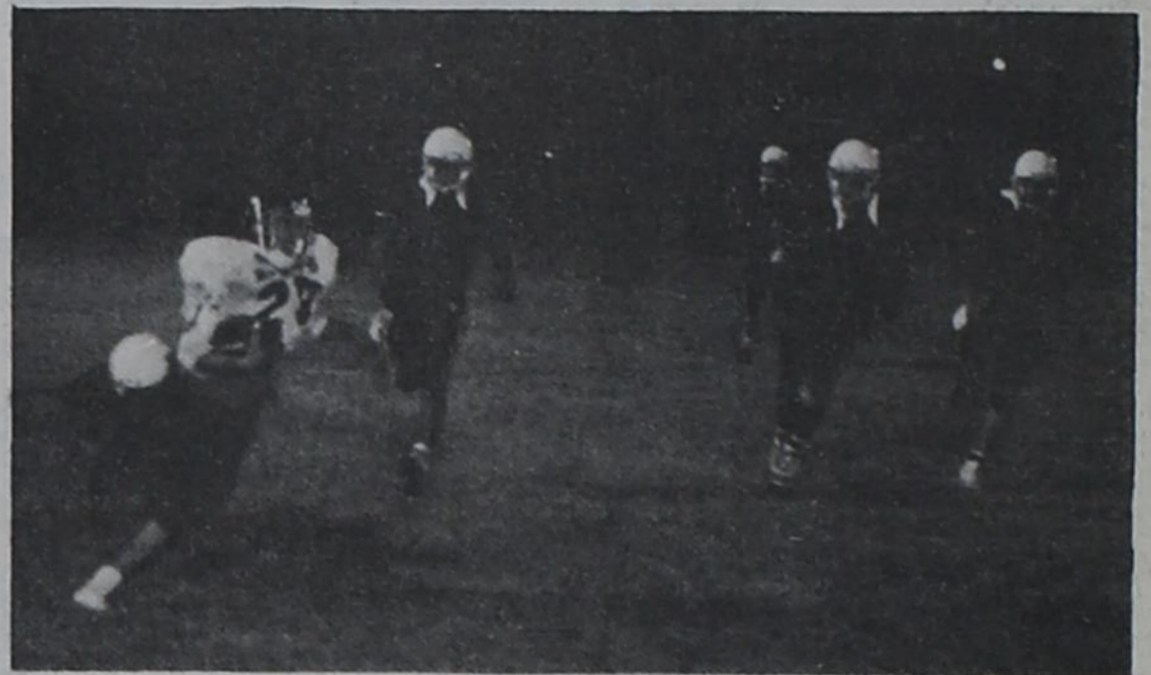
The entire Big Red defense did a great job all evening long of holding the Hornet offense to just 116 total yards.

SHORT LIST ON PRISON SITES TO BE RELEASED NOVEMBER 8TH

The following is a letter received by the Eastland County Economic Development Council on Monday. Dear Dr. Barnes: The purpose of this letter is to advise you that November 6, 1989 at noon is the deadline for making any further changes, enhancements, additions or deletions to your prison site proposal. All changes must be received in my office by the deadline in order to be considered. On November 8, 1989 the Board subcommittees will meet in the Reagan State Office Building in Austin to develop the final short list. The site committee (North) who reviewed your site will meet at 9 a. m. in Room 101. These rooms are of limited size and no public testimony is planned. The Board is asking that

communities limit the number of persons in attendance to no more than four to five persons who are familiar with the proposal specifics. There will be no public testimony at the November 8, 1989 meeting. However, questions may be asked to community representatives regarding their proposal. If selected as a finalist, the communities will be given an opportunity to express their support through registering their attendance on November 13, when final presentations will be made. Your cooperation in this matter is sincerely appreciated. Sincerely, William Barry Director of Management Services The Eastland County Economic

The Board feels that the most important item right now is the upcoming Proposition for purchasing certificates of obligation to finance the purchase of land for the prison site coming up November 18th. It is imperative that this election for financing the purchase of land pass by a large majority, and the council urges an overwhelming majority vote on this issue. With the poor economic conditions of the county, the folks in Eastland County feel that this \$65 million facility is the most important opportunity we have to help boost the economy of our county and stop the decline of our entire county.

Students and teachers will also be able to communicate with other schools through X-Change's unique computer conferencing program. "We are very excited to be able to provide such valuable educational programming to American stu-

dents," said J. C. Sparkman, TCI's executive vice president and chief operating officer. "TCI has already spent several million dollars to wire more than 70 percent of the schools in our service areas," he explained. "We are committed to wiring all schools that can be economically reached by cable." To bring the cable programming into the schools, TCI, the nation's largest cable operator, will provide internal wiring to a school's library or resource center, and will offer assistance in hooking up a VCR and television monitor. DRUG BULLETING RELEASED BY EASTLAND CO. CRIMESTOPPERS

The following "Drug Bulletin" was brought in by an Eastland County Crimestoppers board member. It is from the Dallas Police Department, and we want to share it with you. A form of tattoo called the "Blue Star" is being sold to school children. It is a small sheet of paper containing blue stars the size of a pencil eraser. Each star is soaked with LSD. Each star can be removed and placed in the mouth. The LSD can be absorbed through the skin simply by handling the paper. There are also brightly colored paper tabs resembling postage stamps that have pictures of Superman, butterflies, clowns, Mickey Mouse and other Disney characters on them. These stamps are packed in a red cardboard box wrapped in foil. This is a new way of selling acid by appealing to young children. A young child could happen upon these and have a fatal "trip". It is also learned that little children could be given a free tattoo by other children who want to have some fun or by others cultivating new customers (without the child's knowledge). A stamp called "Red Pyramid" is also being distributed along with "Microdot" in various colors and another kind of "Window Pane" which has a grid that can be cut out. These are laced with drugs! Please advise your community and children about these drugs. If you or your child get any of the above, do not handle them barehanded! Contact your local police dept. These are known to react very quickly and some are laced with strychnine. Symptoms: hallucinations, severe vomiting, uncontrolled laughter, mood changes and change in body temperature. 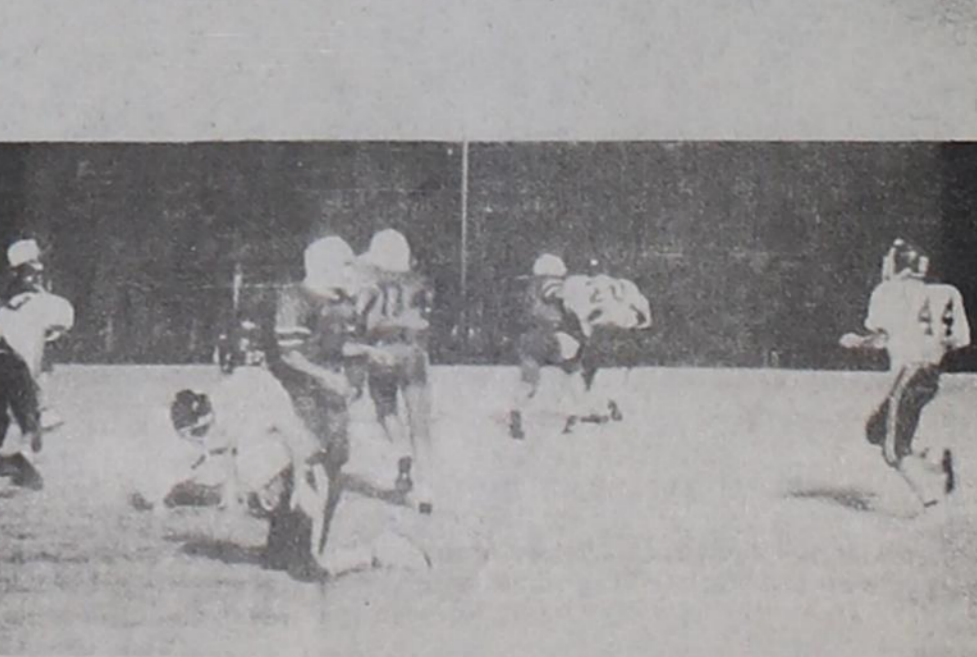
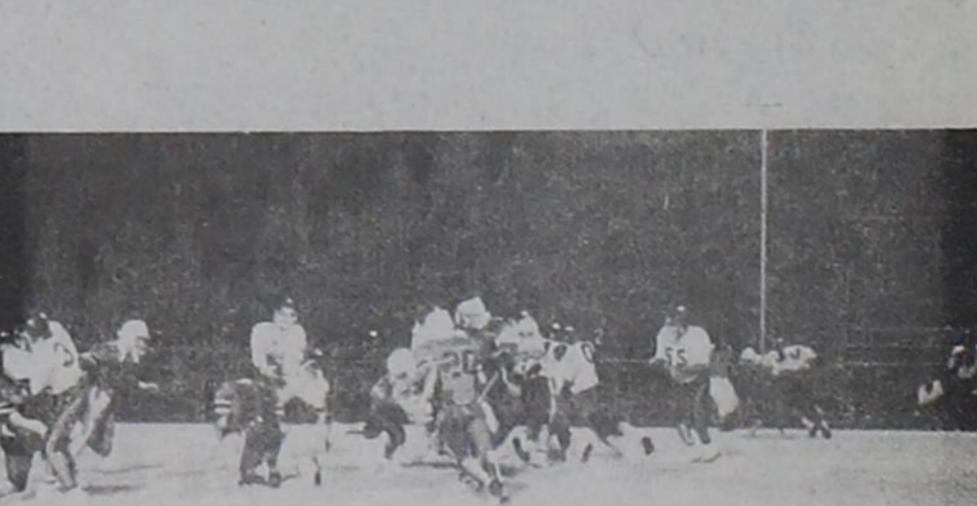
Stenholm Appointed To Leadership Position

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX) was one of two conservative Southern Democrats appointed to a leadership position in the House of Representatives on October 25th. Stenholm was appointed Deputy Whip for the 101st Congress by House Speaker Tom Foley (D-WA), Majority Leader Richard Gephardt (D-MO) and Majority Whip William Gray (D-PA). The Congressman was one of three new appointees. Conservative Democratic Forum member Butler Derrick (D-SC), who attended Stenholm's Funday in Stamford in September, and Congressman Esteban Torres (D-CA), were the other two appointees. "I am honored to be brought to the table with other Democratic Leaders," said Stenholm. "This position will improve my opportunities to bring a new, conservative voice to the negotiating table and I will be more directly involved in the early stages of legislation." Stenholm and his fellow Deputy Whips will be used as a sounding board by the leadership. There are a total of 12 Deputy Whips. Stenholm, Derrick and Congressman Tom Beville (D-AI), a current Deputy Whip, all belong to the House's Conservative Democratic Forum (CDF). CDF is a 51-member group founded in 1981 by Stenholm, who remains its Coordinator. "I am on the bottom rung of the leadership ladder," said Stenholm. "But that's where the ladder begins and I believe I can have considerably more input in this new position." The House Leadership consists of the House Speaker, Majority Leader, Majority Whip, Caucus Chairman, Caucus Vice-Chairman, Chief Deputy Whip and 12 Deputy Whips. Stenholm explained there remains a good chance that a conservative may be appointed to an even higher leadership position in December or January. At this point the exact position and the name of the appointee are unknown. —GP—

Proposition 17 Supported By Firemen

Special legislation passed by the 71st Legislature will give Texas voters the opportunity to have direct input into life safety and protection input into life safety and property protection for years to come. The special law creates an emergency fund for the fire service of Texas and does so without an increase in taxes or fees. Texas voters will decide the issue on November 7, in the general election.

The proposed constitutional amendment, Proposition No. 17 on the ballot authorizes the creation of the fund which can be used by all fire departments in the state, paid or volunteer, large or small. The fund may be used only for training and equipment and will be distributed on a priority basis with the most urgent needs being served first.

The fund will be administered by a board under the direction of the State Fire Marshall's office. The seven member board, appointed by the governor, will include fire members representing the fire service and two members representing the general public and will serve without pay.

If approved by a majority of Texas voters, the fund will address the serious problem of funding for the almost 2,000 fire departments in the state. Fire departments across the state will be eligible to apply for low interest loans or grants in an effort to address unnecessary deaths and injuries as well as the needless loss of property due to fire which could be prevented with better training and

DPS Seeking Applications For DPS Troopers

Graduates of the DPS Academy will be assigned either to the Highway Patrol or Driver's License Service. Promotional opportunities eventually will be available in the Criminal Law Enforcement division, which includes the Texas Rangers, Narcotics Service, Criminal Intelligence Service and Motor Vehicle Theft Service.

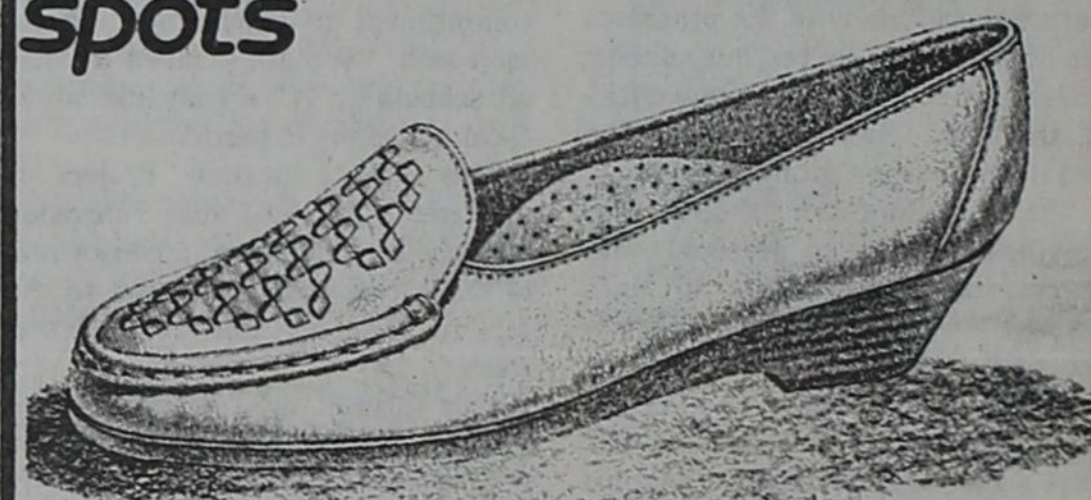
