## PANTHERS END SEASON IN THRILLER IN AREA PLAYOFF

The Gorman Panthers ended their great season on Friday night at Eastland's Maverick Stadium in a thriller as they took on the much heavier and state ranked Baird Bears and really gave the Bears all they wanted until the final minute of the game. But when the final gun sounded the Panthers came out on the short end of a 23 to 20 score in the Area Playoff game. This gave the Panthers a 9-3 record for the season and is a tremendous season for the Big Red as they were picked to finish fourth in district at the beginning of the season.

The Bears advance to the Regional Round of the playoffs this Friday night against Spur in Sweetwater.

The Bears hit the scoreboard first following a punt that pinned the Bears at their own one foot line. They drove the 99 plus yards in 19 plays with Russell Joy getting the honors from 1 yard out with just 43 seconds left in the first period. Greg Bryant added the point after and Baird led 7-0.

The two teams played on fairly even terms the rest of the half with the 7-0 score holding at halftime.

Then in the third quarter Baird took the ball on their own 10 and in one big blast Burke Robinson broke loose up the middle and raced 90 yards untouched for the score with 8:42 left. Bryant hit the PAT and Baird led 14-0.

Then the fireworks started happening for the Panthers when Chuck Fonville intercepted an errant pass try by the Baird punter after the snap went over his head. He went into the end zone to retrieve the ball and tried to pass the ball out. Fonville intercepted the pass at about the 7 yard line and ran in for the score with 5:35 left in the third. The run for two points failed and the score was 14 to 6.

Then again the Bears made another miscue when a pass try was intercepted at the Baird 35 by Brandon Gilmore, who returned it for the go-ahead touchdown with 10:29 left in the game. The kick try failed and the score was Gorman 20 and Baird 14.

Then the Bears started a drive of their own at the Bear 46 and went the distance in 7 plays with the aid of a Gorman 15 yard penalty. Burke Robinson got the final yard with 7:22 left in the game. The kick was no good and the score was knotted at 20-20.

The Panthers could not move the despite two fine passes for first downs before turning the ball over to the Bears. Baird took the ball on their own 31 with about 5 minutes to play and drove to the Panther 24 yard line and with about 2 minutes left on the clock, when Greg Bryant booted the go-ahead field goal of 34 yards to put the Bears up 23 to 20.

The Panthers took the ball on their own 30 and completed a couple of passes but could not get another completion and the Bears held the Panthers on fourth down and took the ball over on the 50 yard line and ran out the clock to preserve the victory.

The Big Red didn't ever really get their running game going as the tough Baird defense held them to only 17 yards on the ground and 42 in the air. The big, hefty Baird line gave the smaller Panthers a tough time all night. But one thing for sure - the Bears were glad to get out of this game alive as the Panthers took advantage of the breaks and almost pulled out a victory despite their lack of offense. The Panthers have nothing to hang their heads about for this season as they did a very outstanding job all the way despite some very big injuries to key players. But it always seemed that someone just came in and took care of the problem and played top notch football. So you see, the Mighty Panthers are to be congratulated to the very top notch for their fantastic season and winning attitude. We congratulate the players, coaches, fans, cheerleaders, and just everyone for helping to make this season great for the Panthers.
