The penalty for not meeting these requirements is not to the city, but to every insurance payer in the city because the key rate on our insurance will go up.



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

# AND LIVESTOCK REPORTS NEEDED

AUSTIN - Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will be contacting farmers and rancgers across the state to help set the 1989 planted acreage estimates and midyear livestock inventories.

"Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when makinf their production and marketing plans for 1989," state stastician Dennis Findley explained.

"The continued dry weather this spring and the changes in the national farm pogram may have altered producers' plans for 1989, and this survey will be the first accurate measure of midyear livestock inventories and acreage estimates," Findley added.

Individual reports will be combined with other reports to set state estimates. Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators,


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#### **Homemakers Class** Meet In Butler Home



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## District Attorney **Walton Testifies** At Washington

Emory Walton, District Attorney of Eastland County, testified in Washington, D. C. April 26th on Health Care and Insurance Sales Abuse before a group from the House of Representatives Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Walton said that apparently a Consumer's Union organization in Austin had recommended that he attend this hearing, mainly because he had done quite a bit of prosecution work on insurance sales fraud.

Walton flew from D/FW Airport to Washington on April 25th and went to the Rayburn House office next morning at 9:30. He had an opportunity to visit briefly with the Chairman of the panel, Rep. John D. Dingell (D of Michigan) and other panel members.

The room was filled with an interested audience, Walton said. Panel members spoke for five minutes each. The Chairman opened the floor for questions. The whole meeting lasted over two hours.

When Walton's turn came he identified his county and told briefly of his work. He said that all of his experience involving possible fraud or swindling of the elderly by insurance health care involved out-of county, door-to-door sales persons.

"I have never received a complaint of possible fraud or swindling involving local independent agents or local salesmen of health care insurance," he said.

He listed mass mailings to local addresses, exchange of prospective customers lists, flyers in newspapers and magazines, advertisement on TV and radio with 800 phone numbers, newspaper articles about elderly persons, and salesmen asking their customers if they have family or friends who might need insurance.

Walton went on to explain some of the sales techniques employed by these people. They portray themselves as friendly, caring, concerned and helpful.

The elderly are generally more susciptable to such techniques than young people. Things Walton thought could be

done to help included uniformity of

health care policies, the review and strengthening of laws governing health care sales, and education of the elderly on the subject.

After he spoke, Walton was questioned by the Chairman of the panel.

"I'd like to thank some people for the help they gave me on the report I gave in Washington," Walton said. 'Roy Cartee of Cisco, a state AARP officer, and Neil Eaves of Carbon, Eastland County Chapter of NARFA assisted on this."

Walton stated that he believes the hearing did some good, and he will continue to work along the lines the panel talked about.



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## Senate OKs hospital proposals

Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau

AUSTIN - The Senate approved and sent to the governor Tuesday a bill to allow the bankrupt South Eastland County Hospital District to dissolve, as well as another bill allowing creation of a new hospital district, the Eastland Memorial Hospital District, in the north part of the county.

The South Eastland County bill would allow the district's board of directors to order an election on the question of dissolving the district and transferring the district's assets and obligations to Eastland County. Also, the board would be required to call an election if it receives a petition to do so from at least 50 qualified voters in the district.

The election would have to be held no more than 60 days after the board orders the election.

The ballot would read: "The dissolution of the South Eastland County Hospital District and the transfer of the existing district assets to and the assumption of

debts and bond obligations by Eastland County. If voters turn down the proposal, the South Eastland County district could not order another election on the issue for a year.

If approved by voters, the board would be required to make the transfer on or before Dec. 31, 1990.

"At the time of the transfer, Eastland County shall assume all debts and bond obligations of the district which remain unsatisfied or not discharged in bankruptcy, and any duty to furnish indigent health care,"

Also, the board could continue to exist beyond Dec. 31, 1990, to collect taxes due on or before Dec. 31, 1991, and to pay creditors pursuant to a bankruptcy court-approved plan.

If signed by the governor, the bill would take effect

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

#### TEXAS AND THE LEGISLATURE

The Senate Finance Committee has approved a \$49 million increase in the minimum standard dollar amount for hospital reimbursement, raising the dollar amount rural hospitals may receive from the State, announced State Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville).

"This \$49 million will help in easing the rural health care crisis in Texas. The money will partially restore the 1986 cuts in reimbursements to hospitals that serve rural Texas," Glasgow said.


"Hopefully, this increase will help keep rural hospitals from closing. A number of hospitals in my Senatorial District have been closing one after

another and I was determined to halt this dangerous trend this session," said Glasgow, who serves as Vice Chairman of the State Finance Committee.

"When someone needs urgent medical attention it is just as necessary regardless of where they live. Those who live in rural areas shouldn't have to travel long distances for nedical care. Having the nearest hospital 100 miles away is at best a great inconvenience, and at worst life threatening," Glasgow

The Senate Finance Committee also added \$28.5 million to increase the income caps for nursing home and community care clients. "This money will allow the State to reach 88 percent of the federal maximum limit of money that may be spent to help our older Texans," Glasgow

Farmers who want to retain eligibility for USDA program benefits, including commodity price supports, loans and crop insurance, need to be aware of the "Conservation Compliance" provisions of the 1985 Food Security Act.

This relatovely new provision requires farmers who have "highly erodible cropland" to have a conservation plan approved and to begin actively implementing that plan by January 1, 1990.

The plan must be fully implemented by January 1, 1995. Each farmer should determine whether or not these provisions apply to his land. These provisions are equally important to both the landowner and tenant.

In some counties, limited costshare funds will be available to assist farmers in implementing their plans. Those funds available through the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP), the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPAC), and other programs are limited and will be distributed in the usual manner. Therefore, individuals who have their plans in place and make appropriate application will be in a Kokomo-Simpson Cemetery Meet-

efunds than those who lag behind.

Farmers who have questions about Conservation Compliance or whether or not their land meets the highly erodible lands definition should check in county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the Soil Conservation Service.

Developing the conservation plan is a relatively simple process. Once the soil type and land conditions are known, SCS conservationists will provide farmers with several options for "significantly reducing" erosion. In many cases, farmers are already meeting required erosion reductions. In those cases, the plan will consist
