The Monthly Activity Report of the Gorman Police Department for February 2001 is as follows:

The following is the winning essay written by Cindy Lopez:

Soil and Water Conservation

Someone once said, "We treat our Earth as though we had a spare." Many people have not yet learned what conservation means, and for that reason our soil and water are being used unwisely.

When early settlers first arrived they thought our resources would never end.

When they wanted to clear land for farming they burned entire forests, destroying the trees, killing animals, and damaging the soil. Trees and plants hold the soil together, so when forests are burned like there is nothing left causing erosion. That in turn spoils land for farming.

Something that also harms the soil is the practice of one-crops farming. If

you plant the same thing every year, then that plant uses certain minerals in the soil causing it to become worn out and useless. For that reason the U.S. Department of Agriculture began to tach farms how to prevent erosion and restore worn-out soil with fertilizers, efficient farming, and crops rotation. Many people are now using crop rotation, helping to keep the fertile.

Millions of tons of acid from coal mines run into rivers of eastern United

Millions of tons of acid from coal mines run into rivers of eastern United States. Paper mills, chemical plants, and other factories empty waters into streams. This dumping pollutes the water and makes it unfit for human use. Lake Erie is a good example of what pollution can do to a body of water. This lake is dying because millions of tons of sediment, sewage, and chemical waters are poured into the lake every year.

Soil is a very valuable resource. Without soil or with only poor soil, plants could not grow the animals that eat plants would die, and soon the whole food chain would be destroyed. People would then be the next step.

We should take care of our soil, because it takes thousands of years for only two or three feet of soil to form. Our water must be kept clean. The dumping of industrial wastes and untreated sewage has to be stopped. Water is essential to life and health. If we don't act now our soil and water might be destroyed far beyond repair, leaving our future generations without natural resources.



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

DeLaTorre successfully completed 12 weeks of training designed to challenge new Marine recruits both physically and mentally.





Pause To Think

Let us examine the verses in II Corinthians 12:1-4. It is not expedient for me doubtless to glory. I will come to visions and revelations of the Lord. I knew a man in Christ above fourteen years ago, (whether in the body, I cannot tell; or whether out of the body, I cannot tell: God knoweth;) such a one caught up to the third heaven. And I knew such a man, (whether in the body, or out of the body, I cannot tell: God knoweth;) How that he was caught up into paradise, and heard unspeakable words, which it is not lawful to for a man to utter.

This is an intriguing passage. The key that brought about this experience is found in verse one, the second sentence. I will come to visions and revelations of the Lord. Paul wrote in Philippians 3:7-10, "But what things were gain to me, those I counted loss for Christ. Yea doubtless, and I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord: for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and do count them but dung, that I may win Christ, And be found in him, not having mine own righteousness, which is of the law, but that which is through the faith of Christ, the righteousness which is of God by faith: That I may know him, and the power of his resurrection and the fellowship of his sufferings, being made conformable unto his death;

This passage expresses the ultimate desire of the Apostle Paul. He clearly states, "I want to know Christ." In my opinion, if anyone knew and had a relationship with Christ, Paul did. However, in Philippians 3 he clearly states that he wants to know him better. These verses correlated with II Corinthians 12:1 clearly show why Paul experienced the third heaven and heard things unlawful for a man to utter. He wanted to know Christ in an excellent knowledge and desired visions and revelations of the Lord. This same intensity present within us will cause us to enter Spiritual Frontiers.

Look at some of the things that the Apostle Paul did through the Spirit; Elymas blinded, Acts 13:11, Lame man cured, Acts 14:10, Damsel with the spirit of divination cast out Acts 16:18, Eutychus restored to life Acts 20:10, Shook the viper off in the fire, Acts 28:5, Father of Publius healed, Acts 28:8, The sick healed from handkerchiefs taken from his body, Acts 19:11-12.

Peter also possessed this same intensity. He also saw a lame man cured Acts 3:7. Here are a few other things that were accomplished in him through the Spirit; Ananias and Sapphira, Acts 5:5, Sick healed by Peter's shadow passing over them, Acts 5:15, Aeneas, Acts 9:34, Dorcas raised from the dead Acts 9:36-

What can do the Spirit of God accomplish through us? More importantly, what has God planned to do through us? He has a purpose and plan for every person. Each of us should have an intense desire to reach our full potential in

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
