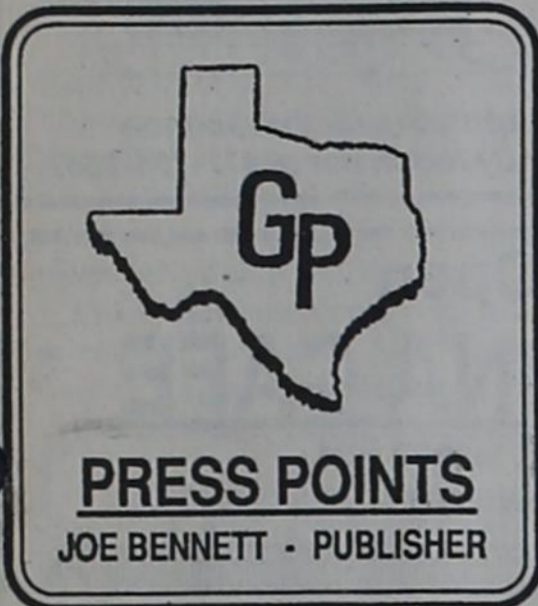
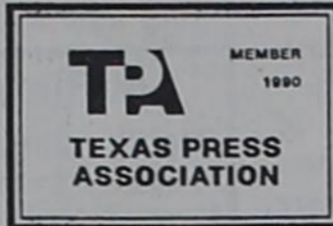

GORMAN TEAMS WIN TWO GAMES; HOST MAY FRIDAY NIGHT

The Gorman High School basketball teams continued their winning ways on January 26 and 30th as they both won to stay in the District 23A race.

In action on Friday night the Pantherettes won by a large margin over the Carbon girls 84 to 28.

Jana Norris led the Pantherettes with 28 points. Tiffany Stephens hit for 18 and Tonya Caraway had 14. Whitson led Carbon with 12.

This win gave the Pantherettes a 16-6 season mark and a 5-2 district record.

In the boys action the Panthers overwhelmed the Wolverines by a 98 to 41 score. Lance Sharp led Gorman with 26. Brandon Gilmore and Chad Campbell each had 12. Moody led Carbon with 19 and Warren had 16.

This win kept the Panthers undefeated in District 23A action and puts them at 15-6 on the season.

Carl Howard Cole Laid To Rest Sunday

Carl Howard Cole, age 65, of Gorman passed away the afternoon of January 24, 1990 while visiting his parents in Kalamazoo, Mich.

He was born on February 23, 1924 in Kalamazoo, and on his 17th birthday, he joined the U. S. Navy. He was aboard the USS Curtiss during the bombing of Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941. While stationed at Corpus Christi he met and married Wanda Lee Thurman in April of 1946 and soon after they moved to Kalamazoo, Mich. After an honorable discharge in April of 1947, he remained in the reserves until recalled to active duty December 25, 1951. His second honorable discharge followed in May 1952 as a result of the injuries received during his service. He was a member of the Disabled American Veterans.

Mr. Cole worked for National Waterlift for 11 years before going to work for Continental Can Co. in St. Joseph, Mich. He retired after 26 years. He was a lifetime member of the United Steel Workers of America and was also a member of the Civil Air Patrol and a private pilot for over 20 years. After his retirement from Continental Can, Carl and Wanda moved back to her hometown of Gorman, Texas in 1986. Once settled he opened the Gorman Machine Shop in 1987.

Mr. Cole is survived by his wife, Wanda of Gorman; a son, Dale H. Cole and wife, Karen of Elkhart, Ind.; a daughter, Joy L. Cole and grandson, Joseph M. Colpetzer of Gorman; parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl M. Cole; and a sister, Mrs. Leta Schoenals of Kalamazoo; a nephew, Marvin (Skip) Schoenhals of Michigan; one niece, Mrs. Carol Doublestein of Kentwood, Mich.

Services were held at 2 p. m. Sunday at the Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel with burial in the Gorman Cemetery.

Memorials were made to the Gorman Fire Department.

This victory clinched the District 23A title for the Panthers with two games to go. The season mark is now 16-6.

The Gorman teams will host May on Friday night at 6:30 and will wind up the regular season on Tuesday night when they host Sidney.

Sarah Hendricks Tuggle Receives Texas Century Certificate

On November 16, 1989, Sarah Hendricks Tuggle was honored by the Texas Department of Agriculture when she was presented the Family Land Heritage Certificate by Commissioner of Agriculture Jim Hightower in Austin.

Sarah now owns the Hendricks Ranch in the Kokomo community that was founded by her late parents, S. F. and R. A. Hendricks, in 1887, and has been in the family for over 100 years. Sarah and her husband, Lum Tuggle, still live there.

Samuel Farris Hendricks was born in 1855 at Forney, Texas. His mother died when he was nine months old. His father, Albert Hendricks, was then married to Sarah Watson, a widow with four children. They moved to Gladewater when Samuel was 14.

His father died in 1869. His stepmother remarried.

When Samuel Hendricks was 17, he left home to make his way in the world, which was hard with no relatives in Texas to turn to. He went to Denton in 1875 to work for John Y. Yates, and in 1879 he married Rachel Ann Yates, the daughter of John Y. and Tibathy Yates.

They owned an 80 acre farm in Collin County. He took a job in Denton in 1884. A child's disease hit Denton killing nearly all the children. Two sons died in infancy and the disease took two daughters, one eighteen months old and one three years old. Jim Hendricks was age five. The doctor said the only chance for Jim was to travel.

Mr. Hendricks sold the family farm, and with a team and covered wagon they headed for Abilene, Texas. In January 1887, when they got to a rock well near a bridge south of Eastland, they camped because of a blizzard.

Mr. Hendricks bought a farm in the Kokomo Community from J. D. Wright, and he and his neighbors

went back to Collin County, got his horses and cattle, and moved into the home at Kokomo

After moving to this area, Jim soon got well. There were six other children born here. One baby girl died in 1890. The Hendricks children were Jim, Jennie, Jess, Dollie, June and Sarah.

Mr. Hendricks raised horses, mules, hogs and cotton for market. He was one of the first to grow peanuts in the community. Goober peas, as they were known then were a family job, with plowing done by horse and mule team. To get ready to plant, the sacks of peanuts were emptied on sheets. They had to pick out sticks before the seeds could be planted.

All the kids had to hoe peanuts. At digging time peanuts were plowed up using the team. The family shook them by hand and stacked them with nuts inside. When they were dry enough they were hauled and stacked. Mr. Hendricks would cut and haul wood for the old steam thrasher. After Thrashing, the sacks of nuts were dried in the sun until dry enough to sell.

During the depression, Mr. Hendricks sold his peanuts for twenty-five cents per bushel.

Mr. Hendricks passed away on June 8, 1937 and Mrs. Hendricks passed away June 3, 1949. Sarah is the lone survivor of the Hendricks children and has lived on the ranch all her life.

Accompanying Sarah to Austin to receive the Heritage Award were some of her many neices and nephews, Mrs. Patsy Norris Collins o Ranger, Mrs. Leta Norris Hogan of Gorman, Mrs. Carol Norris Skinner of Midland, Gary Norris of Carbon, Bill Collins of Watauga, and Brad Collins of Ranger.

The late Albert Hendricks of the Kokomo Community was a nephew of Sarah Hendricks Tuggle. Albert was the son of Jim Hendricks.

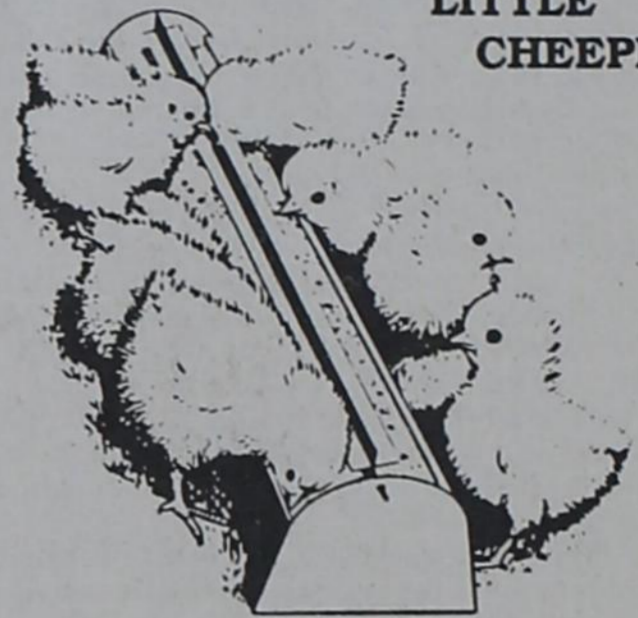

Free Income Tax Assistance Available

Free income tax assistance will be available for area residents during February, March and April through the tax-aide program of the American Association of Retired Persons.

Volunteer counselors, trained by Internal Revenue Service certified instructors, will be staffing a counseling site in the Gorman Senior Citizens Center from February 1 through April 15, 1990.

Walter Knowlden, Associate District Coordinator for the Central Texas area of the AARP Tax-Aide Program, said the service is designed to help older persons and also taxpayers who are unable to afford professional advice and to help them understand income tax forms and to

become familiar with special benefits available.

According to Mr. Knowlden, past experience has indicated that many older persons are unaware of special benefits they are entitled to claim and are paying more than they are required to pay, some may not even be required to file a return because of limited income.

Taxpayers using the service need to bring copies of their previous years returns and their forms for the current year. They should also bring with them all their W-2 and W-2P forms, along with all their 1099 forms regarding income received, including their SSA1099 form from Social Security. They should also have all their receipts of expenses, such as medical bills, prescription drugs, medical insurance for possible medical deductions. They will also need to bring receipts of taxes, mortgage interest and charitable contributions paid during the year so all taxable deductions can be applied.
