





Stenholm Calls For Vote on **Balanced Budget**

WASHINGTON - Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX) on June 19th announced that after eight years of working on a balanced Budget Amendment to the constitution he has enough supporters to bring the issue to the floor of the House of Representatives for a vote.

The amendment was "discharged", meaning that at least 218 members of Congress have signed a petition that forced the bill out of committee and to the House floor.

The Balanced Budget Amendment was originally co-sponsored by Stenholm, Rep. Larry Craig (R-ID), Rep. Tom Carper (D-DE) and Rep. Bob Smith (R-OR) in a bi-partisian endea-

"Thomas Jefferson, our third president, has stated he regretted that a balanced budget amendment was not included in our original constitution and I think it's time we correct that oversight," said Sten-

On November 26, 1798 Jefferson wrote to John Taylor: "I wish it were possible to cotain a single amendment to our constitution. I would be willing to depend on that alone for the reduction of the administration of our government to the genuine principles of it's constitution; I mean an additional article, taking from the government the power of borrowing."

Stenholm pointed out that the federal government has run deficits for 19 years in a row and for 50 of the last 58 years.

"To date, the federal government has incurred, on behalf of each American household, about \$30,000 in accumulated debt," the Congressman said. "This has got to stop if we have any hope for our country as we know it today."

The amendment would de-politicize revenue projections by requiring the President and Congress to agree on a single estimate. Beginning in 1993, the President would have to propose a balanced budget and Congress would have to adopt it, unless 3/5 of both Houses agree to unbalance the budget for a particular year. A back-up vote on increasing the national debt would be required as a way to discourage unreal revenue projections that would result in "unanticipated" deficits.

Stenholm added that by rsising the threshold of difficulty for deficit spending and requiring House members to go on record to raise taxes, this amendment will level the playing field by forcing the President and Congress to set priorities rather than allowing them to postpone tough budget decisions from one year into the next.

The issue is expected to be brought to the House Floor between July 18-25.

The chief sources of flea infestation in the home are family pets, but once indoors fleas thrive in floor cracks, carpets, upholstered furniture and pet bedding. Fleas, of course, are abundant outside; larvae burrow into the top surface of the soil.

If flea problems are occurring in the house, the yard, and on the pets, all three must be treated at the same

Use only approved products for treating animals. Dusts are preferred because they are generally effective longer. The newer products containing an insect growth regulator can reduce subsequent egg and larval peoduction and can be applied directly to the animal.

Outdoors, treat areas that pets frequent. Use only approved products to thoroughly cover and saturate soil and grass areas. Make sure that application equipment is care-

fully calibrated to measure dosages exactly.

In the house, thoroughly vacuum

In the house, thoroughly vacuum or sweep carpets, rugs, furniture, cracks and crevices. Be sure to reach under furniture and along baseboards. Discard the vacuum bag afterwards.

Use a coarse spray (large droplets) in treating likely infested areas. It is always more effective to treat all carpets, furniture and baseboards at one tome. After spraying, use total-release aerosal applications to reduce adult fleas.

Additional applications may be

Additional applications may be needed about three weeks later when populations build from eggs that hatched since the first spraying. Insect growth regulators used with other sprays will inhibit flea growth in early stages and extend control measures.

Insect growth regulators (IGR), such as methopreme, are synthetically derived harmones similar to those found naturally in insects. When applied to the early flea larval stage, IGR inhibit growth and maturation. Insecticides, on the other hand, kill larval and adult fleas by direct poisoning.

L-1738 carries a listing of approved insecticides for flea control.
