

Introduction

Pediculus humanus var capitis, or head lice, although not a major health hazard or vector for disease, can be a bane of existence for their victims and school nurses, teachers, and parents. It is estimated that several million school

children in the U.S. are affected annually, and that at any given time as many as 10 million Americans may be infested with lice.

Epidemiology

The head louse measures 2 to 3 mm in length, moves rapidly, is generally gray (although it tends to resemble the hair color of its host), and if engorged

with blood becomes reddish. These wingless insects are fitted with a claw on the end of each of their six legs, which assists in clinging to hair. Usually an infestation consists of less than 12 adult lice, each of which probably consumes no more than .001 ml of blood per day. Each female lays between 50 and 150 eggs which are firmly attached to the hair shaft. The eggs hatch in five to ten days; the life span for the louse is approximately three weeks. If separated from the environment of the warm host, the louse cannot survive more than three days. Lice are transmitted from person to person through physical contact, sharing combs or headgear, or the common use of bedding. **Instructions for Individual Treatment**

The pediculicide should be applied to scalp according to label directions, taking precautions to prevent medication from getting in eyes or on skin other than the scalp, to reduce irritation and absorption of pesticide.

It should be applied to dry hair, unlike other "shampoos" they are accustomed to. It should not be used if there are open cuts, sores, or wounds on the scalp--call family physician or clinic for instructions. Care should be taken to thoroughly rinse the pediculicide out of the hair after it has been left on the specified period of time. Avoid using oil-based treatments, hair dressings, or conditions immediately after applying pediculicide.

Home and School Cleaning

Thoroughly vacuum carpets, mattresses, upholstered furniture, and car upholstery. Damp wipe all washable surfaces, such as resting mats or bus seats, to remove loose hair that may have attached nits and dispose of cleaning cloth. Fumigation or spraying with insecticides is not recommended because it increases the potential for needless exposure to toxic chemicals and is also a costly practice.

Prevention of Transmission
