

# **D. B. Warren Retires From SWPGA Board**

D. B. can recall going through four major farm bills which all came out well and he remembers clearly the struggles with two Agriculture Secretaries. The first was Ezra Taft Benson in the 1950's and the most recent was Earl Butz in the 1970's.

The peanut price support was \$244 per ton in 1954 when Warren became a director. The support rate for 1990 is \$631.47 per ton. Even that increase in support is not enough to offset increased costs experienced by farmers, he said. He also mentioned other changes in peanut production and marketing that occurred during his years of service, including the switch from bag to bulk peanut handling, introduction of crop irrigation in the 1960's and changes that have resulted from the discovery of aflatoxin almost three decades ago.

All in all the former director said the years on the SWPGA Board have good ones. He said, "Fortunately, we have been able to keep a good peanut price support program for our growers". He said the peanut program has been considerably more successful than most other farm programs. Adverse weather, he said, has been our greatest problem in preventing us from being consistent with profitable crops.

He chose not to seek reelection



All a person has to do to arrange for direct deposit is to call Social Security or contact any financial organization. A monthly benefit check and a blank personal check contain all the information needed.

Some advantages of direct deposit are:

- No worry about a check being lost or stolen.

- No need to be home when the check arrives. The money is available in an account even if the person is out of town.

— Time and transportation costs are saved and there is no standing in lne to cash the check.

— It is safer to keep money in an account than carrying a lot of cash.

People who choose direct deposit must be sure to keep Social Security informed of their current address. This way they will continue to receive important information about their chek.

# Eastland County residents disagree

# with report most roads are repaired

EASTLAND - A little mudslinging over road repairs took place between an Eastland County Commissioner and two unhappy citizens Monday.

The commissioners' meeting began peacefully enough with each of the four county commissioners reporting to County Judge Scott Bailey that most roads damaged by flooding this spring had been repaired.

Miles Moore, of the Big M Oil Co., however, disagreed. He complained that road work near Scranton by Precinct 3 Commissioner L.T. Owen is unsatisfactory.

"You need to get an engineer out there," Moore said to Owen. Moore said drainage ditches are not deep

roadway.

"What do you want me to do with it?" Owen asked.

"Haul it off," Moore answered. Owen replied, "I'm not going to haul it off.'

Moore said a property owner whose land is being flooded is threatening to sue him because ditches aren't deep enough to channel water away.

"(If) I'm going to be involved in a lawsuit, the county's going to be involved in a lawsuit," he warned.

Another complaint came from Rickie Hanifan, who lives near the Comanche County line. He said the county road near his home was in bad repair, and rain has washed dirt away from a bridge.

Hanifan said to Owen, "I tried to talk to you, but there's no talking." Owen disputed Hanifan's description of the road and said, "I'll take care of the roads if you'll not come around mouthing off." Judge Bailey noted, "Patching roads has caused commissioners budgets to go down the Leon River In other business, commissioners:

Learned that bonds to build the jail have been paid off.
