

## PANTHERS TAME BULLDOGS 43-9; TRAVEL TO TIGER COUNTRY FRIDAY

The Gorman Panthers moved back into the winning column on Friday night when they played host to the Ranger Bulldogs and came away with an overwhelming 43 to 9 victory over the Bullgods of Class 2A.

Following the initial possession by the Bulldogs, which they moved to the Gorman 15 yard line before being held and forced to kick a field goal by Chavez, the Panther defense did a very good job of stalling the Ranger offense.

On the kickoff the Bulldogs took the ball on their own 38 and moved consistently down the field with a no-huddle offense which seemed to catch the Big Red defense off guard. However, the Panthers stopped the Bulldogs at the 15 and Mike Chavez booted a 25 yard field goal to put the Bulldogs on the board with 3 points with 9:30 left in the first.

The Panthers showed their offensive strength on their initial possession as they took the ball on their own 41 and scored in 7 plays with Cory Pack running it in from 5 yards out with 5:09 left. The drive featured a 20 yard run for a first down by Kevin Hirst on a keeper play. That was followed by a 13 yard run by Mat Jones for another first down. The next three plays netted another first down. Then following another 8 yard gainer, Cory Pack scored the TD. Kevin Hirst added the point after and Gorman was ahead to stay at

Then following an exchange of possessions the Panthers took the ball on their own 47 and scored in 7 plays with Jason Ditmore getting the score on a beautiful 34 yard run with 10:02 left in the second period. The drive featured a 17 yard pass to Stephen Scitern to set the Panthers up at the Ranger 34. Hirst kicked the point after and Gorman led 14-3.

Then with 9:37 left in the first half the Bulldogs got the ball on their own 20 and scored in just two plays. Following an incomplete pass, Sean Cockburn found Richard Abila in the open at about the Gorman 35 yard line and he hit him with a pass and he ran the rest of the way to cover the 80 yards for the score. The run for two points failed and the score was 14 to 9.

But the Panthers were not to be denied as they took the kickoff and set up a drive from their own 28 and scored in 8 plays with Stephen Scitern finding running room for an 8 yard scamper for the score with 6:58 left in the half. The drive featured a pass to Jason Ditmore for 11 yards. A 10 yard run by Jason. An 11 yard jaunt by Cory Pack and a 10 yard run by Scitern. Hirst booted the point after and the Panthers led 21 to 9.

Then with 4:18 left on the clock in the first half, Matt Jones capped a 27 yard drive with a 6 yard run for the score. The drive featured a 21 yard scamper by Jason Ditmore to set the Panthers up at the Ranger 6. The kick for pint after failed and Gorman was up 27 to 9.

With just 2:35 left on the clock in the first half the Big Red defense blocked a Bulldog punt in the end zone and the score moved up to 29 to 9 at the half.

Following the intermission, in which the fans enjoyed two fine performances by the Ranger and Gorman bands, the Panthers took the ball on their second possession at their own 44 and scored in 7 plays with Matt Jones again getting the honors from 4 yards out on a run with 4:17 left in the third. The drive featured runs of 13 and 12 yards by Jason Ditmore and a beautiful 19 yard run by Hirst. Hirst then ran for the two pointer and Gorman led 36 to

The Panthers hit the scoreboard one more time with 2:19 left in the third period when the Bulldog punter missed the ball and after kicking it in disgust, Jerry Ditmore alertly picked up the live ball at the Ranger 47 and raced for the score. Hirst added the point afterand the score was 43 to 9.

The Big Red defense did a good job against the Bulldogs after the initial drive and held Ranger to low yardage in the final half.

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

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

The funding will be distributed to a large number of cities including area cities of Breckenridge, \$345,069 Brownwood, \$181,800; De Leon, \$783,100; Dublin, \$1,186,425; and Rising Star, \$165,661.

CIAP is a program of the U. S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development. The contract obligates the federal government, through annual contributions, to pay the principal and interest on project notes sold by the local housing authorities over a period of 20 years.

"I am pleased that, once again, we have been able to return some of the money Texans have paid in federal taxes to directly benefit Texans," Gramm said.
