


COMING HOME QUEEN - Brenda Hirst escorted by her husband Daryl.

Host Rattlers In First District Game

The Santa Anna Mointaineers and their great running back Herbert Jackson dampened the otherwise enjoyable Homecoming Day for Gorman by overwhelming the Panthers 34 to 7. The game seemed to be a toss-up through the first quarter as the Mountaineers led 6-0 when Herbert Jackson scored the first of his four touchdowns on the night. Jackson scored on a 15 yard run with 5:35 left in the period after taking over the ball on their 42 following their first of four interceptions for the night. The kick for point after failed and the score was 6-0.

The Monutaineers added another score with 11:01 left in the second when Jackson got loose again for a 24 yard run. Charles Dixon ran for the two pointer and the score rose to

Then the Panthers came right back with a touchdown of their own after holding the Mountaineers and forcing a punt. The Panthers took over at their 45 and scored in 7 plays with Matt Jones getting the honors from 1 yard out with 7:16 left. The drive featured a 9 yard run by Jason Ditmore; a 7 yard run for a first down by Stephen Scitern; and an 18 yard scamper by Jason to set Gorman up at the 3 yard line. After a 2 yard gain, Jones scored the TD. Kevin Hirst kicked the point after and the score went to 14 to 7.

The Mountaineers wasted little time getting another TD as they took the ball on their own 47, and following an incomplete pass, Jackson again showed his stuff as he broke through the Panther defenders and raced 53 yards for the score with 6:52 left. Again the kick failed and the score rose to 20 to 7.

The last of the high scoring second quarter for the Mounties came with 3:31 left in the period as they took the ball on their own 48 following an interception and again caught the Big Red defense open and Jackson raced for 52 yards for the score. Byron Dowdy added the two pointer on a run and the score rose to 28 to 7.

Santa Anna came out after the halftime intermission and took the kickoff on their own 20 and scored in a long time-consuming drive with Byron Dowdy running in for the score from 8 yards out with 5:46 left in the third. The kick for point again failed and the score was 34 to 7.


Jason Ditmore led the Panthers on the ground with 67 yards on 12 tries. Kevin Hirst had 53 yards on 8

keepers. Stephen Scitern ran for 50 yards on 8 tries and Matt Jones got 29 yards on 7 carries.



Bernadine Cloninger, 77, of Hamilton, passed away Sunday afternoon in the Coryell Memorial Hospital in Gatesville.






