-GP-Light Turnout Shown In Elections

Candidates for City Commissioner and School Board of Trustees were unopposed in the elections held on Saturday, and consequently the turnout of voters was rather light.

In the City Election 77 votes were cast with Ann Maxfield receiving 75 votes for Place Three amd Howard Hagood receiving 73 votes for Place One.

Both candidates will be serving first terms on the Commission.

Three incumbents were re-elected to the Gorman Independent School Board of Trustees. Robert Ervin polled 36 votes for a one year term, and Daryl Hirst received 44 votes and Windell Treadway received 42 votes for three year terms.

Peanut Communities Alerted To GATT Threat

The GATT threat to peanut farmers and communities with peanut production is for real. That word of caution comes from Benny Hagan of Cisco, Texas local director for the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association. When the U.S. made its original proposal to GATT in 1987 callin for elimination of all farm programs by the year 2000, most observers did not appear to take the proposal seriously. But the total commitment of the Bush Administration to secure an international trade agreement is now universally convincing and currently poses a direct threat to farm programs that depend on import protection under Section 22 of the Agricultural Adjustment Act. Peanuts is one such commodity. One of the principal goals of the U. S. proposal to GATT is elimination of all trade barriers. The protection that Section 22 provides to the peanut, cotton, sugar and dairy industries is considered by the Administration to be an import barrier.

If Section 22 is eliminated or substantially altered, both Mainland China and Argentina stand ready to supply this country's peanut needs. China demonstrated in 1980 that it can supply peanuts to the U.S. at prices representing roughly half of the U.S. quota support price. We could not expect to see the retail price of peanut products drop below present levels as a result of lower prices of farmers stock peanuts. At least that has not been true in similar experiences in the past. Therefore, there would be no price advantages to American consumers of peanut producers - - only a reduction in quality by substituting foreign pro-

To compound the problem peanut communities face, any international trade agreement that may occur could be approved by Congress by fast track legislation if free trade advocates have their way. President Bush has asked that Congress extend fast track authority which would otherwise have ended last March 1. Fast track means that the trade agreement, which may include the loss of Section 22 import protection for peanuts, could only be voted yes or no by Congress without any changes being made by the Congressional Committees and without floor amendments.

An effort will be made in both the House and Senate to disallow fast track, but to be successful such a resolution must receive a majority vote in either the House or Senate by June 1, 1991. Otherwise the President will have continuing fast track authority.

Individuals in peanut producing communities have been urged to contact their Congressman and Senators to communicate their feelings both on the upcoming vote on fast

growers to the potential dangers inherent in the U.S. proposals to GATT. Although these meetings were well attended, there are many growers and local business people who did not attended a meeting. Growers and business peoaple who were not present at one of the meetings and who have not contacted their Congressional delegation are urged to do so. It should not be necessary at this point to emphasize the importance and urgency of following through with contacting U.S. Congressmen and Senators. The future of our peanut communities depend upon how Section 22 and the penaut program fare in international GATT negotiations and the degree to which key U. S. elected officials are successful in representing the peanut industry with members of the U.S. Trade Team and in decisions made by the U.S. Congress.

Gorman, in 1891 was a railroad settlement on the Houston and Texas Central Railroad, only two years old as a post office. As the settlement at Shinoak Springs moved to the railroad site, brush was cleared to enable the town to grow. A few stores, then a few more stores, then a hotel and a lumber yard was built. Then a two story school house was constructed. But the community lacked the stabilizing influence of churches for its people.

In May, 1891, Reverend H. S. Anglin organized the Horman Methodist Episcopal Church South, with 13 members, representing four families. At annual conference that December, Gorman was made a part of the Carbon Circuit and Rev. R. H. Goode (a preacher on trial) was sent as its first officiating minister.

There was at the time no church building in Gorman. All denominations used the school building for worship services. The Methodist held Sunday School at 3 p. m. and preaching on the first Sunday of the month.

The little congregation grew stead ily, and in 1893 they bought for \$35 the lot on which the church now stands. A one room frame church was built on the lot in 1894. It was the first house of worship in Gorman. Planks laid across nail kegs served as seats for the first services, but after several months of dinners and ice cream suppers, the women of the church raised funds to replace the planks with oak pews. From that one room frame building built in 1894, the church has grown to encompass the beautiful block of buildings that today include the parsonage, sanctuary and educational building. Yet the story of the church is after all, the story of the men and women who make up the congregation. The Gorman Methodist Church was part of the Carbon Circuit from 1891 to 1894, when the Gorman Circuit was organized. However, in 1898 the General Conference placed the Gorman church on the Carbon Circuit. It was not until 1906 that the church, having grown to 161 members, was made a full station. During the next two years, 141 members were received into the church by Rev. W. J. Lee. It was during this time that a four-room house located northwest of the

committee began raising funds for the new church by subscribing \$1,000 each.

When the church was completed, there was a debt remaining of \$1000. At a quarterly conference the congregation voted to apply to the Board of Church Extension for a donation. Before the board met to act on the application Rev. Lee held a revival meeting and the full amount of the debt was raised on the last Sunday of the meeting (this was during a year when the pastor's annual salary was only \$550).

The new church building was dedicated January 26, 1908.

In 1909 an outdoor tabernacle was built east of the church. Revivals wee held in the tabernacle for many years.

During the oil boom in 1918, the tabernacle was leased to an ice company, but in 1933 it was repaired and again used for worship services until it deteriorated and had to be torn down.

In the belfrey of the church hung a bell which was rung on Sunday mornings and also on special occasions. The bell is still used today.

During the years 1909-1910, the four room parsonage was replaced by a large two-story building. However, in 1915 the parsonage caught fire and was destroyed. A new parsonage was built and used until 1963.

The proud brick building that served the congregation for over 50 years was a pretty church with a beautiful balcony and lovely memorial stained glass windows. Time taking its toll on the sanctuary and the original steeple had to be removed after being found unsound.

In 1957 during Rev. Robert Haynes' first year as pastor, plans for a new church was founded.

Many members left their mark on the building: Mr. R. C. Boswell built the copper steeple and baptismal for the sanctuary in a warehouse at the peanut mill.

At completion, the church had an indebtedness of \$22,500. This debt was to be paid in 15 years, but was paid in only six and one-half years.

Dedication services were held March 28, 1965.

Shortly before the dedication of the sanctuary a new parsonage was built under the direction of Rev. Robert Sanders. The parsonage is described as one of the nicest between Abilene and Fort Worth. Since its organization in 1891 the Gorman United Methodist Church has been served by 54 ministers, men and women of different strengths and talents.

A total of 45 votes were cast in the school election.

DESDEMONA CONGREGATION **MERGES WITH GORMAN**

Paralleling the development of the Gorman Methodist Church, the Desdemona Methodist Church was organized in 1870, and by 1895 it had become a mission in the Abilene District with a membership of 200. During the oil boom the church was reporting 438 members in 1925. In 1919 a new church was constructed. Rev. H. H. Nance was pastor at the time.

The Desdemona church has ministered to the community for over a century, first as a part of the Dublin District and then as a mission of the known both growth and recession. Members have shared joys and sorrows with each other and with the community.

The congregation has striven to extend its Christian faith into works and homes, in the community and abroad through conference and mission projects.
