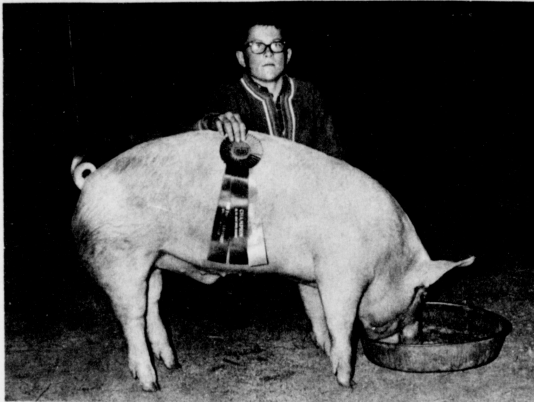

## Jimmy White Selected 'Outstanding Young Farmer'

Jimmy R. White has been selected as the "Outstanding Young Farmer for 1967-68" from the Muleshoe area.

White and his wife, Jaqueta, and two children live and farm seven and one-half miles west of Muleshoe on FM 1760.

In the past four years, this outstanding farmer has more than doubled the amount of land he farms. Aside from being cited as a progressive young farmer, he is also recognized for being active in civic organizations and church work.

The "Outstanding Young Farmer" program is a nationwide program carried out by State and National Jaycees honoring young farmers between the ages of 21 and 35 years of age for their contributions to the farming industry and to their community.

The area program was conducted on a local level by Muleshoe Jaycees.

A Jaycee spokesman said "We feel that outstanding individual achievements in the field of agriculture and community development should be recognized and extend congratulations to him in his distinction of being chosen as outstanding representative of the great agricultural industry."

Following the selection of White for "Outstanding Young Farmer," the Muleshoe Jaycees have nominated him for state competition in this capacity.

The local honoree will be recognized at the state "Outstanding Young Farmer Awards Banquet" to be held in Snyder

during a two-day session to be held February 16-17. Governor John Connally will deliver the keynote address at the banquet.

Clarence Christian, chairman of the area contest for the Jaycees said "Young men of this caliber are truly an asset to the growth of a progressive area and we especially commend him for his church and community activities. Too many times, young men tend to become complacent in their environment and think the other man will hold up their portion of civic responsibilities."

In outlining some of his work White expressed that accurate and current records are a necessity in farming today. Each year since he began farming, he has had to overcome either hail, storms or lost irrigation wells. Yet, this past growing season, despite heavy hail, he managed to produce an average of over 7100 pounds of grain sorghum and a little over 500 pounds of cotton per acre.

Chemical herbicides and rotation programs are the mainstay of his weed control program. Other practices such as shredding stalks while green and discing in, land floating, rod-weeding for volunteer and double rows team up for outstanding yields. Along with a two year rotation of cotton, grain sorghum, layout, and wheat, he deep breaks some of his land every year.

Also essential to high yields is the use of certified seed and hybrid varieties. He conducts variety trials each year. Cont'd on Page 3, Col. 1

### Bobby Julian on Academic Team

Muleshoe high school senior Bobby Julian has been selected along with 21 other football players to the All West Texas Academic Football Teams.

Nominations were made from the more than 400 high schools

in the 132-county area served by WTCC and selection to team membership was made by a special committee named by President Don Wooten of Abilene.

Julian was named on the basis of academic average, athletic achievement, character, citizenship and leadership, Coach Dick Stafford said. He was named to the Triple A team to the position of deep end.

His scholastic average was 91.4.

President Wooten stated "We feel that exceptional academic achievement in addition to athletic ability should be recognized and encouraged in West Texas high schools. Too often there is too much honor bestowed for athletic achievement without regard to scholastic attainment."

Because of Texas interscholastic rules there will not be any prizes awarded to these honorees. However, those selected are to be honored in the individual schools at proper school functions.

The Education Committee of the WTCC anticipates that the naming of these Academic-Athletic teams will become an annual event so that greater emphasis will be placed upon the "total education" of the student, according to Wooten.

## Allotment Signup Now Underway

Approximately 300 farmers have signed up with the local office of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office for the 1968 planting allotments on cotton, Charles Daniel, manager, said.

Daniel said that opening date, Monday, February 5, was a busy day for office personnel and signers had been in the office at a relatively steady pace since that time.

Deadline for signing for the 1968 cotton program is March 15.

Texas Farm Bureau has requested that the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service give cotton producers more time to declare their final planting intentions.

In a letter to H. D. Godfrey, ASCS administrator, Texas Farm Bureau president Sidney Dean asked that "the deadline date be extended to June 1, 1968."

Under current regulations, cotton producers have until

March 15, 1968 to declare their final planting intentions.

"These deadlines have been standardized over the area and so far they have not been changed," Daniel said.

### Legal Action Pending on Hospital District

Reliable sources reveal that Earth-Sprinklake Hospital District has filed a suit against Lamb County to obtain the hospital tax money from the county which has been collected.

The suit was filed Tuesday, reports indicate. The suit of intervention was filed by a hospital opposition group.

Cunningham disappeared sometime after going on duty

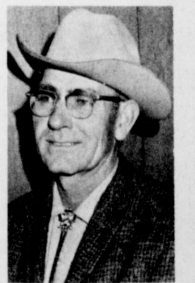

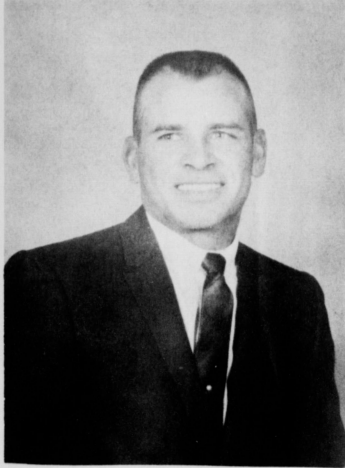

in an effort to produce higher yielding adapted varieties.

Contour farming, stubble mulching, grassed waterways, land leveling, sowing edges of fields and turn-rows with rye, applying cotton burrs and turn-rows, and controlled water application lead the list of conservation practices. Gated aluminum pipe for irrigation allows irrigation water to be applied at non-erosive rates to meet the needs for crops and soils.

During 1967, White ventured into the area of animal husbandry by starting a cross-feeding program of Black Angus bulls and Hereford cows.

The Whites are active members of the Muleshoe First Baptist Church. He is also an office holder in the Muleshoe Chapter of Texas Young Farmers, a participating member of Farm Bureau and of Grain Sorghum Association and Gas Users Association.

## 1967 Feed Stocks In Good Supply

The total supply of feed grains for the present marketing year 1967-68 amounts to about 213 million tons, some 7 percent larger than last year.

John G. McInaney, Extension economist at Texas A&M University, said the 1967 feed grain crop produced a record 176 million tons, 12 percent above the near record output in 1966.

The domestic demand for feed grains is expected to continue strong in 1967-68. The number of grain-consuming animals to be fed is now expected to be a little above the post-war high of 178 million units in 1966-67.

Because of more favorable livestock-feed price ratios in prospect, feeding per animal will be heavier, McInaney explained. Total domestic consumption may be around five percent higher than the 141 million tons consumed last year.

Exports are expected to be about 22.5 million tons compared with 21.9 million tons in 1966-67, McInaney said. U. S. exports will continue to meet strong competition from larger feed grain crops in Europe and from large supplies in surplus producing countries during the 1967-68 marketing year.

According to McInaney, with lower corn prices, larger exports of corn are in prospect.

## Postage Rate Is Outlined

Postage for all Valentines one ounce or lighter is six cents. Postmaster Spencer Beavers reminded mailers today.

The first-class postage rate will provide jet flight service for Valentines destined to servicemen in Vietnam and other overseas locations as well as airtight treatment for most addresses more than 250 miles from the mailing point.

Legislation which went into effect January 1, eliminated the four-cent rate for greeting cards.

The expected high volume of cards just before February 14 will require extra help at postal installations all across the nation Postmaster Beavers reported. The local Post Office will have beefed-up crews on hand starting Tuesday, he said.

# Eighth Grade Wins Again

Bouncing back from the first defeat of the season, Muleshoe's eighth grade basketball team traveled to Hereford Thursday and won the first game of the Hereford Invitational Basketball Tournament.

In the first game of the tournament against Plainview's Estacado Junior High eighth graders, Muleshoe won by a score of 39-23. The first game, which was played in Stanton Junior High School gym at Hereford, was a comeback for the eighth grade team, which was defeated by Gattis Junior High School of Clovis on the previous Monday night.

Not only did Randy Field play an outstanding game defensively in the first half and was top

rebounder, the young cager was also the first member of his team to score for Muleshoe and was high-pointer of his team. Randy scored 15 points; Lee Clodfelter, who started a little slow, came back before half-time, and scored 9 points; he was leading rebounder in the second half of the game.

Johnny Hayes, Mike Riley and Bobby Hayes all put part of the 39 point score up for Muleshoe as they each laid up 4 points; Leroy Medlock had 2 points and Tommy Clements, 1 point in the first game of the tournament, which was played Friday afternoon against the eighth grade from Canyon, once again Randy Field led the way for his team. Although he was

able to play only three quarters after receiving an injury to his finger on a jump ball, he found the basket time after time in the first three quarters and scored 19 points; a check with him by telephone Saturday morning found him ready to play in the final game Saturday night for the first place trophy.

He told the Journal that he hoped to be able to play in the game although his finger did bother him some.

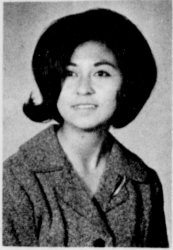

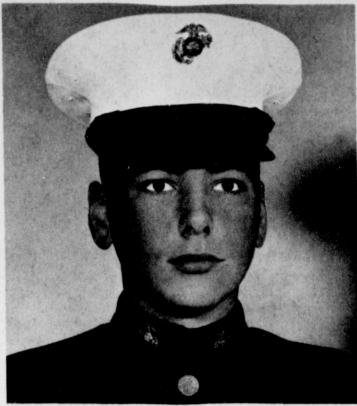

### 7,000 Ducks Die In Panhandle

AUSTIN-Federal Game Warden Don Kriebel, Lubbock, and Phil Evans, game biologist for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Canyon, estimated more than 7,000 ducks, mostly pintails and a few baldpates, died recently in natural playa lakes in the High Plains.

In his report, Evans investigated two of the natural lakes and found approximately 450 dead ducks on a seven-acre lake and 100 on a 12-acre lake. Both lakes were north of Hart, in Castro County.

Warden Kriebel, who personally investigated four lakes reported an estimated 6,000 dead ducks. He said he had reports of other playa lakes with several hundred dead ducks in Parmer, Lamb, and Hale Counties. He also said there were approximately 36,000 playa lakes in the Panhandle which ranged from less than an acre to more than a section.

Cause of death, Evans said, will remain unknown since he was unable to get a good specimen to a laboratory in time to determine cause of death.

In his report, Evans quoted witnesses who said the "sick ducks showed lack of coordination, couldn't move around and held their necks out stiff and down to the ground." Others said the ducks, prior to death, looked like chickens with the limerneck.

Jack Parsons, wildlife supervisor in San Angelo, said the die-off had subsided and "It's probably over with now."

Speculation on the causes of death for the ducks ranged from avian botulism and insecticides to fowl cholera.

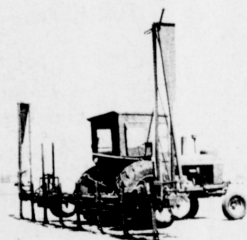

## Texas Not Among Rating on Teacher Pay

Austin-Not a single Texas school district is listed among the 361 public school systems recognized by the National Education Association as paying some of the highest teachers' salaries in the nation.

The average salary in urban school districts in Texas for a beginning teacher with a bachelor's degree is \$698 below the average beginning salary for teachers in the nation's 127 districts with the best salary schedules.

According to Texas Classroom Teachers Association, the average beginning salary for teachers in urban districts is estimated to be \$5,560.

To be included in the 127 top districts, school systems had to meet all three of the following criteria: a minimum salary of \$6,000 or more for beginning teachers with a bachel-

or's degree; a maximum of \$11,000 or more for a master's degree or the equivalent; and a maximum of \$12,000 or more for the highest preparation recognized below a doctorate. No Texas district qualified for this ranking.

Of the 1,092 school systems included in the NEA poll, 234 others met at least one of the above criteria. No Texas district was reported in this group, although TCTA records show that both Midland and Odessa start beginning teachers at \$6,000.

The report, compiled on the basis of schedules negotiated and reported by last fall, shows the 127 districts meeting all three requirements as being located in only 10 states, New York and California had the most districts in the group.

According to the NEA re-

port, salary schedules for teachers in these 127 districts compare with those of other professional employees with similar educational requirements.

Only districts with enrollments of 6,000 or more, or districts in selected high-income areas with enrollments of 1,000 to 600 students were included in the poll. Most of the 361 systems meeting at least one of the three criteria are located in suburban communities near or adjacent to large metropolitan areas.

"The report clearly shows the need for improvement in state-supported salary schedules in Texas," said Miss Bobbie Wilborn, president of Texas Classroom Teachers Association. "Since our cities are

paying well above the state minimum now, if they cannot pay salaries comparable to other large cities and suburbs, it is obvious that our smaller districts must compare even less favorably with small districts in other states."

Miss Wilborn said the 48,000 member organization has gone on record as urging salary legislation for Texas classroom teachers to move to or above the national average with a state index salary scale guaranteeing at least a \$1,000 increase in salary on the minimum and maximum levels. The TCTA-supported legislation would further provide that the index salary scale would insure that a beginning teacher's salary would at least double in 12 years.

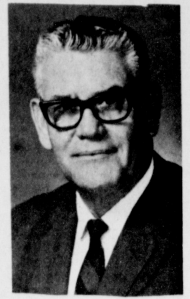

Price and other members of a Republican Task Force on Crime had introduced an anti-loan shark bill last December as a separate measure.

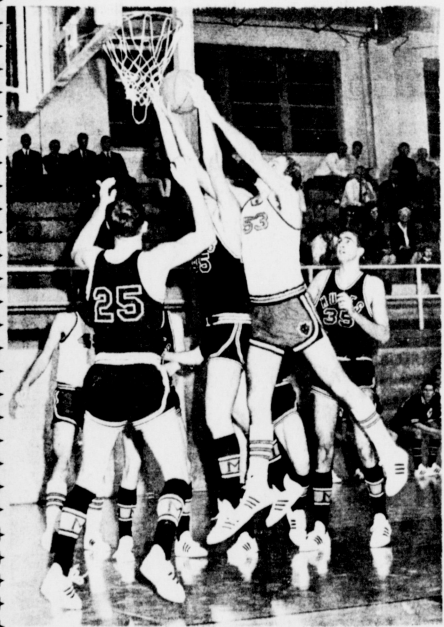
The amendment will empower the Federal government to enforce state anti-shark laws where an interstate connection can be established.
