County Voters Favor Miears For District Clerk

Voters of Eastland County went to the polls in large numbers in Tuesday's General Election and chose Bill Miears as their District CLerk by a margin of 2,881 to 1,562. Miears, a Democrat, got the lead in early reports and continued to lead the count all evening. Miears led in the District Clerk race in the Primary election. Rabel, a Republican, could not muster enough strength to challenge the heavy Democratic vote.

In Gorman returns Miears showed a margin of victory of 248 to 136 for Rabel.

In other races the Gorman voters, totaling 405 votes, gave Ann Richards 208 votes and Williams 165. In the Ag Commissioner race Gorman voters chose Rick Perry by a 239 to 148 margin over Jim Hightower, the incumbent.

In the State Treasurer's race Vicki Hightower carried the Gorman vote over Kay Hutchison by a 199 to 180 count.

Vardie Huff received 288 votes for Justice of the Peace of Precinct 5.

Gorman voters supported Proposition I by a margin of 164 for and 98 against.

In the State balloting Ann Richards was elected Texas Governor by a 51 to 49 percent margin. Hutchison defeated Vicki Hightower in a closely contested race. Bob Bullock outpolled Rob Mosbacher by about 53 to 44 percent. Dan Morales won the Attorney Generals race by a 53 to 44 margin. Gary Mauro was an easy winner over Wes Gilbreath by a 60 to 36 percent mark in late returns.

Eastland County voters turned out in heavy numbers with more than 4400 total votes.

Ann Richards, by winning the Governors race, is the first woman governor in Texas in 58 years. Maw Ferguson was the only other woman in history to set in the Governors Office in Texas.

Panthers Skin The Wildcats 42-14; Host Baird In Close District Race

on Friday night, and were never tested as they raced to a 42-0 halftime lead, then coasted the last half to a 42-14 win. The Wildcats didn't score until the 7:16 mark of the fourth quarter, and were held to just one first down the first half.


Gorman ran the kickoff back to the Panther 37. On the first play Jason Ditmore took the handoff, broke free and raced for 30 yards. Later in the drive Stephen Scitern ran for 12 yards and a first down. Then Jason added another first down on an 11 yards run, before Kevin Hirst went the final 8 yards for the score with 9:56 left in the period. Hirst booted the point after and the Panthers were ahead to stay.

After a couple of exchanges of possession the Panthers took the ball on their own 5 yards line and went the distance in six plays. Following a 3 yard run, Hirst ran for 11 yards and a first down. Then the Panthers were hit with a holding penalty. Hirst then passed to Jason Ditmore for 15 yards and a first down. On the next play Stephen Scitern ran for 12 yards and another first. At this point Hirst found Ditmore open again and hit him for a 19 yard first down gain to the 36. From there Stephen Scitern took the handoff and raced 36 yards for the score with 2:46 left in the first. Hirst added the point after and Gorman was up 14-0. Then in the second quarter the Panthers got the ball on a Wildcat fumble with Jade Warren recovering for the Big Red defense. On the first play the Panthers gained 5. Jason ran for 8 yards and a first down, and then Matt Jones got loose on one of his three hugh yardage runs for 32 yards and the TD with 9:30 left. The drive covered 46 yards in just three plays. Hirst added the PAT and Gorman was up 21-0. After holding the Wildcats on the next possession, the Panthers got the ball at their own 25 and went 75 yards in just four plays. On the first handoff, Jason went 15 yards. Then Matt Jones got another of his big runs, going 50 yards to the Santo 10. After a 4 yard run, Jones then went the final 6 yards with 7:30 left. Hirst added the point after and Gorman led 28-0. After a couple of possessions by each team, the Panthers took the ball on their own 40 and started another scoring drive. On the first handoff Rajee Patel went for 14 yards. Then two runs added 6 more yards before Jason got loose again for 29 yards and a first down. Matt Jones then ran for 15 more yards to the Santo one. Then reserve quarterback Jeremy Ditmore got the TD on a keeper with just 35 seconds left in the half. Again Hirst converted the point after and Gorman led 35 to 0. In the third quarter Santo moved to the Panther 12 before being held to a field goal try. The Panthers then took the ball at their own 20 and scored in 7 plays with Stephen Scitern getting the final 3 yards on a run with 3:11 left in the period. The drive featured a 47 yard scamper by Matt Jones and an 8 yard run by Rajee Patel to set Gorman up at the Santo 3. Hirst added the point after and Gorman was up 42 to 0. Santo got on the board with 7:16 left in the game on a 47 yard pass and run by Keith Gibbs, following an interception by the Wildcats on the Panther 41. Santo got a 10 yard penalty. Then following a run of 4 yards, Gibbs scored. A pass try for two points failed and Gorman led 42-6. Then with 3:38 left the Wildcats got another score on a 1 yard run by Brad Bryant. The score was set up by two first down passes and an 11 yard run to the Gorman 1. A pass to Gibbs added the two pointer and the final score was 42-14. Gorman's Big Red Defense really did the job on the Wildcats, allowing only 1 first down in the first half. Justin Underwood, Robert Darley, Jeremy and Jason Ditmore, Matt Jones and Stephen Scitern were among the entire defense playing real tough defense. But really, the whole "crew" on defense did a great job.

Rajee Patel had 57 on 12 trips. Hirst got 9 on 3 keepers. Kris Scitern carried 4 times for 8. Jeremy Ditmore had 5 yards on 3 keepers, and Cory Pack got 1 yard on two tries.

The win over Santo sets up the big showdown this Friday night with the Panthers hosting the Baird Bears. The Panthers are standing at 4-0 in District 14A, with the Bears and Rising Star Wildcats tied for second place with 3-1 marks. The Bears will be trying to knock the Panthers out of the top spot and secure a playoff berth, so the Big Red defense will be tested severely in this annual battle. The Bears will be coming off a 13 to 6 loss to Rising Star last week and will really be up for this one. If the Panthers can continue their fine defensive play they have a good shot at the undisputed title in 14A with a 5-0 record. The district race could be thrown into a three-way tie if the Bears win and the Wildcats win their game over Tolar. So it all boils down to the fact that the Panthers will have to win this game to be assured of a playoff spot.

JIM PARKER NAMED LEGISLATOR OF THE YEAR

The Texas Municipal League (TML), representing over 940 Texas cities and over 13,000 local officials, named State Representative Jim Parker (D-Comanche) as its Legislator of the Year at the TML Annual Conference in Corpus Christi Oct. 25-27.

The award was unprecedented in that it was given a year during which the state legislature did not meet in regular session. TML normally make a Legislator of the Year presentation following each regular session to outstanding members of the House

of Representatives and the Texas Senate. However, in appreciation of the work Representative Parker did during special sessions on legislation limiting the personal liability of all public officials, the League made the award in an "off-year."

The bill would have limited the individual liability of public servants if the action giving rise to a claim was within the scope of their official duties. Governments across the country are experiencing a crisis in hiring and retaining qualified employees because public employees

NOVEMBER 8, 1990 face unlimited personal liability for

doinf their jobs. After passing the House overwhelmingly, the bill died in the Senate on the final day of the last special session.

TML President Joan Baker (Mayor Pro Tem of Lubbock) said in making the award that Rep. Parker "...is a true and great friend to Texas cities and all public employees in the state and we can never thank him enough for the work he did." Rep. Parker said he plans to refile the legislation as soon as possible for consideration in the next session, which begins in January 1991. "Like General Douglas MacArthur, 'I shall return',' said Parker.



Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot.





A Georgia firm hs reportedly contacted a local resident by telephone and informed the person that he was a top winner and had won \$25,000.00 but before it could be paid the senior citizen would have to send the firm \$798.00. When the man replied that he didn't have that much, he was informed that he could send in a little over \$500.00 and receive \$2,500.00. Another younger man was told that for \$3,999.00 he would get the top prize of \$15,000.

Based on the information given by the senior citizen and the investigation by the Eastland Police Dept., this is nothing more than a scam, said Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton. He said the matter came to light when a concerned citizen called Walton who immediately contacted Eastland Police Chief Lyndall Underwood and newly appointed Chief Cecil Funderburgh.

Waltom said that everyone should be alert to possible fraud and scams such as unscrupulous door to door and telephnoe peddlers of all kinds of get rich schemes and house repairs such as roofs, painting foundation, etc., and insurance agents. 
