





### I wo more men sentenced in Eastland ring

LUBBOCK - Two Big Country residents were sentenced Friday in Lubbock's federal court for participating in an Eastland Countybased drug ring.

Billy Delbert Dickey, 42, of Brownwood received 12.9 years in prison. Dickey pleaded guilty to two counts - money laundering and conspiracy to manufacture and distribute methamphetamine. Dickey must be supervised for five years after his release from prison.

David Andrew Griffin, 38, of Rising Star received 21 months in jail for maintaining a place for the manufacture of methamphetamine. Griffin received three years' supervised release.

Twelve people have been sentenced in connection with a drug ring operated by Steve Benifiel out of Benifiel's Ranger wrecker service. Last week, Benifiel was sentenced to 12 years in prison, and former Eastland County Sheriff Dee Hogan received a three-year sentence for obstructing justice.

Thirty-two people have pleaded guilty on charges related to the drug ring.

#### WATCH FOR FUNGUS

ON TOMATO PLANTS All the rain and hot temperatures has made everything in home gardens grow wonderfully. These same conditions have made it ideal for early blight and gray leafspot to develop rapidly on tomato plants.

Early blight and gray leafspot are fungi that are usually present but do not cause extensive damage to tomato plants. The high humidity and warmer temperatures have been perfect for the rapid development of these fungi resulting in severe leaf loss on the tomato plant.

The symptoms of early blight and gray leafspot are very similar and it is difficult to tell which fungus you may have. It is very likely that you have both fungi present.

The first symptoms of early blight and gray leafspot occur on the lower leaves. The lower tomato leaves turn yellow and have small leafspots in the early stage of development. The leaves will then develop a burned up appearance. These dried up leaves are generally the first symptom when most people realize they have a problem. Left untreated the fungi can move up to the tomato plant until just the top of the plant has green leaves.

There are many fungicides available to control early blight and gray leafspot. Some fungicides that may be available locally are Manzate or Bravo. Most fungicides will require repeat applications if ideal conditions for the fungi continue.

Read label instructions for recommended days between application and harvest restrictions. Always read and follow label instructions.

#### FALL WEBWORMS APPEARING

Fall webworms have begun appear -ing throughout the county. I have seen them on mulberry and pecan

You may be asking yourself -"How can these be fall webworms in the middle of June?" There can be as many as four generations of fall webworms a year depending on the

Fall webworms are the larval stage of moths. The larvae are about 1 inch long and are pale yellow or green. . This course will be taught by They are covered by tufts of long whitish hairs. A dusky stripe bordered by a yellow stripe will be on the back. The main identifiable characteristic of the fall webworm is the web it builds in the tree or limb.

The fall webworm will feed on a variety of trees and shrubs. I have seen webs in mulberry, popular, willow, pecan and oak.

Newly hatched larvae begin feeding and spin a web over the foliage as they feed. These webs can cover an entire branch. A large amount of

defoliation can weaken a tree and could result in the tree dying.

Control can be accomplished with out insecticides where they are only one to two webs in a larger tree. Simply prune out the web and destroy it.

In trees which are too small or the webs are too numerous for pruning an insecticide may be required. Before applying an insecticide, use a large pole to break up the web. This will help the insecticide reach the larvae. A high pressure spray will also be required to reach the taller trees and help penetrate the web.

These are several insecticides which can be used for fall webworms. Some of these products are Dipel, Sevin, Diazinon and Malathion. Whichever product you selectmake sure you read and follow the label instructions.

The publication entitled Fall Webworms (L-1811), is available in the County Extension Office located in the basement of the courthouse in Eastland.

#### SECOND GENERATION PECAN NUT CASEBEARER

If you sprayed on May 22nd for the first generation of pecan nut casebearer, then the second generation should be watched for before July 3rd. The recommendation is to spray for the second generation 42 days after the first generation spray, which would be July 3rd if you sprayed on May 22nd for the first generation.

Because timing is so critical in controlling the pecan nut casebearer, you should inspect your own trees. The female pecan nut casebearer moth lays its eggs on the tips of the nuts. The newly laid eggs are just visible to the naked eye and are greenish white in color. The egg color will turn greenish-brown then to a brown before the larvae hatches. The larvae hatches from an egg in 3 to 5 days.
