A 1968 graduate of Abilene High, Sam earned his Bachelor of Science Degree from McMurry Collehe in 1972, and his Master of Education from Abilene Christian University in 1984.

Spring is nearly here - so that means its nearly time foe the Business Alliance's Annual Easter Egg Hunt.



### **CONTROLLING PLUM CURCULIO**

During the week I received numerous calls asking, "when do you spray for that little worm that is found around the seed of peaches or plums when they are cut open". This little worm that people are asking about is focus on better pecan orchard manthe plum curculio. If your trees have a history of this pest, then you need let, manager of Leonard Bend Farm, to take control measures.

The plum curculio is difficult to control because there is usually more than one egg laid. Control is usually best achieved with three separate insecticide applications.

The recommended timing for insecticide applications to control plum curculio are as follows: The first application should be made at petalfall, when 75 percent of the flower petals have fallen. Apply the second application at shuch split, when the calyx separates from the base of the newly formed fruit. The third application should be made when newly exposed fruit are seen.

Malathion and varbaryl (Sevin 50 percent WP) are the recommended insecticides for control of plum curculio. Read label instructions for mixing and rates. Always read and follow label instructions.

As stated earlier in this article, plum curculio is hard to control. Following this spray program will not guarantee you will not have a problem, but it will put the odds in your favor.

A complete spray program guide for pecans, peaches and plums is available at the County Extension Office located in the basement of the county courthouse. The guide is called: "Homeowner's Fruit and Nut Spray Schedule".




