Members of 8 local organizations attended the TXDoT Adopt-A-Highway meeting on Monday evening in the Community Center. Ms. Tammy Weiser from the Eastland office conducted the meeting. She went over the rules and regulations of being a part of the program as well as many pros and

Participating groups are: Gorman Livestock Raisers Association/Gorman FFA, C.R.O.S.S. Trainers Youth Group, Gorman Lions Club, Local Masonic Lodge, Gorman GROW, GHS National Honor Society, Boy Scout Troop 38/Cub Scout Pack 38, and 7 & 8 grade Science Class. These groups along with Birdsong employees, who have had theirs for years, will keep our highways in and out of town clean for up to four miles! They range the city limits signs to four miles out on Hwy. 6 east, Hwy. 6 west, FM 8 east, FM 8 west, and Duster hwy. (FM 769) south.

Panthers Fall To Bears; **Host Buffaloes Friday**

The Gorman Panthers host to the undefeated Cross Plains Buffaloes at Brogdon Field on Friday night and played the Buffs a very good game, holding the Buffs to a 12-7 lead at halftime, but turned the ball over to the Buffs at the Gorman 15 and 19 on two occasions and the Buffs scored in each of the two last half quarters to edge the Big Red 24-15.

The Buffs scored on this first possession after a partial block of a Panther punt try. The Buffs got the ball on the Gorman 19 and scoed in 4 plays with Tony Beggs getting the final 4 yards on a keeper play with 8:19 left in the period. The kick try failed and the score was 6-

Cross Plains held the Pan-The groups are excited to hold their thers on their next possession and got the ball on the Gorman 44. Following a 35 yard scamper to the Gorman 5 by Chris Kitchens, he ran in from 5 yards out for the TD with 5:35 left in the first. A running play for the 2 pointer failed and the score was 12-0.

> Gorman hit the scoreboard with 1:35 left in the half when Ben Longoria picked up a Buff fumble and ran it in from 29 yards out. Adrian Sichau added the point after and the score stood at 12-7 at the intermission.

The Gorman Panther Marching Band performed before the game and showed the fans the performance they wound present at the Band Contest at Glen Rose on Saturday at noon. The Cross Plains Band performed at the halftime break and both bands did a very good

On their next possession after halftime the Buffs got the ball on the Gorman 15 following a bad snap on a punt try and scored in only 2 plays with the help of a Panther penalty. Scott Macky scored from 2 yards out on a run with 3:34 left in the third. The run for the 2 point play failed and the Buffs led 18-7.

After holding the Big Red on their next possession the Buffs got the ball on their own 38 and scored in 12 plays with Ketchens getting the final yard with 6:16 left in the game. Again the kick try failed and Cross Plains had a 24-

But the Panthers weren't done as they took the ball on their own 32 and scoed in 5 plays with Steven Patel getting the final yard with 11 seconds left on the clock. The drive featured a 30 yard pass to David Seaton and a 28 yard pass to Michael Lynch. On the point after kick try a bad snap led to a 2 point play when Patel caught a pass in the end zone to make the score 24-15. This ended the game as Gorman tried an onside kick and that failed.

Patel led the Panthers with 54 yards on 12 tries. Jacob McCullough had 16 on 6 carries. Ben Longoria had 25 on 7 tries. Josh Longoria had a -13, losing yardage on 3 pass tries. Kitchens led the Buffs with 120 yards on 15 tries.

The Panthers travel to May on Friday night for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff. Follow the Big Red and back them to victory.

Underwood Makes Statement

Paving some roads seems to be a big issue. We had a man give us an estimate to top 8/10 of a mile of asphalt we already had. We were to furnish all of the equipment and material except the laydown machine and the emulsion (the liquid to make it stick together), the price was about \$26,000.00. With the budget being \$64,000.00 LESS than last year and 38 more miles of road, a total of 287 miles in Pct. 3. I don't believe you can do much paving and take care of the rest.

I will work with the cities of Pct. 3 any way I can to help with things they don't have the equipment to do with. I will work to keep the tax rate as low as possible. No part of the Pct. will be treated any different than the other, it is a large Pct. and I will be working for all of the people of Pct. 3, if you the voters elect me as your Commissioner.

Elizabeth ann Keith went home to be with her Lord on Monday, October 23, 2000 after a long and courageous battle with cancer.


She was born July 21, 1938 to Ira Selle and Faye Emily Tucker in Grand Falls, Texas. She was 62 years old.



Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh. For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die:

5. But if ye through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live.

In verses twelve and thirteen, Paul declares that we are debtors, i.e. we owe someone. In these verses he does not say whom we owe. However, he is clear about whom we do not owe. He specifically states that we owe nothing to our flesh.

Now if any man have not yourselves unto God, as those that are alive from the dead, and your members as instruments of righteousness unto God. I speak after the manner of men because of the infirmity of your flesh: for as ye have yielded your members servants to uncleanness and to iniquity unto iniquity; even so now yield your members servants to righteousness unto holiness.

> We are instructed in these verses to refrain from yielding ourselves to sin. Paul declares this to be a problem because of the infirmity of our flesh. He is stating that in our flesh there is a sickness/weakness. It is in our nature to do evil instead of good.

> Paul goes on to say that in the same manner in which we served sin prior to coming to Christ, we should now yield to righteousness unto holiness.

Many today struggle with this, almost as if we are indebted to the flesh. There have even been 'statements of doctrine' taught that we have to sin a little each day. This is not according to scripture. We owe nothing to the flesh. We owe everything to Christ. Romans 6.1-3

Paul declared in Romans 8.12 & 13 that if we continue to yield ourselves to the flesh, that we will die. The death referred to here is not a physical death, but a spiritual one. Ezekiel 18:20 The soul that sinneth, it shall die.

There are those who struggle with the flesh as recorded by Paul in Romans 7. How can we overcome this sickness and serve God according to scripture, holy and acceptable to him? Romans 12.1 There is a way to be free. More next week. Address com-

What is repentance exactly? The Bible shows us that there are 6 aspects to Repentance. We will call them "The Six R's of Repentance." (a) First, there must be a Recognition. Of what? We must recognize the fact that we all have sinned and fallen short of the mark (Rom. 3:23). We must recognize the fact that our sins have offended God and have separated us from Him (Isa. 59:1-2). We must recognize the fact that we need God and the salvation that only He can provide (John 1:29). But there is more to repentance than just a recognition of these things. (b) Secondly, there must be a Remorse or Regret (Acts 8:13, 20-24). Why is this necessary? Because Godly sorrow brings forth repentance (2 Cor. 7:10). We are sorry not because we "got caught" as worldly sorrow works, but because we have offended God and we are not right with Him. That sorrow causes us to look to God for our salvation. Surely the news that we have offended Him will make all but the hard hearted of this world sorry. Truly, there is no repentance without sorrow, but there can be sorrow without repentance (as in the worldly type). Yes, Godly sorrow must precede repentance, but repentance is much more than just remorse or regret. Next week we will look at the 4 other






