## Congressional Communication **Essential On GATT**

Growers and peanut industry related business people are responding to the suggestion that communication with elected officials be continued in expressing grave concern about the GATT

The grower leadership is responsible for advising not only the grass roots producers segment of the imposing threat, but also is responsible for carrying the message to people who make up the communities in peanut production

The grower leadership can and is proceeding with the task of informing affected parties and encouraging their participation in the process of urging members of the House and Senate to vote in opposition to extending fast track legislative authority to the administration and U.S. trade representatives.

Long time observers have expressed the feeling that the current U.S. GATT proposal to eliminate protection against importation of foreign peanuts and the phasing out of the price support program constitutes the greatest threat that peanut growers have ever faced.

Until recently, key Congressmen were saying that they were hearing nothing from folks in the countryside. It seems strange to many that a problem which looms this large over the industry was practically hidden for the past 4 years. The U.S. proposal to GATT in June of 1987 calling for the elimination of all farm programs in all industrialized countries of the world apparently was not taken seriously by the farm segment. Then as the GATT negotiations proceeded, through 1988, 1989 and 1990 it seemed that no agreement would be possible due principally to refusal of the European Com-

munity to modify their farm programs. There is a concensus now that because of increased farm program cost in the European Community, those countries are now willing to talk seriously about an and a GATT agreement becomes inagreement.

Washington agriculture consultants agree that the Bush Administration has managed to revive the movement toward an international trade agreement and appears to be making considerable progress. More significantly, large num-

## **Local Citizens Urged To** Help Save Peanut Program

The peanut program for our local farmers are in a great threat posed by the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade. This is most serious threat to the peanut prorgram that we have seen ever according to Ross Wilson, Manager of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association.

Congress will decide June 1 whether to grant the Administration's request to extend authority for Fast Track legislation to implement any further GATT Agreement.

Everyone in the area are urged to write or call your Congressman and Senators to oppose to extending the authority for Fast Track approval of any GATT Agreement.

Following is a sample of the letters for guidelines to writing:

Dear Congressman (or Senator):

I believe American Agricultrure is of vital importance to our national economy. As a peanut producer I am proud of the contribution our segment of agriculture has made to U.S. agriculture and the national economy. I am deeply concerned over developments regarding renewal of fast track authority for a GATT Agreement.

In my opinion fast track approval would subject the peanut program and Section 22 to disastrous changes without the Agriculture Committees action. Changes in these areas would be harmful to all peanut producers an to the economy of our communities.

As my elected representative (or senator) I request you to vote against an extension of the fast track provision.

Since the announcement did not occur, speculation now is that there will be no formal announcement from the administration. But there can be no complete assurance of the White House decision at this point in the absence of an official announcement. However, from a feasibility standpoint, the point in time that imports could be received and marketed prior to the July 31 deadline suggested by the International Trade Commission will April 9 to appeal for Department sup-

ports will be permitted this year were to the President in a strongly worded welcomed by the nation's peanut producers and shellers. Although the request for imports was rapidly losing steam due to the revised supply-demand numbers that reflected ample domestic supplies, one could not rule out the politics and philosophical leanings against import restrictions that invariably surface in this kind of controversy. Grower and sheller groups were persistent in their opposition to imports throughout the long period of consideration by the ITC and other government agencies. Much credit is also due House Agriculture Subcommittee Chairman, Charles Hatcher, who was very effective in his appeals to the Secretary of Agriculture and U.S. Trade Representatives. Mr. Hatcher never relaxed his effort in opposing imports from the January 22, ITC Hearing date until the final decision was made. Peanut grower and sheller organizations likewise deserve much credit for the development and presentation of responsible supply statistics over a period of many weeks.

Following several months of controversy and with almost all industry groups opposed to peanut imports, the International Trade Commission on March 15 announced that it was recommending to the President imports of varying quantities of peanuts. Most of the speculation on imports centered around the number of 150,000 tons, since two of the four ITC commissioners recommended imports at that level. A date of July 31 was also set as the final date for peanuts to enter the United States.

The Peanut Butter and Nut Salters Association had filed a petition with the ITC last October 12 requesting that peanut imports be permitted. Most of the reasons cited as justifying imports by the User Associations at that time and since then have proved to be inaccurate. It has now been established beyond any doubt that the supplies of peanuts are adequate for the current marketing year and are adequate to provide a reasonable carryover to supply the market in August and September of this year until 1991 crop marketing is initiated.

One of the key factors in the ITC de-

cision was reported to be the very weak position of the USDA as presented at the January 22 ITC Hearing. Although the Department's statement seemed to conclude that no peanut imports were justified, a closing thought indicated that a reasonable quantity of imports would do no harm. That statement appeared to offer considerable encouragement to a Trade Commission philosophically inclined toward a total free market concept. Only one of the three ITC members voted to hold the line on imports.
