



Ross N. Popejoy **Passes Away**


The angels in heaven rejoiced on Friday, December 10, when Ross Popejoy went to join them.



As we continue discussing what

Jesus said about the necessity of being baptized to wash away our past sins, it is noticed that the Bible says that salvation is only available "in Christ" (2 Tim. 2:10) and we are "baptized into Christ" (Gal. 3:27). Without baptism we could not get into Christ, the only place salvation can be found (Acts 4:12). No where in the bible does it say we can "believe" into Christ. + Baptism = Salvation. It is interesting to note that every New Testament conversion account ended in baptism (Acts 2:41; 8:12; 8:38; 9:18; 10:47-48; 16:15; 16:33; 18:8). Jesus knew what He was talking about when He commanded baptism (Matt. 28:19). Jesus knew that baptism stands between a sinner and (1) the salvation of his soul (Mark 16:16); (2) the remission of his sins (Acts 2:38); (3) becoming a child of God (Gal.3:26-27); (4) having his sins washed away (Acts 22:16); (5) getting into Christ (Rom. 6:3); (6) being forgiven (Col. 2:11-14); (7) becoming a Christian (1 Cor. 1:12-13); (8) entering the body of Christ (1 cor. 12:13); and (9) becoming a "true" believer (Acts 2:41; 8:12). Baptism is the consummating act of ones obedience to the Gospel. Look at the Biblical warning to those who do not obey the Gospel (2 Thess. 1:7-9). Have you obeyed the Gospel? Have you obeyed the words of Jesus?
