
Gibbs stated that the only negative thing he can see about taking the position is being so far away from his family and friends. "They don't really want me to go away, but I have to go where the money is."

AUGUST 29, 1991 Sen. Bob Glasgow Introduces **Sales Tax Bill**

AUSTIN - Legislation authored by Senator Bob Glasgow, D¶Stephenville, that expands the number of cities that may adopt a local sales and use tax to be used to reduce local property taxes was approved today August 23) by the Texas Senate.

Under the Glasgow amendment, all municipalities not served by

cial buildings. They can damage woolens, cotton, silks, synthetic fabrics, furs and carpeting. Clothes with perspiration are particularly attractive.

PEANUT FUNGICIDE UP-DATE No good news available for peanut producers who have to fight Sclerotinia blight and Southern Blight. The EPA has turned down the Section 18 label request for Botran for use on peanuts. As of press time, the EPA has not granted a Section 18 label request for Tilt and it is questionable if they will approve the request. This means that both of these products cannot be used on peanuts.

The only fully labeled product for Sclerotinia Blight control is Rovral. Chemicals labeled for control of Southern Blight are Vitavax or Terraclor (PCNB). Read and follow label instructions for rates and applications. Additional information on these diseases and their control with these fungicides is available at the County Extension Office, 629certain types of transit authorities could adopt an additional local sales and use tax, with the provision that the rax increase be linked to provide property tax reductions. The sales tax increase would be a local option measure, and subject to voter approval.

Current law allows municipalities that are not included within the boundaries of a rapid transit or regional transit system, and do not have a population of more than 67,000 to add an additional sales and use tax to provide tax property reductions. Denton's population is 66,270. The amendment made by Senator Glasgow will allow municipalities of any size to adopt the additional sales tax, subject to voter approval, as long as the municipality is not within the boundaries of certain transit systems.

Senator Glasgow added the new language as a floor amendment to Senate Bill 41. "This amendment was brought to me by the City of Denton, but will prove beneficial for municipalities throughout Texas," said Glasgow. "It will allow the voters to adopt a sales tax in order to provide property owners some relief from their ad valorem tax burden."


