Panthers Surprise Buffaloes 56-36; Travel To Wildcat Country Friday

The Panthers got back on track on Friday night as they hosted the Cross Plains Buffaloes and shloked the Buffs by jumping out to a 22-0 lead in the first quarter before the Buffs could get started. The Panthers went on to complete a great game by outscoring the Buffs 56 to 36 in a Class A District 14A battle.

The Panthers hit the boards first with 5:58 left in the first period when Jason Ditmore raced in for the score from 12 yards out for ht eTD to cap an 80 yard drive in 12 plays. The drive featured runs of 14, 12, 98 and 9 by Ditmore Mario Rodriquez picked up the blocked point after kick and ran it in for a two point play to get Gorman on the board 8-0.

Then on the following possession by the Buffs, the Panthers recovered a Cross Plains bobble at the 12 yard line and scored in 4 plays with Ditmore again getting the honors feom 1 yard out with 3:52 left. Ditmore added the point after and Gorman led 15-0.

down the sideline for 70 yards and another score with 1:28 left in the third. Ditmore booted the point after and the Panthers were out front 50 to 22.

Gorman hit the scoreboard one more time with 10:12 left in the game when Don Mauney jumped on a Buff fumble in the end zone for the TD. The kick try failed and the score was 56 to 22.

The Buffs came back with 6:55 left and moved 80 yards in 9 plays with Jody Brown going the final 4 yards for the score. The point after made the score 56 to 29.

Then with 2:11 left in the game the Buffs scored again on a 24 yard scamper by Jody Brown to cap a 87 yard drive. The kick for point made the score 36 56 to 36. This ended the high scoring battle.

Jason Ditmore led the Panthers with 191 yards on 20 carries and Kris Scitern had one of his greatest nights massing 158 yards on 9 carries, and == Go Get 'Em Big Red!

The Panthers will be hard pressed again this Friday night as they travel to Rising Star for yet another crucial District 14A game with league leading Wildcats who stand at 2-0 in district after wins over Cross Plains and Santo. The Panthers and Wildccats always have sone great battles in the Wildcat den and this one will be no different as the two teams go at it in the district race. If the Panthers can again come through with another great offensive showing they should do well against the Wildcats.


