

Rural residents of Eastland County, those living outside City limits, will be notified by mail what their house numbers will be and where the given number be placed.

You are responsible for purchasing your numbers and placing the numbers in the proper place. Numbers are available at Higginbotham's or Wal-Mart. If you are not sure of the correct number for your residence, check your Texas Electric or City of Gorman Utility bill. Should you need further assistance in determining the correct number, please contact the City of Gorman Office.

Maps have been presented to the local Police and Fire Departments to assist in locations relating to 9-1-1 Service. The Police Department of Gorman has made spot test calls and has reported the service was working properly. For your Safety, Please, Get Your House Numbered.

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





Applications for emergency farm are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) offices located in Eastland and Callahan Counties, FmHA County Supervisor Jack Phillips said today.

Eastland and Callahan Counties are 2 of 31 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the flooding.

Phillips said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Phillips said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this this emergency designation will be accepted until August 26, 1992 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing.
