Panthers Squeak By Bulldogs

The Gorman Panthers traveled to Hamilton on Friday night to take on the Bulldogs and came away with a hard fought 13 to 12 win, coming from behind in the last 3:36 minutes for the victory after trailing 12 to 7.

The Bulldogs hit the scoreboard first in the first period. They took the ball on their own 36 and went the distance in just one snap of the ball, as the quarterback Brandon Young, took the snap rolled out to his left and raced untouched for the TD with 6:50 left in the period. The kick for point failed and the Bulldogs led 6-0.

The Panthers came right back on the next possession and after taking the ball on their own 37, moved the distance in 12 plays with Jade Warren catching a beautiful 14 yard TD pass from Rajee Patel with no time showing on the clock in the first period. The drive featured four penalties, three by Hamilton and one by the Panthers. Don Mauney put the Panthers ahead by booting the extra point and a 7-6 lead.

The score stayed the same until the 8:45 mark of the third quarter when the Bulldogs got the ball on the Panther 48 after a fumble recovery. From there lightning struck again in the same place as Young took the snap, rolled to his left and raced 48 yards for the score, untouched. The try for two points failed and the score stood at 12 to 7.

The Panthers just couldn't get a sustained drive going and the game was in question until the 3:36 mark of the final period. The Big Red defense got the ball on the Gorman defensive halfback Kris Scitern's interception of a Bulldog pass. On the first play Kris Scitern picked up 15 yards and a first down at the Hamilton 13. Then following a 3 yard run and two runs with no gain, Rajee Patel rolled out to his right and threw a perfect strike to Jade Warren, who ran in for the score. The Panthers then went for two points but the try failed and the score stood at 13 to 12.

The Big Red defense held the Bulldogs the rest of the way and intercepted a Bulldog pass on their final drive to insure the victory.

The Panthers were led by Kris Scitern on the ground with 94 yards on 13 carries. Tony Forbus had 45 on 13 tries. Rajee Patel got 59 on 13 keepers. Jade Warren got 15 on 9 tries.

Gorman's defense did a pretty good job most all night except for the two big runs when they seemed to be unable to stop the quarterback rollout play. The Panthers will really have to be ready this week when they host the up-and-coming Ranger Bulldogs in the Homecoming Game at Brogdon Field at 8 p. m. The Bulldogs have shown great improvement and have shown some real desire to play real tough football this

year. They have a new offense that the players like and are really having good success with it.

KRIS SCITERN NAMED

Kris Scitern has been named as the Abilene Reporter-News Defensive Player of the Week with 13 tackles, one interception, one sack and one blocked punt. Kris did a superb job. Chris Laminack came up with 11 tackles and 1 sack. Brent Skaggs had 7 tackles and a fumble recovery. In fact, all the Panther defense did a good job except for the two or three long runs when the


Bulldog quarterback got loose.

We feel that if the Panther defense





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

Eastland County tax rate set for 1992-93

By MAYBELLE TROUT Correspondent

EASTLAND - County commissioners Monday set a tax rate of 36.507 cents per \$100 valuation for fiscal year 1992-93.

Commissioners said the rate is 3 percent more than the effective tax rate of 34.721 cents. The effective rate raises the same amount of money as the 1992-92 tax rate.

"You are going to look at rollback rates next year," said Precinct 1 Commissioner Richard Robinson, who retires at the end of the year.

County Judge Scott Bailey said, "We'll balance the budget by going into reserves. We've done this the past two years.'

Commissioners agreed about \$200,000 will be needed from reserves to add to tax revenues. 'Somebody, sooner or later, will have to raise

taxes drastically - or cut services," Bailey said. Commissioners agreed to continue to allow resi-

dential homestead exemptions for citizens more than 65 years old or who are disabled. In another money matter, commissioners voted to

continue health insurance coverage with the West Central Texas Oil and Gas Association of Abilene after learning no other company wanted to cover county employees. Rates with WeCTOGA are increasing effective

Oct. 1 from \$250.93 to \$286.81 per employee per month. Dental and prescriptions are included. Insurance for dependents is increasing 15 percent.

In other business, commissioners: Agreed to allow Roger D. Wootton and Associates to conduct seismograph tests south of Interstate 20.

REGULATORY CONTROL **EDWARDS AQUIFER HAS** On September 10th the Edna BEEN OVERTURNED

WACO — A ruling by the Texas Water Commission seizing regulatory cintrol of the Edwards Aquifer has been overturned in State District Court, and has been termed a victory for private property owners in Texas, according to Texas Farm Bureau President S. M. True.

"The Texas Water Commission's actions were illegal," said the president of the state's largest general farm organization. "We've always felt that the Commission didn't have the authority to regulate underground water."

State District Judge Pete Lowery, in a summary judgment issued Spetember 11 in the case of Danny M Fadin and Texas Farm Bureau versus Texas Water Commission, declared TWC rules classifying the Edwards as an underground river -making it subject to state regulation - null and void.


