Eastland County tax rate set for 1992-93


EASTLAND - County commissioners Monday set a tax rate of 36.507 cents per \(\$ 100\) valuation for fiscal year 1992-93
Commissioners said the rate is 3 percent more than the effective tax rate of 34.721 cents. The effective rate raises the same amount of money as the 1992-92 tax rate
"You are going to look at rollback rates next year," said Precinct 1 Commissioner Richard Robinson, who retires at the end of the year.
County Judge Scott Bailey said, "We'll balance the budget by going into reserves. We've done this the past two years.
Commissioners agreed about \(\$ 200,000\) will be needed from reserves to add to tax revenues.
"Somebody, sooner or later, will have to raise
