The Panthers lost the battle of statistics on Friday night before an overflow Homecoming crowd, but came out on the winning end of the scoreboard as they nipped the Ranger Bulldogs 10 to 7 in the final seconds of the game. The fumble bug hurt the Panther cause, but the interceptions by the Big Red defense helped the Panther cause a great deal.

The teams played on even terms throughout the first quarter without either team getting any advantage other than statistics. Then in the second period the Panthers got a drive started on their own 20 yard line and scored in one single play when Tony Forbus took the handoff from Rajee Patel, raced around his right end, and brought the homecoming crowd to their feet on a beautiful 80 yard run with 6:52 left in the period for the score. Don Mauney added the point after and the Panthers were up 7-0.

The Bulldogs wasted little time in returning the favor as they took the ball on their own 36 and moved the distance in 7 plays with Todd Hatton passing to John David Johnson for 16 yards and the score with 5:19 left in the first half. Alfredo Abila booted the extra point and the score was tied at 7-7. The first half ended with the score knotted at the 7-7 mark.

The halftime activities the Homecoming Queen, Angela Treadway, was presented with a bouquet of roses. Her escort was Jade Warren. The Band Sweetheart was Melissa Clark and the Band Beau was David Campbell. Annette Love was named Football Sweetheart with Kris Scitem as escort.

The princesses and their escorts were Freshman Kim Campbell and Marco Herrera; sophomore Missy Jobe and Don Mauney and junior Gloria Madera and John Mart Stephens.

The Homecoming Queen nominees were Cari Daniels with escort Adam Hampton and Kathy White with escort Rajee Patel.

The Panther Marching Band, 78 members strong this season, really has been doing a great job at the halftime performances and the homecoming crowd were pleasantly surprised to see such a large number in

the band with the flag corp added this year. They did a great job under the direction of Band Director Lisa Laminack.

Following all the halftime activities the Panthers and Bulldogs got back to football and played on even terms all through the third period and not until the final second of the game was the deciding points scored. The Panther defense intercepted a Bulldog pass and set up a field goal try by Panther kicker Don Mauney, who had missed a field goal earlier in the period on an 18 yard field goal try. But this time with the game on the line Mauney lined up for the kick and following the good snap and good placement, Mauney booted the 18 yard field goal as time was running out and the Homecoming crowd went completely wild, as the Panthers pulled out a 10 to 7 win to please the crowd.

Tony Forbus was the leading ground gainer for the Panthers with 148 yards on 21 carries; Kris Scitem got 18 yards on 5 tries before being

injured. Jade Warren had 8 yards on 4 tries and Rajee Patel had a minus 15 on 6 keepers, being caught for losses on several pass tries.

The Big Red defense held the Bulldog rushing game to an incredible minus 7 yards, but the outstanding passing attack of the Bulldogs netted 293 yards as they kept the air full of footballs all night.

The Panthers will travel to Hico this Friday night to take on the State ranked Tigers, who are listed third in the ratings. The Hico Tigers have a real fine football team with an explosive offense that has scored more than 50 points in each of their first three games and are standing at 3-0. So the Big Red will really be tested this week and will have to have a stellar performance from their defensive unit to hold the Tigers.

So travel to Hico with the Big Red on Friday night and help support them as they take on the highly ranked Tigers.

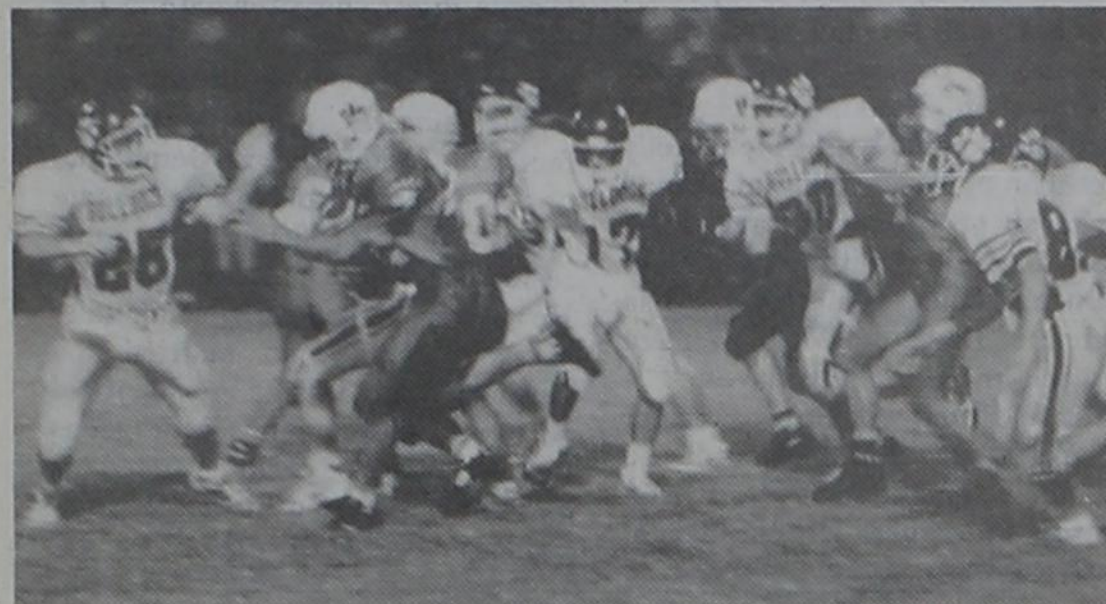

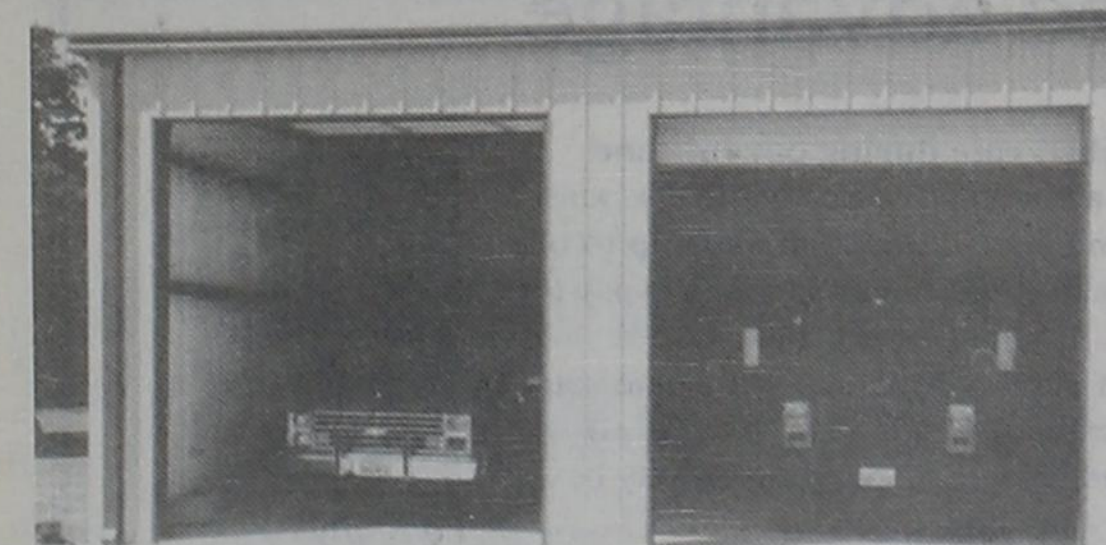

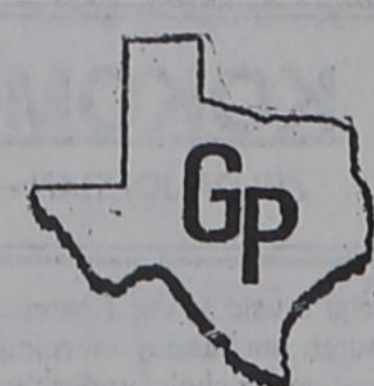


**NEW ADDITION TO FIREHALL** — Show is the newly expanded Fire Hall with all the new stalls filled with fire fighting equipment.

## TAAS Test To Be Taken October 27-29

Gorman students in Grade 11 will be taking the Exit Level TAAS Test in October. The Writing test will be administered on Tuesday, October 27. The English Language Arts test will be administered on Wednesday, October 28. The Mathematics test will be on Thursday, October 29th. By state law, students must pass all sections of the test in order to receive a high school diploma.
