

PANTHER COMEBACK EDGES **BUFFALOES; HOST EVANT**

WHAT A COMEBACK! The Panthers suffered through the first period and part of the second getting behind 19 to 0 before they came to life and started a drive for a score. Then they came back and completely dominated the Buffaloes in the second half for a 23 to 19 victory in District 13A.

The Buffaloes hit the scoreboard first in the initial quarter, when on their first possession they moved from their own 28 in 10 plays for the score with Jason Fleming getting the final 4 yards on a run with 5:36 left in the period. The drive featured runs of 5, 6, 10, and 15 and passes for 9 and 10 to set up the score. The kick try failed and Cross Plains led 6-0.

On the next series by the Panthers the Buffalo defense held and forced a Panther punt. The snap from center to the punter sailed over the head of the punter and the Buffaloes recovered on the Gorman 2 yard line. After a stiff defense holding the Buffs on the first two plays and a Buff penalty, Brock Walker scored from 11 yards out after being flushed out by the Panther pass rush with 2:09 left in the first. The try for two points failed and Cross Plains was up 12-0.

After holding the Panther offense again on the next possession, the Buffs took the ball on their own 37 and scored in 7 plays with Michael Cowan racing in from 20 yards out for the score with 9:22 left in the second. Kevin Switzer then added the point after and the Buffs were up 19 to 0 to a shocked Panther team.

However, on the next possession the Big Red offense finally got untracked and started a drive on their own 38 and killed four minutes off the clock and scored in 9 plays with Rajee Patel scoring from 11 yards out with 5:28 left in the half. The drive featured 9 yard run by Tony Farbus, a 7 yard run for a first down by Don Mauney; a 16 yard scamper by Rajee, a beautiful 35 yard run by Kris Scitern to set the Panthers up at the Cross Plains 11. Then Rajee scored the TD. On the try for extra points, Kris Scitern took the pitch and rammed over the line for 2 points to make the score 19 to 8.

The Buffs got a drive going but were stopped at the Panther 34. Then time ran out for the first half.

The Panther Marching Band (and the Cross Plains Band) really put on a great halftime show. Both bands thrilled the fans with their performances. The Big Red Band has really improved this year and have put on some great halftime performances.

Following the internission, the Panthers came out all fired up and took control of the game as they got the kickoff on their own 37 and went the distance in 15 plays to take almost all the third period on the clock and scored (despite three 10 yard holding penalties) with Tony Forbus scoring from 2 yards out with 6 For 45 3:56 left in the period. Rajee Patel rolled out to his left and ran the ball in for the two point play and the Panthers were on their way. The score stood at 19-16 but the Big Red were really in control.

On the next series of downs the Panthers got the ball on the Buff 43 and scored in 6 plays with Don Mauney ramming the ball in from the one for the score with 11:57 left in the game. The drive featured a beautiful 20 yard scamper by Kris Scitern; and a 14 yard brusing run by Don Mauney to the Cross Plains one foot line before Don took the handoff and blasted in for the TD with 11:57 left in the game. Henrik Bodlund booted the extra point and the Panthers were out in front 23 to 19.

From there the Panthers held on defense until the final minute of the game before the Buffs took over at their own 5 and were moving the ball via the shotgun offense before time ran out. Otherwise the Big Red defense had completely stymied the Buffs on offense in the final period. Enough can't be said for the great job the Big Red defense did after they came to life in the second half to shut down the Buffs. I won't name any one of the Panthers because they all did yoeman service for Gorman and are to be congratulated for their great performance to help their comeback victory.

The Buffs were held to a MINUS 37 yards on the ground in the second half. Other than the passing yardage in the final drive by the Buffs, the Big Red did great.

Kris Scitern led the Panthers on the ground with 90 yards on 8 carries. Rajee Patel got 80 on 16 keepers. Don Mauney, running in the fullback slot for the first time this season, had 70 yards on 17 trips and really carried the big load in the last half for the Panthers.

Gorman will play host to the Evant Elks at Brogdon Field on Friday at 7:30 in another very important 13A District tussle. The Elks and Panthers have always had some great battles and the Big Red defense and offense will have to have a great game to secure another victory.

FALL, HARVEST TIME SET STAGE FOR DIFFERENT KINDS OF PESTS

During the months of October and November, producers are generally busy with harvest and are not concerned with pest management other than shooting a few squirrels and crows. However, there are a few pest-management operations that should be considered and implemented where possible.

Fall pest-management operations can include sanitation, planting of cover crops and controlling depredating wildlife. All of these operations can be implemented around harvest operations.

Although sanitation has its limitations, all sanitation practices will be beneficial. Sanitation practices such as cleaning up and destroying shucks and pops at harvest can aid in reducing the over-wintering hickory shuckworm populations. Populations of wood-infesting insects such as twig girdlers that over-winter in severed twigs on the orchard floor, can be reduced by gathering and destroying fallen twigs and limbs.

During October and November winter legumes can be planted in orchards to enhance natural enemy populations in the spring. Before this practice is initiated though, soil pH and the presence of soil-borne dis-
