## Attention Peanut Producers!!!

Bill Boswell, Comanche County peanut producer, has requested that interested peanut producers contact the USDA on a proposed regulation that would limit disaster transfers of segregation 2 and 3 peanuts.

The USDA is proposing that disaster transfers must be covered with the farm's original quota pounds and with spring transfers of quota pounds. Under the USDA proposal, no fall transfers of quota pounds could be used to cover disaster transfers of segregation 2 and 3 peanuts.

Previously, fall transferred pounds could be used in disaster transfers

until marketing of segregation 2 or 3 peanuts were recorded on the farm marketing card.

Boswell suggested that those who are interested write the USDA at the following address and urge that the eligibility requirements for disaster transfers of segregation 2 and 3 peanuts not be changed from last year.

Letters must be received in Washington by July 20 in order to be considered.

## ASCS ACTIVITIES

### PEANUT SEED RECEIPTS

Peanut producers are reminded to bring their receipts for peanut seed purchases when they request measurement services or when they file their report of acreage.

### FINAL REPORTING DATE

The final date to file a report of planted acreages of peanuts, corn, grain sorghum, cotton, conserving use and ACR (set aside) is July 15th. Other crops for which an acreage report will be accepted include commercial vegetable crops, melons, guar, and any other crop that the farm operator wishes to establish a record of crop history.

### ACCURATE REPORTING

When filing an acreage report, be sure to file an accurate report. Failure to do so can result in loss of program benefits and the assessment of a monetary penalty. Measurement service is available and is recommended to those not sure of their exact acreage.

### spouse signature authority

Effective August 1st the signature requirements will be changed to permit a husband or wife to sign on behalf of the other for most farm programs in which either has an

interest. Written notification to the County Office will be required to deny the spouse this authority. Signatures under this policy will be accepted after July 31st unless a written objection has been filed with the County Office.

### ACP APPROVAL PERIOD

Requests for cost-sharing of conservation practices are continuously being accepted. The County Committee has determined that the next approval period will be July 16th for request filed by July 10th. Requests filed after this date will be considered at the next approval period.

Practices that are started prior to approval by the county committee are not eligible for cost-sharing.

### ACP PRACTICE MAINTENANCE

Producers that have been paid cost shares for establishing conservation practice on their farm are reminded that the practice must be maintained throughout the lifespan of the practice. Practices that have failed can be

put to another use only after the committee has determined that the practice failed due to no fault of the producer and a release of the practice is obtained. Practices that are converted to another use without prior committee approval will require a refund of the cost shares paid.

### PEANUT CROP SHARES

Lease documentation will be required when a peanut producer, other than the land owner, claims 100% share of the peanut crop. Producers are requested to bring copies of their cash lease or signed operator, tenant, and owner certifications when reporting their peanut acreage or when requesting measurement service.

If found to be inaccurate, a penalty could be assessed and could cause forfeiture of program benefits including price support.

### SPRING PEANUT TRANSFERS

The final date to temporarily transfer peanut quota under the spring transfer provisions in July 31st. This is also the final date to permanently transfer peanut quota. All transfers filed after this date will be considered fall transfers and will be subject to the 90 percent planting rule.

## ANIMAL CONTROL

The Gorman City Commission would like to inform the public that they have received numerous complaints because of stray animals. The Commission asks that each citizen see that their pets are fenced in or leashed. If this problem persists the City will be forced to obtain an Animal Control Officer and to run a pound. State mandates on animal control will cause the City to have a substantial increase of taxes to run the pound properly plus the expense of salary to an animal control officer plus his education now required.

The City does have an ordinance which is enforceable requiring citizens to have their pets vaccinated for rabies.

The City would greatly appreciate all help received from its' citizens.

## Private Property Rights Should Be Respected

Waco — Texas Farm Bureau President B. M. True said recently the U. S. Supreme Court's decision reaffirming the constitutionality of private property "sends a clear signal to government regulators that private property rights must be respected."

Responding to the High Court ruling in favor of a South Carolina landowner, True stated that governments at all levels henceforth will not be allowed to take away landowners' property "or the right to use property" without just compensation.

By a 6-2 vote recently, the U. S. Supreme Court, in "Lucas vs. South Carolina Coastal Council," overturned the state Supreme Court decision. The High Court ordered that a state regulatory agency pay just compensation to private landowner David Lucas for its "regulatory taking" of his two beachfront lots.

True called the Supreme Court's action one of the most historic decisions in years. However, he added the issue should never have reached the highest court in the land.

"It's a sad day when we have to go to court to prove or satisfy that private property is a cornerstone of our American way of life," True stated.

The president of the state's largest general farm organization commended the overwhelming decision by the Supreme Court, saying the ruling comes very close to reflecting what the framers of the Constitution intended when they drafted the document over 200 years ago.

AFBF President Dean Kleckner called the high court's ruling a "clear-cut victory for all Americans, including farmers and ranchers."

Kleckner, noting that AFBF had filed an Amicus Curiae (Friend of the Court) brief in support of Lucas, said ag producers have long since been subject to restrictive regulations impacting property rights.

"There is a lot at stake when regulators reduce or eliminate our ability to provide food and fiber for this nation," Kleckner stated.

The Lucas case stemmed from regulations imposed by South Carolina that rendered worthless two lots purchased by Lucas, who had planned to build a home for his family on one site and sell the other.

Before Lucas could do either, the state enacted the Beachfront Management Act which left Lucas' plans and a sizable investment in ruin.

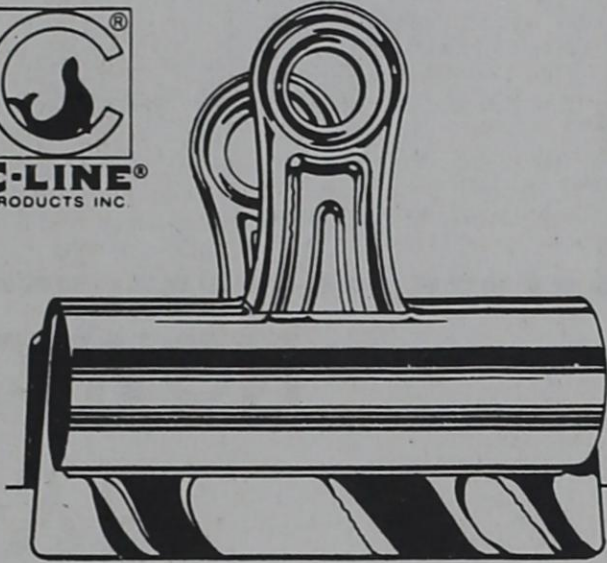
In its ruling, the Supreme Court also asked the South Carolina Supreme Court to review the question of whether Lucas knew about the beachfront regulations when he purchased his lots.

John Rademacher, AFBF's general counsel, said the court's favorable ruling toward property rights returns the nuisance exception which regulators have attempted to apply broadly to its basic common-law roots.

This, in turn, Rademacher observed, should expand the range of circumstances in which state and federal governments must pay compensation when regulations intended to benefit the public destroy the value of an individual's property.

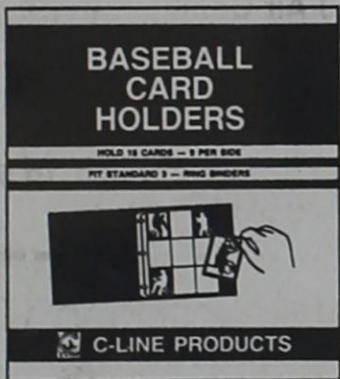
Rademacher stated that the ruling strengthens the language in the U. S. Constitution's Fifth Amendment which states that private property shall not be taken without "just compensation."

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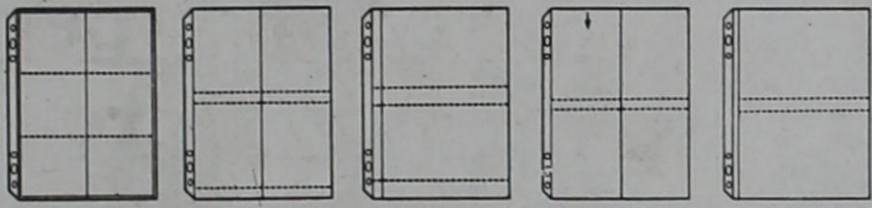
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# Patient Self-Determination Takes Place In Health Care Facilities

A new Federal law effective December 1, 1991 informs all adults of their right to make decisions about their own medical care, according to Glyn Hammons, manager of the

Abilene office.

The new law concerns "advance directives", which is government wording for what is commonly known as "Living Wills" and "Durable

Power of Attorney for Health Care". An advance directive is generally a written statement that a person completes (most often while that person is in good health), that details how medical decisions should be made on his/her behalf should that person become unable to make decisions for him/herself. The written statement may also name a representative or proxy to make the person's wishes known to providers of health care services.

The new law requires most hospitals, nursing facilities, home care programs, hospices, and health maintenance organizations to give information on State law covering advance statements and on their policy toward honoring them.

Hammons emphasizes that the decision to develop a written statement to control medical treatment is strictly voluntary. If someone makes an advance statement, that document can be changed or cancelled at any time. The important thing to remember is that the advance directive allows a person to say yes to treatment wanted and no to treatment not wanted.

The new Federal law does not require that States enact any particular legislation. The actual substance of the state laws concerning advance directives remains a matter for the states and will differ.

Hammons said people who need more information on advance statements should contact their personal physicians or the care facility where they will be treated. People eligible for medical assistance should contact the State Medicaid Agency for further information.

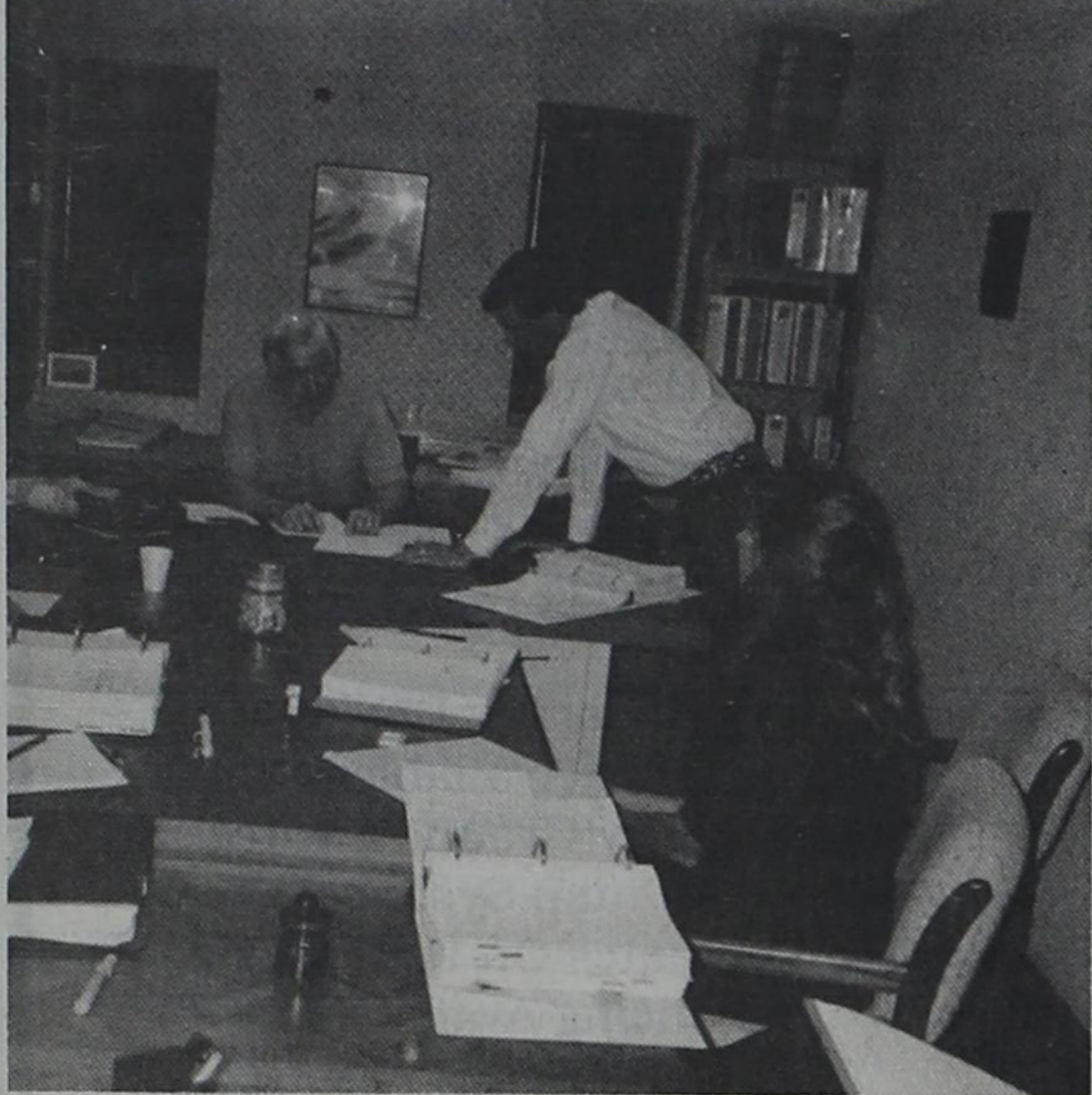
## ASCS Deputy Director Visits Eastland Office

The peanut program was first automated nation-wide in 1987 after the successful completion of a pilot project in 1986. The automated program was the first electronic accumulation of producer data used by government or private sector. The program utilizes a Smart Marketing Card which employs a computer chip embedded in an embossed plastic card the size of a credit card.

Forlines is evaluating the administration of the overall automated peanut program in a series of meetings in Central and Western Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma. Local ASCS personnel provided in-

## FULL RETIREMENT AGE SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS LIST

People born after 1937 will have to be older than age 65 before they will be eligible to receive their full Social Security retirement benefits, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said today.

While life expectancies have increased dramatically since Social Security was enacted in 1935, the retirement age has remained the same.

People who are reaching retirement age now can start their Social Security benefits as early as age 62, but their benefit amount is reduced. If they wait until age 65 to start their Social Security, they receive a full, unreduced benefit.

The usual retirement age for people retiring now is age 65. Social Security calls this "full retirement age," and the benefit amount that is

payable is considered the full retirement benefit.

Because of longer life expectancies, the full retirement age will be increased in gradual steps until it reaches age 67. This is the result of legislation enacted in 1983. This change starts in the year 2000, and it affects people born in 1938 and later.

## Gov. Richards Announces New Bond Program

Governor Ann Richards announced on June 30th that the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) has established a new Single Family Bond Program to help low and moderate income Texans buy a home.

The program offers mortgage financing at a 7.41 percent interest rate, one of the lowest in the nation.

"Home ownership has long been regarded as the equivalent of the American dream," Richards said. "For Texans that dream has become increasingly difficult to attain.

"That is why I am pleased to see TDHCA establish this new Single Family Bond Program aimed at making ownership more affordable for low and moderate income Texans," Richards said.

Under the program, participating lenders must reserve 25 percent of their funds for low income persons during the first six months of the program. In addition, the department is also incorporating an extensive marketing campaign to reach these potential homebuyers.

The new program began about July 8th. During the first two weeks of July, the department will conduct eight home buying seminars throughout the state.

The Department identified areas of the state which traditionally have not participated in the Single Family Bond Program and campaigned to get representation in those areas. As a result, lenders are now participating in 17 counties that have not had past participation.

The Department is also offering down payment assistance covering two-thirds of the down payment for low and very low income persons. Through this program, the department hopes to assist Texans who are unable to make a down payment. The loans are available at zero percent interest and do not have to be paid back until the borrower sells the home.

The 72nd Texas Legislature created TDHCA by merging the former Texas Housing Agency and the former Texas Department of Community Affairs. The Community Development Block Grant was also transferred from the Texas Department of Commerce to TDHCA.

The TDHCA is dedicated to helping achieve an improved quality of life through the development of netter Texas communities.
