

Precinct 3, the entire County Commission voted 3 to 1 to "realign" Justice of the Peace Precincts 3 and 5 and abolish the Constable positions in both Gorman and Rising Star.

Eventually, the justices of the peace and constables in these two precincts will be eliminated. Those now in office will be "allowed" to serve out their terms before changes take place. Terms in these offices will go through 1994. "Liberty, justice for all, that's what would be taken from people if the precinct constable was abolished," stated Gene Hicks, constable of Rising Star Precinct 3. "Citizens down there don't ask for much, but they do want protection."

The Commissioners hope to make a saving of \$60,000 a year by realigning the precincts. The realign ment will put Precincts 5 and 1 together. Precincts 3 and 4 will be combined, and Precinct 2 will remain the same.

Representatives from the City of Gorman and Birdsong Peanuts spoke on behalf of Precinct 5 Justice of the Peace V. O. Huff. L. T. Owen, Precinct 3 (gorman and Rising Star), said people in the southern part of the county had been short-changed for too long. He made a motion that no action be taken, but the motion died for the lack of a second. Owen was the only Commissioner to vote against the proposal.

I don't know exactly what the Commissioners intend to do with "our \$60,000 in tax money" that should be used in our behalf. I guess they will up the salary of the other justices or just throw it on the pile that is used for "The Most Important Portion" of the County (Eastland, Cisco and Ranger). I think maybe since the commissioners have again given us "The Shaft" that they may as well go ahead and abolish this part of the county and "Just Take Us Off the Tax Rolls". Now that would be a good idea. Then we could form our own county and tell the "Big Shot Commisioners" to collect taxes from their own part of the county and just leave us alone. After all, folks! they think we don't exist anyway! If the people of the southern part of the county don't deserve any county services, then we don't deserve to be forced to pay county taxes for county services that just don't exist for us. When you think of it - - just what does the County of Eastland really do for our part of the





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

#### **TEXANS LEARN A NEW NAME** FOR SHADE

Horticulturists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are recommending a tree with an unfamiliar name, Chinese pistache (pronounced pis-tash'), as theit top choice for urban landscapes, particularly where space is limited.

The name may be new to most consumers, but the tree has the same reliable characteristics we depend on for shade trees, they say.

"The Chinese pistache (Pistacis chinensis] is one of the best medium size trees for most areas of Texas," Dr. Steve George, Dallas Extension Horticulturist. "Its performance is simply outstanding under Texas conditions."

"In fact, this tree is adapted to all areas of Texas except the Rio Grande Valley," said George. "Deeply rooted, it prefers well-drained, moderately dry soils but will tolerate most soil types, even the rocky, abused, alkaline soils common on new home sites across Texas.

"Also, with oak wilt threatening the popular live and red oaks in many areas, Texans should diversify their choices of trees. Overplanting any one species may open the door to widespread destruction from disease or insects attacking a single kind of tree."

This native of China has been highly recommended for years by horticultural experts at Texas A&M, Oklahoma State and Kanses State Universities.

"Years of field trials have proved it to be one of rhe most beautiful, pest free, and easily maintained shade trees for the Soutiwest and Gulf Coast regions," George said.

Winter hadry as far north as central Kansas, the pistache forms an umbrella-like canopy and at step to lowering that cost.

"Weaning weights of 650 pounds are often overhead in coffee shops, but seldom achieved," he said. "The average comes closer to 433 pounds when expressed on an exposed femake basis (number of females that were mated with a bull)."

The antional average reflects total pounds of calf weaned divided by total number of exposed females. Thos calculation, probably the best measure of performance from a herd production standpoint, combines several production traits, he said.

Standardized records will allow for development of a national data base. Voluntary participation in the data base offers access to comparative data for similar operations and environments. All producer information is confidential, he added.

A yearly SPA can provide cow-calf producers a true measure of profit, needed managerial information and financial information for consulting with lenders.

SPA users rely on worksheets and software developed specifically for this program. A computer is not necessary to become involved with SPA. The software uses the producer's annual production and financial data to calculate selected perform-

three feet each year. Within 10 years it will become large enough to play a major role in the home landscape, George said.

Its medium to fine-textured foliage provides a light shade pattern. The leaves retain their deep green color during the hrowing season, and fall colors are spectacular bursts of orange, red-orange and even crimson. The wood of the pistache is extremely hard and durable, as well as decay resistant, which makes it safer from wind, ice and vandal injury.

Fruit set occurs on the female tree and consists of clusters of small, round green berries which turn reddish-purple to bright red in the fall. These fruit clusters make excellent table decorations. And while inedible for humans, birds relish it.

Beginning October 22, the Extension Service began a statewide educational effort to make Texans more aware of the desirable features of the Chinese pistache. "This campaign coincides with the pistache showing its fall colors," continued George. "This means ypu can select a tree with the most attractive color. Contrary to popular opinion, fall, not spring, is the best time to plant most trees. The roots continue to establish themselves during the dormant season."

The first shade tree to receive the "Earth-Kind" designation from the Extension Service, the pistache's high levels of resistance to insect and disease problems is vital to reducing pesticide use.

"Enlightened plant selection is critical to achieving the "Earth-'kind'' goal of beautiful, productive plants with minimum effort and maximum protection for the environment," said George. "Choose a plant well adapted to your soil and climate, with moderate growth rate, built-in resistance to disease and insects. That will reduce or eliminate the need for pesticide applications. Chinese pistache trees fit all these criteria."

#### **COW-CALF MANAGEMENT: KNOWING YOUR TRUE PRODUCTION AND PROFIT**

All businesses have a method of monitoring enterprises, and cow-calf operations are no different.

However, many cow-calf peoducers don't have a good handle on their actual cost of production because



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there is no standardized method of calculating production costs, said Dr. Jim McGrann, professor and economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The Standardization Performance Analysis (SPA) program takes producer records, from a shoe box, sun visor or dash board, and summarizes them into managerial information," McGrann said.

SPA is one of the first computer programs to merge production and financial records, allowing cow-calf operators to get a true picture of their enterprise.

SPA identifies production areas that aren't economical and that need attention. An analysis tells the producer the cost per hundred weight of production. Knowing the unit cost of production is the first

### **Use Potted Plants To Clean Household Air**

greater value than just decorative, said P. J. Ellison of Ellison's Greenhouses in Brenham during a presentation at the 1993 State Fair of Texas.

"Plants have a very, very strong value to us because they clean our air

Dallas - Plants have a much of pollutants," Ellison said at her Oct. 16th presentation in the Texas Department of Agriculture's Food and Fiber Pavilion.

Three major problem chemicals in the home are benzene, formaldehyde and trichloroethylene (TCE). Formaldahyde is found in plywood,

grocery bags and paper towels. Benzeze is present in inks, and TCE is in paints, lacquers and varnishes. "Everything we have in our homes - the pollutants are there," Ellison said. "Whatever you have in your home, you ought to have plants there because they will clean the environment."

The number of plants needed to effectively cleanse the air varies, but Ellison recommends 15 to 18 medium-sized plants for an 800-squarefoot home. Less would be needed if plants are large. Popular plants that are effective at cleaning the air include chrysanthemums, African daisies, azaleas, poinsettias, English ivy, spider or airplane plants, snake plants and corn plants.

Some potential home gardeners are intimidated by keeping so many plants alive and healthy, but Ellison recommended four simple steps to maintaining indoor plants.

Over watering is the most common problem, she said. Wait until the soil is dry and stick your finger down into the pot at a 1- to 11/2 inch depth to check for dryness. Plants with brown

leaves might have drowned roots.

"It's far better for the plant to be too dry than too wet," Ellison said.

Also don't ever take a plant from indoor light directly to bright outdoor light, because it can get burned if the

light changes are not gradual, she said. Third, for best growing conditions, plants must receive correct

light. Most plant tags that come with plants will indicate what type of light they require. And finally, if you have a diseased plant, throw it away and get a new one.

"It's cheaper to buy a new plant than to replace all the other plants in the house if a disease spreads, she said.


