Mohon and Vickie Robinett. Burial was in the Erath Gardens of Memory under the direction of Nowlin Funeral Home.

Mr. Roberts was born on March 1, 1925, in Clarksville, Texas, to the late Louie and Pearly Mae Jarrett. On August 1974, in Oklahoma, he married Opal McCullough. He had been a resident of Gorman before moving to Proctor 12 years ago. He was a self-employed trucker and a Pentecostal.

Dale Glasson, 70, died Monday, November 20, in Amarillo.

Services were at 2 p.m. Wednesday at North Amarillo Church of Christ with Glen Walton, Dalton Key and Haun Kite officiating. Burial was in Memorial Park Cemetery, directed by Schooler-Gordon-Blackburn-Shaw Funeral Directors.

Mr. Glasson was born in Ralls and moved to Gorman in 1937. He served in the U.S. Air Force from 1943 to 1945 with the 8th Air Force, 390th Bombardment Group stationed in England. He received numerous medals. He moved to Baird, Tx. in 1945 and married Wanda Brown in 1945 in Eastland. He was employed with Premier Oil Refining Company from 1947-1962. In 1962, he moved to Amarillo and worked for Ed Flood Oil company from 1964-1966. He was employed by Souther Farm Supply from 1966-1967. Farmland Industries acquired the company and he worked for them until his retirement in July 1986. He was a member of North Amarillo Church of Christ where he taught Bible Classes for many years and served as a deacon in several congregations. He was preceded in death by his parents, 2 sisters and 3 brothers.

Survivors include his wife, of Amarillo; two daughters, Ann Hamblin and Debi Hix, both of Amarillo; two sisters, Mrs. Edgar (Norene) Gordon of Lubbock and Elizabeth Burdine of Lamesa; one brother, Lloyd Glasson of Gorman; and four grandchildren.

The Gorman Panthers ended their season on Friday night at Breckenridge with a heart-stopping 12 to 8 defeat to the Bryson Cowboys. The game went down to the wire with the Big Red running out of time as the clock ticked off the final seconds.

Bryson ruled the first half and jumped out to a 12-0 halftime margin taking advantage of a blocked punt at the Gorman 20 and another fumble recovery on the Cowboy 47.

After blocking the Panther punt on the 20 the Cowboys completed a pass to Justin Dennis for 8 yards. Then the Big Red Defense was hit with a 5 yard penalty and Bryson ran for 2 yards to set up a 5 yard run by Todd Tull with 10:30 left in the second period. The kick for the extra point failed and the score was 6-0.

Then on the next possession the Panthers took the ball on their own 20 and moved to the Bryson 47 before giving up the ball on a fumble. From there the Cowboys moved in for the score in 8 plays with Justin Dennis getting the final 5 yards with 4:27 left in the half. A pass try for 2 points failed and Bryson led 12-0 at halftime.

The Panthers had moved deep into Bryson territory before losing the ball on an interception at the Bryson 9.

In the second half the Big Red defense completely shut down the Cowboys allowing 2 first downs and just 39 yards on the ground.

The Panther touchdown came in the final part of the fourth period after starting a drive late in the third from their own 2 after an interception by Jason Johnson. The Panthers moved 98 yards in 15 plays with Paul Petree getting the final 15 yards on a beautiful run up the middle with 9:42 left in the game. Nick Guthery rolled out to his left and ran in the corner of end zone for the 2 pointer to make the score 12-8.

This gave the Big Red a big boost and the momentum switched to Gorman.

After holding the Cowboys the Panthers took the ball on their own 30. On the first play Gorman was hit with a 5 yard penalty. After the setback Paul Petree ran 2 five yard runs and Sanchez ran for just over 4 yards but came up inches short of the first down. Then of fourth down the Panther opted to handoff to Petree rather than a quarterback sneak and the Cowboys were looking for Petree to carry and stopped him and took over the ball on the Gorman 40. The Cowboys moved to the Gorman 26 before being stopped. The Panthers then took the ball on their own 26 and moved to the Cowboy 22 before time ran out.

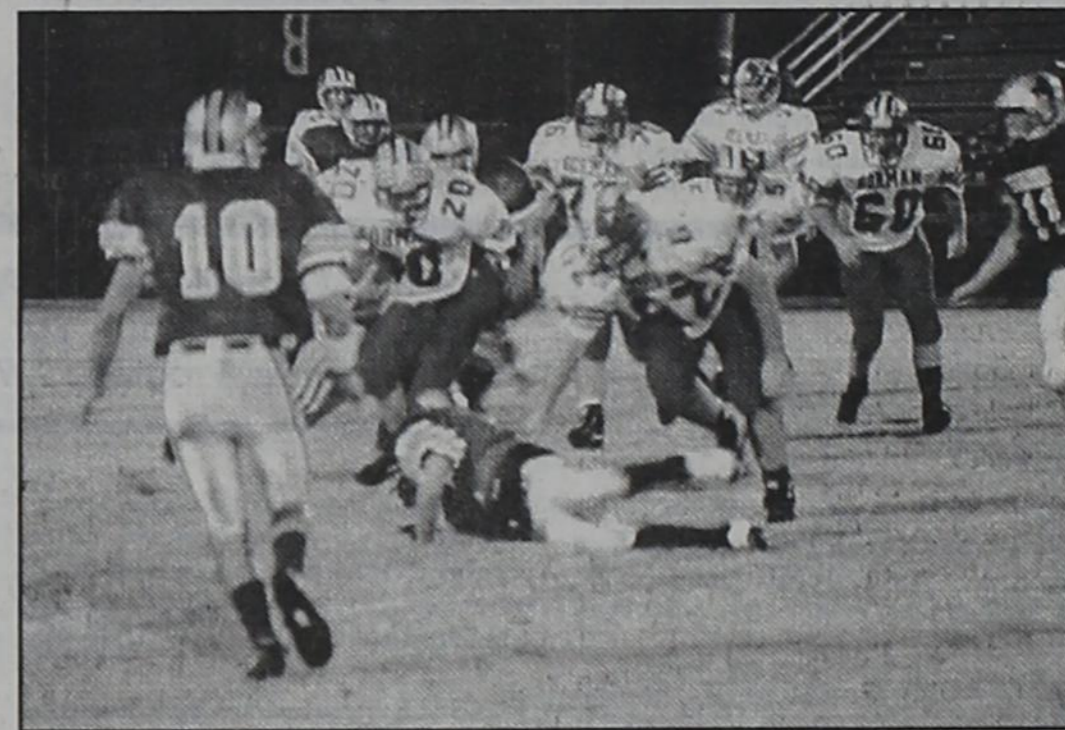
It was a heart-stopper for the Panthers who had taken complete control

of the game in the second half but they just ran out of time-outs and time. The Panthers can hold their head high though because this was one of their best performances of the year. We are so proud of them and their play this year.

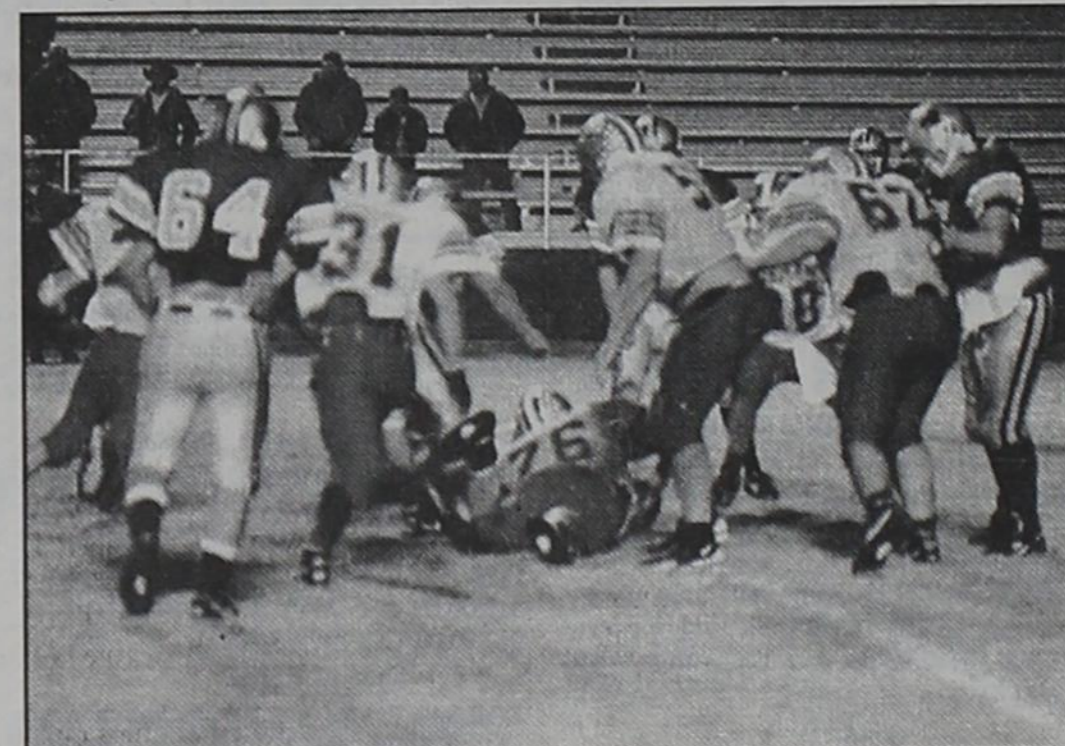
Petree led the Panthers with 144 yards on 28 carries. Sanchez had 42 yards on 8 carries but did not play but

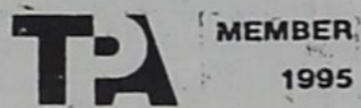

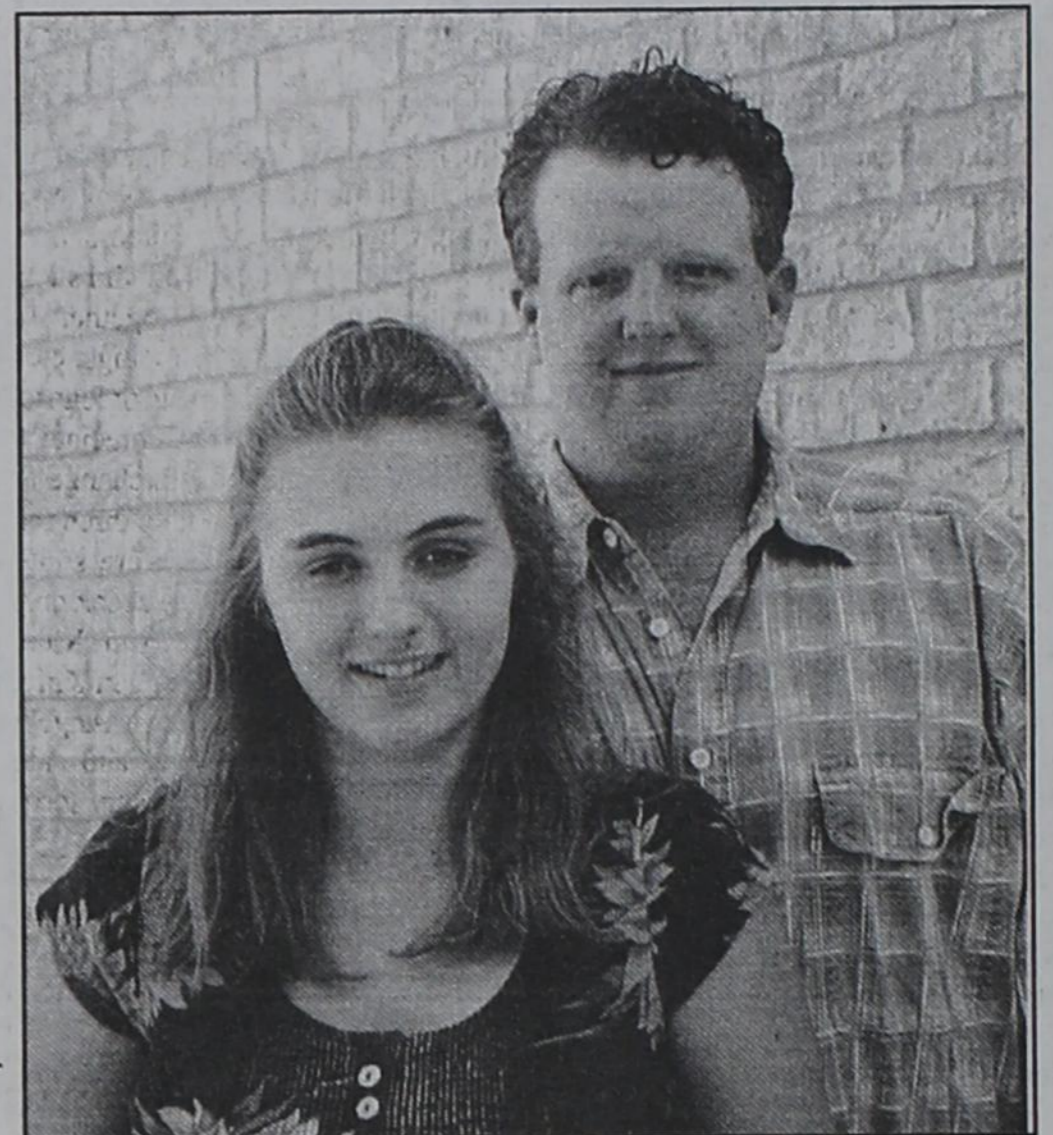

## TU Electric Requests Fuel Refund Permission

TU Electric filed a request today with the Public Utility Commission to refund to customers \$64 million, including interest through December, because of lower-than-projected fuel costs from June through September '95. Subject to PUC approval, the refund will be made as a credit on January bills.

A TU Electric residential customer with a January bill for 1,000 kilowatt-hours would receive a credit of \$9. The amount of the refund will depend on the quantity of electricity used.

The refund is proposed because of declining natural gas prices, which last spring fell to their lowest point in two years on the spot market and have remained at that level.

Electric utilities under PUC jurisdiction recover their fuel costs from customers through a fixed per-kilowatt-hour charge approved by the commission. When actual fuel cost vary materially up or down from the approved projection, the utility files a request to refund or surcharge the difference.

Since 1986, TU Electric has implemented 11 fuel refunds totaling \$775 million and two fuel surcharges totaling \$238 million.
