The Gorman Panthers all but assured themselves of a playoff berthon Friday night by defeating the Tolar Rattlers by a score of 35-7. Gorman led 14-7 at the end of the first quarter and took a 28-7 lead to the locker room at intermission. Gorman added another score in the third period and held the Rattlers to a minus 6 yards rushing in the last half to secure the victory. Gorman will be the runner-up in District 13A if the Baird Bears defeat the Cross Plains Buffaloes and the Panthers win their final game with Santo on November 13th. However, if the Bears defeat the Buffs, the Panthers will be assured of a playoff spot.

The Panthers hit the scoreboard on their first possession, taking the kickoff on their own 39 and scoring in eight plays with Don Mauney getting the final 2 yards for the score. The drive featured a 16 yard pass to Mauney, a 7 yard run bt Kris Scitern, an 8 yard run for a first down by Mauney, a 12 yard first down run by Scitern, and another 8 yard run by Mauney. Henrik Bodlund kicked the point after and the Panthers led 7-0.

But the Rattlers came right back to shock the Big Red defense as they returned the ball to the 38 and scored in one big blast, as Joey Ives took the handoff, went off the right side of the Rattler line, hit a gaping hole and raced 62 yards for the score. Scott Pack booted the point after to tie the score at 7-7-.

But from this point on the Panthers were not to be denied as they came back with another score with 2:31 left in the period when Kris Scitern got the final 3 yards on a run. The drive featured a fantastic 49 yard run by Kris Scitern to set the Big Red up at the Rattler 13. Don Mauney got the Panthers a first and goal with a 3 yard run to the 3 yard line. Bodlund booted the point after and Gorman was out front to stay

On the next Rattler possession the Big Red defense got the ball via a fumble at their own 31 and then proceeded to score again with 4:42 left in the half, going 69 yards in 11 plays to eat up the clock and Don Mauney got the honors going the final 3 yards for the TD. The drive featured three 6 yard runs, a 5 yarder, a 9 yarder, and another 5 yarder before Mauney got the honors on the 3 yard run. The kick try failed and the Panthers led 20 to 7.

Gorman scored again before half-

time, by going 40 yards for the score ther fans to their feet on a beautiful following an interception by Tony Forbus on the 40. The Rattlers received a 15 yard penalty, the Panthers then got the first down on two 5 yard runs. Then another 5, 4 and 5 yarder set the Panthers up with a first down at the Rattler one. Tony Forbus scored the touchdown with a run with 1:09 left in the half. A pass from Rajee Patel to Shane Caraway added the two pointer and the Panthers led 28-7 at halftime.

The Gorman Panther Marching Band showed the fans No. 1 Rating peformance and brought the crowd to their feet with a great halftime show. The Panther Marching Band is to be congratulated on the outstanding year they have had and the improvement they have shown this year. It is a great tribute to the Band Director, Lisa Kaminack, and all the band members.

Following the intermission, the Rattlers took the kickoff, but were held by the Big Red defense and forced to punt. Gorman took the punt on their own 30 and scored in 9 plays with Kris Scitern bringing the Pan36 vard run for the score with 4:26 left in the third. The drive featured a 10 yard pass to Mauney; a 6 yard pass to Shane Caraway and five other running plays. Bodlund booted the point after and Gorman led 35 to 7. This was the way the scoreboard read at the final whistle.

Kris Scitern led the Panthers with 154 yards on 17 carries. Don Mauney had 84 yards on 17 tries. Tony Forbus got 35 on 9 tries. Jeremy Sanders had 5 yards on 2 totes. Charlie Torres carried one time for no gain. Marco Herrera ran two times for a minus 1, and Rajee Patel had a minus 1 on three keepers.


Gorman's defense was outstanding all night and with the exception of the first drive by the Rattlers the Big Red defense shut down Tolar's running game completely.




