Stenholm Meets With **Concerned Area Citizens**

Peanut farmers and other concerned citizens in the peanut industry filled the conference room at Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association on Tuesday, January 14th, when Rep. Charles Stenholm met for a 45 minute meeting.

All concerned were anxious to hear of the General Agreement on Trade and Tariffs (GATT).

Rep. Stenholm, in his 14th year as Representative from the 17th District said "he had worked diligently for 13 years for the peanut program and agricultural producucts, and that many of his colleagues do not have a real understanding of the peanut program."

He said he has had the support of the farmers in the past which was very important in his accomplishments in getting peanut programs passed.

Many of the farmers expressed concern over his backing of Fast Track trade agreements passed with speed by Congress and with GATT, especially Section 22. Stenholm repplied that he "feels trade agreements leading to free and fairer trading rules" will be in the best interest of farmers in the long term and that he fears a program without GATT more than with it.'

The U. S. economy is "sick" Stenholm said, and added that he has sincere concerns that protectionism (trade rules) would make it worse.

"There are no quick fixes", he said. Stenholm said he will continue to work to improve the peanut program and that in his opinion there is more to gain over the long term with free and fairer trade.

This year's imports of peanuts was not necessaryin Stenholm's opinion. He feels imports should be brought in to fill definite shortages, with people from the industry setting in on meetings before those imports are alllowed.

Imports of peanuts are to be controlled and limited to 3 percent, under the agreements, he said.

Having the president make trade an issue is a plus, even though the recent trip abroad did not meet expectations, Stenholm said.

He urged his listeners to "keep letting Congress know," your opinions. Congressmen need to know how their consittuents feel on the issues facing the nation.

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

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
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

In the summer of 1975 a small sales organization headed up by Mr. Hugh S. Parnell out of Lynchburg, Virginia was selling chopped Peanuts to the Dairy Industry, primarily for their "NUTTY BUDDY" Ice Cream Cones. Mr. J. O. PCA quickly expanded into selling to the Baking and Candy Industry. In that first year PCA employed 8 people and processed just over 250,000 lbs. of peanuts. and a variety of other tasty peanut products. We are happy to ship peanuts for you to friends and relatives anywhere. All of the accounting and sales is still handled by the Parnell family in Lynchburg and as of recently, Mike and Jean Parnell have moved to the Gorman area to help oversee the Gorman operation. Eddie Torres has been the plant manager for two years. He lives in Stephenville with his wife, Delores and their two daughters. The Parnell family is very proud of what they have accomplished here in Gorman, Texas.



Chamber Of Commerce **Business Spotlight of Month** Birdsong Peanuts



The Birdsong Corporation was founded in May, 1914 by Thomas Henry Birdsong, Sr. of in 1984. Isle of Wight County, Virginia.

Thomas Henry Birdsong, Sr. assisted in organizing and operating numerous businesses, points were acquired by Birdsong in 1985. primarily in the handling of agricultural commodities such as peanuts, hay, grain and cotton. The businesses offered farmers seed, fertilizer and other supplies. Through the years, he

acquired farm land. Thomas Henry Birdsong, Sr. had five sons and two daughters and the family experienced hard times before his passing in 1933. The depression of the 1930's was being felt by all people engaged in farming and dealers in farming products. Under the leadership of Harvard R. Birdsong and with the able help of all the Birdsong brothers and sisters, the company managed to survive the Great Depression.

Birdsong operated jointly in several small shelling plants. In the fall of 1940, a new and larger shelling plant was constructed in Suffolk, Virginia. These operations were conducted under the anme of Birdsong Storage Company, a partnership composed of the five sons and

Franklin, Virginia.

In 1965, an agreement was made between American Cold Storage Corporation (Birdsong owned) and the Messrs. Melvin and Wilbur Shell, owners of Gorman Peanut Company, to operated a partnership. In the course of the partnership several shelling plants and buying stations were acquired including Houtex Peanut Company, Bain Peanut Company and

With the impending abandonment of the MKT Rail Service through Gorman, Texas, a group headed by Melvin E. Shell acquired the right of way between Gorman and the ATSF interchange in Dublin, Texas and the outstanding stock of the Texas Central Railroar.

In 1973, Birdsong acquired the partnership interest of Gorman Peanut Company and the Texas Central Railroad. Devine Nuts shelling plant and its properties in Pearsall, Texas were acquired by Birdsong

The Farmers Gin and Warehouse Company, Blakely, Georgia, and its southeast buying

Today, Birdsong is headquartered in Suffolk, Virginia. Its operations include eight shelling plants. They are located in Suffolk, Virginia, Franklin, Virginia, Blakely and Cordele, Georgia, Plant 1 and Plant 2 in Gorman, Texas, Pearsall, Texas and the newly acquired plant in Memphis, Texas. The company has such allied peanut operations as a peanut crushing plant, hull grinding and pelletizing, seed shelling and marketing. The allied operations also include drying and cleaning facilities, farmers' stock storage and cold storages for processed peanuts.

The Texas Central Railroad services the peanut shelling plants and storages in the Central Texas area and is known as the "Peanut Line".

Birdsong Corporation operates in all three peanut producing areas and markets Virginia, Runner and Spanish type peantus to all major U. S. processors and is amajor exporter in worl

The company is privately owned primarily by members of the Birdsong family.
