The City Commission of Gorman met in a regular meeting on February 6th with the following present: Mayor Pro-Tem John Rice, and Commissioners Howard Hagood, Johnny Smith and Ann Maxfield.

The meeting was opened by Mayor Pro-Tem Rice at 6 p. m. MINUTES OF THE January 16th regular meeting, called meeting of January 28th and called meeting held January 30th were read. Howard Hagood made a motion that the minutes of these meetings be approved. Seconded by Johnny Smith, the motion carried 3-0.

After reviewing the bills a motion was made by Johnny Smith that the bills be paid. Seconded by Howard Hagood, the motion carried 3-0.

Reports were given for departments by Chief of Police David Smothers, Municipal Judge V. O. Huff, and Joe Williams, Supervisor of Public Works. Chief Smothers presented the Commissioners with an inventory he had compiled of equipment within the police department.

Ann Maxfield made a motion that trousseaux for the public works crew (as budgeted in the 1991-92 budget) traffic cones (25 cones at \$6.95 each) and casing material needed while working in bell holes be purchased for the public works department. Seconded by Howard Hagood, the motion carried 3-0.

The matter of animal control was discussed at length. The Commission reviewed the policy on Pet Ownership from the Gorman Housing Authority. The Commission is very concerned about animals running free and what solution can be presented to correct this problem. A motion was made by Howard Hagood that the Commission make an in-depth study relating to animal control, researching the ordinances and regulations to ascertain if any are in existence, and if so can be enacted. Seconded by Ann Maxfield, the motion carried 3-0.

The matter of "Old Fire Hall" rental was placed in abeyance. After hearing from Joe Williams and discussing the water meter of a patron, the Commission requested the meter be pulled and replaced. The new meter should then be monitored for a period of days.

A motion was made by Ann Maxfield to pay Tacy Warren \$15.00 per month, this amount to be added to her regular payroll check for custodial work performed during her period of temporary employment. Seconded by Howard Hagood, the motion carried 3-0.

A report on the library was given by Ann Maxfield. She had attended a meeting of library volunteers on February 5th. The need for more space for shelves was expressed. Other items are needed such as

catalog files, shelving material, etc. The library is now being operated by volunteer service, Monday through Friday between the hours of 3 to 5 p. m.

Commissioner Hagood noted it is now time for 1992 election procedures to be publicized. February 17th, 1992 is the first day for candidates to file with a March 18th deadline for filing.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned on a motion by Johnny Smith, seconded by Howard Hagood. Motion carried 3-0. Meeting adjourned at 8:15 p. m.

GOOD RECORDS NEEDED FOR TAXES

Good tax records can save you time and money when filling out your tax returns. You must have statements and receipts that support the income, deductions, and credits claimed on your return. If your records are in order, you can save hours of looking for W-2 forms or lost receipts and cancelled checks. These records will help you prepare a return that is complete and correct. Also, you can save money when you have records of expenses that may be tax deductible.

Remember to:

- Keep copies of your tax returns. They can help you prepare future returns or if you need to file an amended return.
- Save all statements showing income you received. This includes Forms W-2 and W-2P, showing wages and pension payments, and Forms 1099-INT and 1099-DIV, showing income from interest and dividends. Keep track of income from work in which you were not an employee; for instance if you had odd jobs or temporary work.
- Keep careful records of payments you made to someone to care for your children or dependents while you work or look for work. Cancelled checks or receipts for cash payments usually are proof. Also, have your day care provider fill out Form W-10, "Dependent Care Provider's Information and Certification," and keep it in your files. You can use these records for the child and dependent care credit, which can be claimed on either Form 1040 or Form 1040A.
- Make notes in your checkbook. It can be a basic source for keeping a record of your deductions. When you prepare your return, you can figure out if the amount is a deductible expense. Cancelled checks alone are not always proof that an amount can be deducted. Save the receipts, sales slips, and any other documents to support the items in your checkbook.
- Get receipts for cash. If you make payments in cash, get a completed, dated and signed receipt for any payments that may be deductible.
- Store your records together in one safe place. You can keep records in a way that best suits you as long as you can support each deduction you take. One method is to keep an envelope and mark it for each kind of expense. For example, all child care receipts can be kept in one envelope and all income statements in another. Usually, records should be kept for three years after the due date of your tax return. Some records should be kept even longer.

Sun Light, And Sun Right

Medical experts today are recommending responsible (and moderate) use of sunlight for a variety of ills.

Everyone needs sun to produce vitamin D, but how much they require may depend on age and other factors.

"Vitamin D is essential for the life-long development and maintenance of the body's skeleton," explains Michael F. Holick, Ph.D., M.D., co-chairman of the Light Symposium Foundation's Biologic Effects of Light conference.

Aging, sunscreens, the season, time of day, degree of air pollution and latitude limit the skin's ability to produce the vitamin D hormone.

To fully enjoy the beneficial effects of sunlight, Dr. Holick is convinced sensible guidelines relating to responsible use should be developed. "We need guidelines for more even-handed appreciation of this natural resource," he continues.

The more northern the latitude, the more sunlight the individual requires. For older, fair-skinned persons living in New England, about ten to 15 minutes of exposure a day in the mid-morning to late afternoon several times a week is recommended.

For persons living in the South, just two or three minutes may be adequate, depending upon the person's sensitivity to sunlight. The darker the complexion, the more sunlight he or she needs.

Just as sunlight should be used responsibly, so should sunscreens, say experts. They recommend children and young adults use sunscreens carefully. Too much of the lotion or total block can also limit the body's ability to produce vitamin D.

Casual exposure to the sun is vital for the elderly. Dr. Holick recommends that they enjoy the outdoors for short times. If they wish to stay outdoors longer, they should apply a sunscreen of factor 15.

"Vitamin D deficiency in the elderly can cause serious weakening of their bones and accelerate



osteoporosis-like bone loss. Studies conducted in the U.S. and in Europe show that 30 to 40 percent of the elderly men and women with hip fractures are vitamin D deficient," Dr. Holick says.

Scientists also use a vital portion of the sun's energy (phototherapy) to treat osteoporosis, skin disease and seasonal affective disorder (SAD), a mood disorder common in winter.

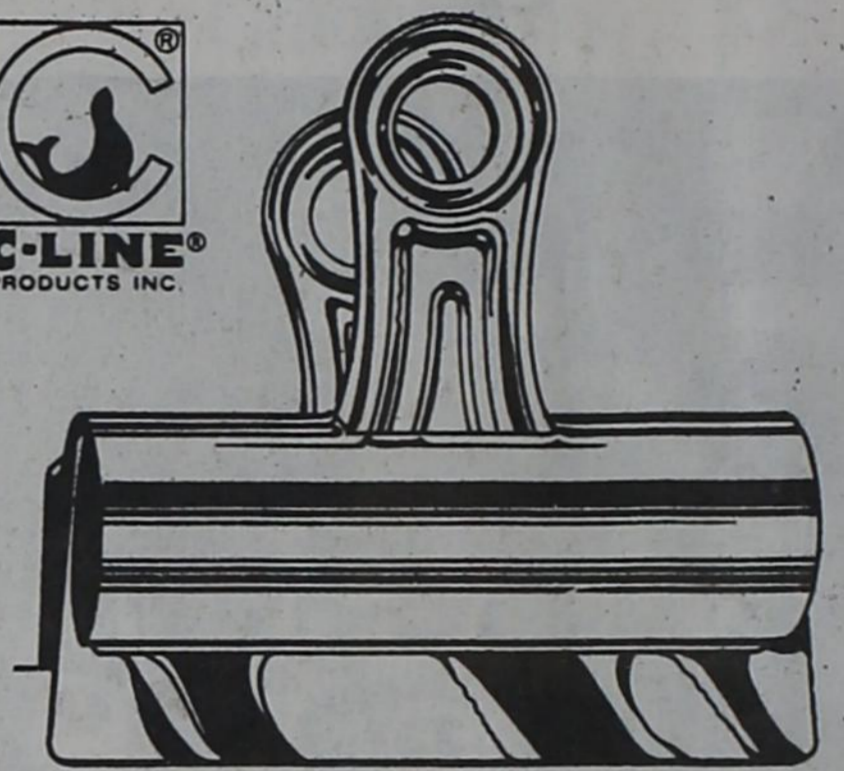

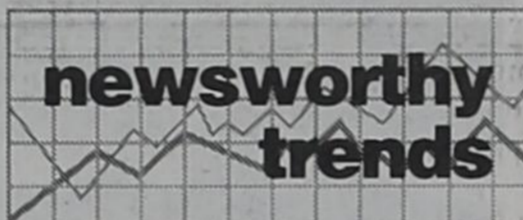
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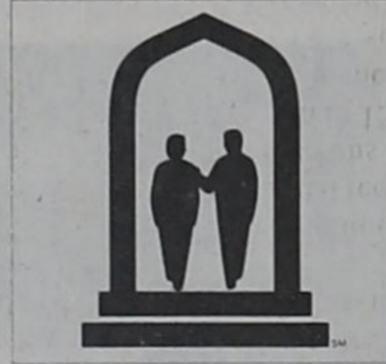

Religion: The Trend is Up

The percentage of Americans attending worship service during an average week has risen to 43 percent to match a 20 year high, according to a recent report. That represents an increase from about 100 million weekly attenders to over 107 million.

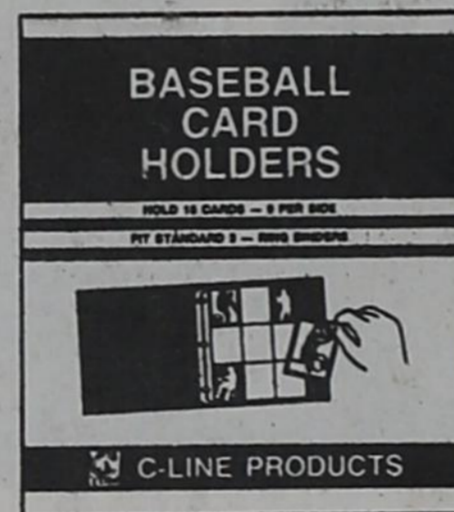

The report further shows that a majority of adults say they're attending religious services more frequently (27 percent) or with the same frequency (32 percent) as five years ago. Baby boomers have reached the age when they have their own children and lead the surge in new members. This is borne out by the finding that among the 30 to 49 year old age group, 34 percent reported increased attendance with 31 percent saying they attend as frequently as they did five years ago.

These figures were reported to Religion in American Life (RIAL), a 40-year-old non-profit organization that works with congregations of all faiths to increase participation by urging members to "Invite a Friend," a program designed to increase membership in religious congregations to 200 million by the year 2000.

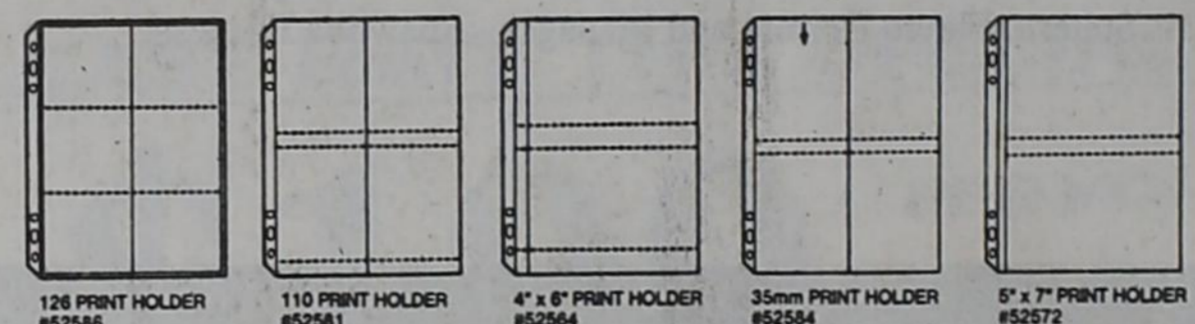
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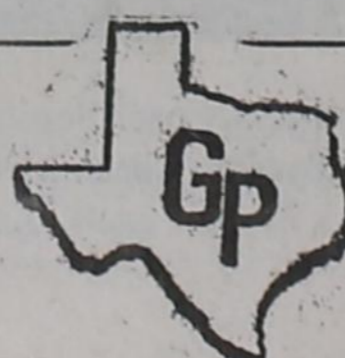
