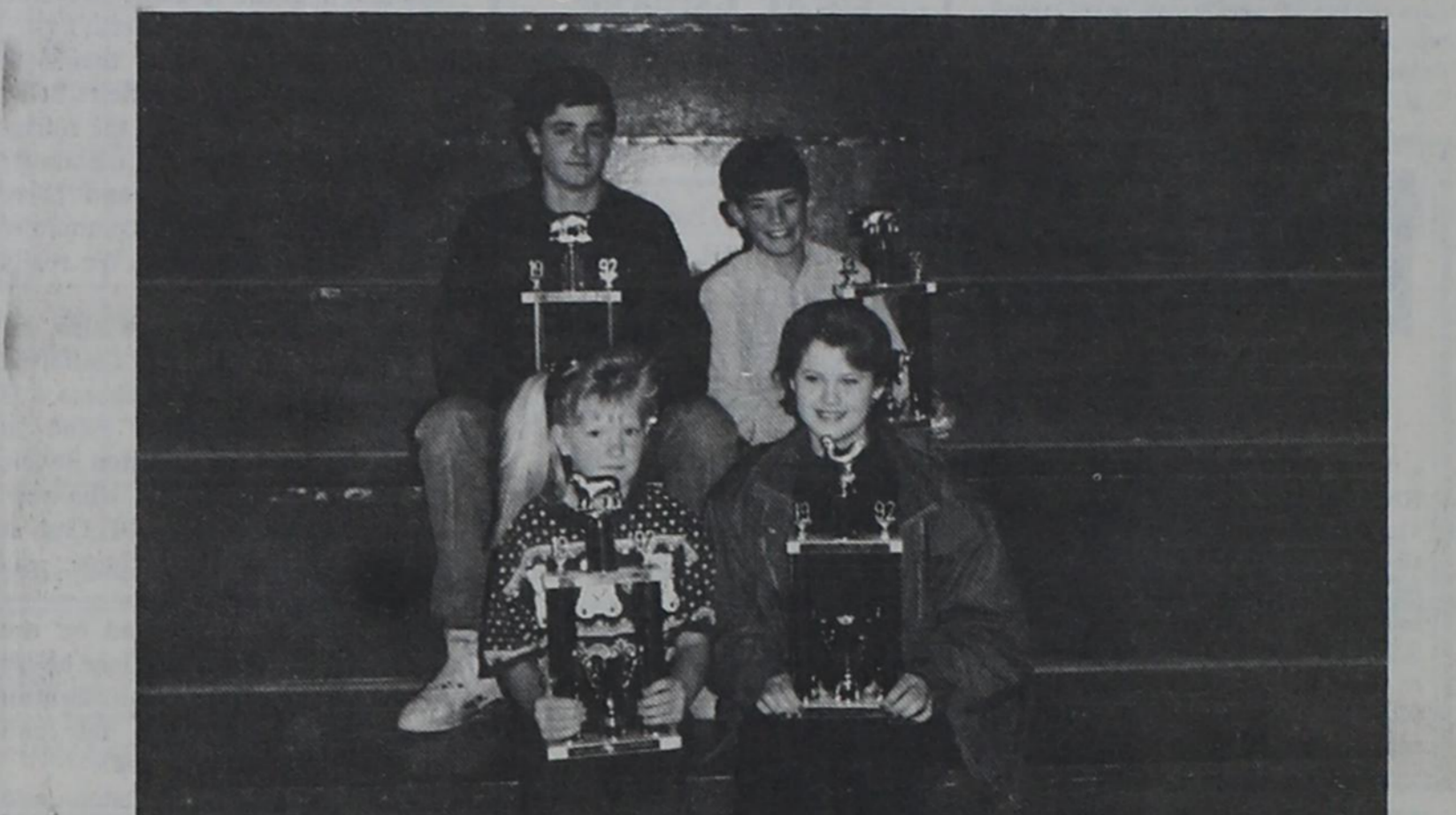

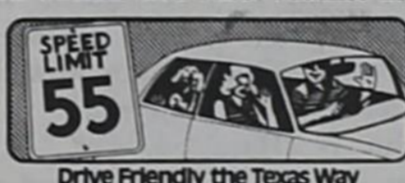

Policy allows stock peanuts to be exported for crushing

WASHINGTON (AP) — A change in the Commodity Credit Corporation's sales policy will allow farmers' stock peanuts to be sold for export for crushing at competitive prices.

The action was taken to ensure that the large portion of the 1991 peanut crop pledged as collateral for price support loans will be disposed of at minimum loss to

the CCC peanut price support program, said Keith Bjerke, CCC executive vice president.

Otherwise, he said, the peanuts could only be sold in the domestic market for crushing into oil at prices which now are lower than world prices.

Peanuts sold for export crushing must be fragmented before export.

Agriculture Viewpoint

By M. Davy Vestal

As the rains continue across the area, I've continued to notice widespread leaching of nutrients from the soil.

This leaching affects both the nitrogen and phosphorous levels in the soil and consequently, will affect the growth of the grain.

One indicator of this affect is the pale green color of both wheat and oats in the area.

If the weather permits and allows for top dressing of these crops, farmers should consider the addition of extra nitrogen and phosphorus.

However, this application must be

made before jointing occurs, which is usually late February. Once jointing occurs, additional nitrogen will do very little to increase yield potential. Jointing may be delayed a couple of weeks this year due to the rainy warm periods we've been experiencing.

Weeds may be a problem with this years grain crops as well. You may want to check in to adding with your top dressing a herbicide such as Glean, Ally or Express to help control weeds such as henbit and mustard.
