Texas A&M University System To Hold **Conference For Area Firefighters**

To Address Challenges in 2000

Dan will give growers a "Peanut Program Update." costs, opening up the farm bill - all of these and more are challenges peanut growers in the Cross Timbers area of Texas face. It is these challenges to peanut production that will be addressed at a multi-county Peanut Shortcourse to be held Thursday, February 24. This is the first time growers from throughout the Cross Timbers including Erath, Comanche and Eastland counties along with the scattered growers in Brown and Callahan counties will join together as a group to address grower concerns and issues. The Cross Timbers Peanut Shortcourse will be held at the De Leon City Hall Building on Hwy. 16 in De Leon. The program will start at 8:00 a.m. with registration and then get underway at 8:30 a.m. There is no cost to attend but participants are asked to preregister by calling the local Extension office or 915-356-2539. A sponsored lunch will be served and two pesticide credits, one in IPM and one in General, will be offered to private and commercial applicators.

Individuals with disabilities who require an auxiliary aid, service or accommodation in order to participate in this program are encouraged to contact the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Comanche County at 915-356-2539 to determine how reasonable accommodations can be made.

The Peanut Shortcourse will feature many well known speakers to Cross Timbers growers. Leading off the program will be Larry Meyers. Larry represents southwestern peanut growers in Washington, D.C. as well as writing for Southwestern Peanut Grower News. He is popular speaker with peanut growers because of his insights into politics and how it affects peanut production. The topic of his presentations is "What's In Store From Washington."

Peanut insurance has played an increasing role in peanut production as farm programs shift to a reliance on insurance payments during disaster. To discuss Federal Crop Insurance guidelines and changes for the year 2000, Sam Cameron with FCIC our of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma will be present. Growers will find this session very informative as they make insurance plans for 2000.

Dr. Charles Simpson, Peanut Breeder, Texas A&M University has had some outstanding results in this breeding program for nematode resistance. The Coan variety has already been released and is a tremendous help but later releases are proving even better. Dr. Simpson will present data on variety performance and the future of nematode resistance.

Tomato Spotted Wilt Virus (TSWV) is a serious disease of peanuts and this area has experienced plenty of problems from TSWV in the past. Dr. Forest Mitchell, Research Entomologist, has done extensive research on this problem from South Texas to Central Texas and the past two years he has focused on resistant varieties and a possible planting window. Forrest will present information on his research findings at the shortcourse.

Dr. Chip Lee and Dr. Robert Lemon both are know across the state to peanut growers. Dr. Lee will bring an update on fungicides growers can use in 2000 including some new changes and Dr. Robert Lemon will talk about the peanut varieties to use including how they perform under less than ideal conditions.

The last presentation is "Are You a Competitive Peanut Farmer?" Dr. Ken Stokes and Chad Hobbs from the Texas A&M University Ag Economics Department have put together this presentation geared to Cross Timbers producers. Remaining competitive will be the main issue a peanut farmer faces as peanut production continues to change.

Remember the program is free of charge and all Cross Timbers growers are encouraged to attend.

Third Grade Classes Study San Antonio

The third grade classes recently studies a unit on San Antonio. We learned that San Antonio originated in the 1700's as 5 Spanish missions, set up by priests to teach the Catholic religion to the Native Americans in the area. Parts of the missions are still standing in San Antonio today, and can be toured by visitors, in order to see how the Spanish and Indians lived long ago. Some are even still used as churches. The most famous of these missions, the Alamo, was the site of a battle between a small band of Texas soldiers and a very large Mexican army during the Texas and Mexican War. The Texans lost the battle of the Alamo, but won the war against Mexico for independence by defeating Santa Anna's arm at San Jacinto. San Jacinto Day is still celebrated during the Fiesta, a week-long festival in San Antonio held in April each year. The Fiesta is only a part of the rich heritage and culture that makes up the great
